

## COVID-19: CONSIDERATIONS WHEN DECIDING TO MOVE SENIORS FROM RESIDENCES AND CHSLDS

- Ol Is everyone in your household supportive of this move?
- Are you mentally, physically and financially able to take on this responsibility for the duration of the pandemic and possibly into the foreseeable future?
- O3 Is your home equipped with the necessary equipment for toilet, bathing and other medical needs?
- O4 Have all members of your family been in isolation for over 14 days and practicing social distancing?

  If someone in your family develops
  Covid-19 do you have the
  necessary space to keep a senior
  protected?
- O6 Should you become sick is there someone else in the home to care for the senior?

- Has the senior residence or CHSLD agreed to the senior returning to their accommodation once restrictions are lifted?
- O8
  It is critical to consider the possibility that a displaced senior may lose their accommodation. Before making any decision, ensure you have a contingency plan in place.
- Only seniors who show no symptoms and who live in residences with no confirmed cases, can be moved.
- Pamily members must NOT enter the residence. They must wait for their loved at the door to pick up their loved one and their belongings.
- Seniors who leave long-term care facilities or residences must have no contact with other residents as they leave.
- Pamily members who have to move seniors from a different region, need an official letter from the residence to show at police checkpoints.

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
