

A "master teacher" with 40 years experience in the classroom and as an administrator, Miss Cumming has always been keen to involve parents in school activities. "She is never at a loss when suggesting things for the many volunteers at Willingdon to do," says Anne Williams, President of their Home and School Association.

Kathy Cumming taught for 6 years in her native Scotland before coming to Montreal. She taught




### **KEYNOTE SPEAKER – MAUREEN MORRIS**


