



## Youth Development Initiatives

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April 2015

# Introduction

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The Coasters Association has had many achievements over the years regarding youth initiatives, and priority areas have been identified. These achievements have contributed to the development and vitality of the region's communities; however, there are many challenges that remain to hinder the future development and sustainability of the region.

## Priorities

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- ◆ Retain our young people through education & employment opportunities
  - Youth skills link program, enabling our youth to complete their education or obtain full-time employment
  - Support to youth internships (YMCA, etc...)
  - Support the continuation of the McGill project - follow the health model for youth scholarships for aquaculture, tourism, etc...
  - Encourage the vocational training on the LNS in different fields
  
- ◆ Provide recreational opportunities for young people
  - Expand and maintain KIDS Summer Camp, BCNeF, Early Childhood Development (Avenir d'enfants) and R2 programs in the five municipalities
  - Assist with the maintenance and establishment of Youth Centers in the municipalities
  - Sustainability of the four (4) CLC's established in St. Paul's School, Mecatina School, Netagamiou School and Harrington Harbour
  - Support establishment of sports infrastructures in communities, and funding for our youth to participate in joint projects, and in off coast events, etc... (follow the YES model).
  - Implement CAD Program (Community Against Drugs) in all municipalities on LNS, and support the continued implementation of the Tobacco Prevention program
  - Advocate for a better transportation system, and better prices, to serve the region (i.e.: plane, ship, etc...)
  
- ◆ The importance of bilingualism - make our youth bilingual
  - Establish a French Teen Immersion camp on the LNS
  
- ◆ Prepare youth for the future
  - Involve youth on boards, committees, etc..., provide them with leadership roles
  - Establish a youth coalition to address specific challenges and concerns of our young people

- Facilitate youth contribution to the development and maintenance of local and regional radio and print media (local newspaper), and establishment of broadband services on the LNS

## Achievements

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### Consultations

- ◆ Organized the first Youth Forum held on the coast, in St. Paul's River
- ◆ Held the Youth Employability Forum in the Municipality of Bonne Esperance for LNS Secondary IV and V students
- ◆ Organized and facilitated a Lower North Shore Career / Job Fair at École Mgr Scheffer in Lourdes de Blanc Sablon
- ◆ The Youth Coordinator and a LNS youth attended the GENERATION Provincial Youth Forum in Montreal with 100 participants in attendance addressing challenges related to bilingualism, identity, isolation and community life
- ◆ Designed and delivered a series of workshops entitled "Taking Charge of Your Future". The workshops were offered to secondary students in order to decrease the drop-out rate, to recognize students and to motivate them to further their education. And, created a pamphlet entitled, "Life's Choices, Taking Charge of Your Future"
- ◆ Collaborated with YES to coordinate a 'Meet and Great' workshop in Montreal for post-secondary students
- ◆ The Coasters Association hosted a Provincial Drug and Alcohol conference in Gatineau, Quebec, with twenty (20) English organizations in attendance, including youth and youth organizations
- ◆ Partnered with MADD Canada and CSL and offered High School students from the Municipality of Bonne Esperance and Blanc Sablon a multimedia presentation on drugs and alcohol at St. Paul's School
- ◆ Held the first Drug and Alcohol Awareness and Prevention Summit on the Lower North Shore
- ◆ Collaborated with CSSSBCN and CSL and held workshops geared towards maintaining good mental health with youth ages 11-17
- ◆ Collaborated with Free the Children Foundation and CSL and carried out a Youth for Change Speech Tour in five schools on the Lower North Shore
- ◆ Carried out a Youth Consultation with a total of twenty-five (25) youth ages 16-29 from five (5) municipalities and twenty-six (26) representatives / partners connecting via video conference in four locations on the Lower North Shore addressing topics related to youth out migration and retention
- ◆ In partnership with St. Paul's School and Netagamiou Community Learning Centers and CSL, a twelve-week LEAP (Local Employability Access Program) by Carlton University was carried out and twelve (12) participants took part via video conference

- ◆ Organized the three (3) mother/daughter Dove Sleepover for Self-Esteem at St. Paul's School
- ◆ Assisted with sending two (2) youth from St. Paul's School to St. John's, NL, to attend Music Camp at The Music Collection Company
- ◆ Assisted with the three (3) YMCA exchange trips for St. Paul's School, Gros Mecatina School, and Netagamiou School.

## **Programs**

### KIDS Summer Camp

- ◆ The summer camps from 2008 to 2014 have been maintained in four municipalities and have accommodated 677 youth while hiring approximately 87 students. The program obtained eighty (80) life jackets through the Open Water Wisdom Campaign and disbursed them to the four (4) camps along the coast
- ◆ Previously, in 2006, the camps only operated in St. Augustine & St. Paul's and these were established by community members in these two municipalities. A total of twenty-eight (28) youth attended and four (4) student jobs were created.

### Basse-Côte-Nord en Forme Movement

- ◆ Lead and maintained the Quebec en Forme Movement (newly named Basse-Côte-Nord en Forme) on the Lower North Shore since 2008 by employing a Coordinator and six (6) Animators working in participating communities (Chevery, Harrington Harbour, Gros Mecatina, Bonne Esperance, St. Augustine, and Lourdes de Blanc Sablon)

### Avenir d'enfants & R2

- ◆ Avenir d'enfants program implemented in twelve (12) communities and seven (5) part time animators hired through the partnership with the four CLCs, since 2013, and purchased 'Rock n' Talk' program and disbursed to Avenir d'enfants animators
- ◆ Through the partnership with CSL, the R2 dropout prevention program implemented in ten (10) schools/communities on the coast since 2013

### McGill project

- ◆ Through the McGill bursary program, \$80,000 was awarded to seventeen (17) students ranging from \$2,500 to \$10,000 in scholarships from 2008-2014. To date, a total of \$125,000 was issued
- ◆ Supported the Nursing Assistant Program (McGill Internship Scholarship) in partnership with CSL and CSSSBCN. Sixteen (16) Nurse's Assistant Interns and one Occupational Intern received (\$5000 each) to carry out stages off coast, \$85,000 in total

## Employment

- ◆ Linking our Youth Project implemented on the coast hiring six (6) youth between the ages of 16-30 in the Municipalities of Gros Mecatina, St. Augustine, and Bonne Esperance completing a twenty (20) week group-based employability skills and job internship program
- ◆ Youth in Action Project carried out on the coast employing six (6) youth between the ages of 16-30 in the Municipalities of Blanc Sablon and Bonne Esperance, completing a twenty-week work-based employability skills and job internship program
- ◆ Breaking down Barriers Project carried out on the coast hiring eight (8) youth between the ages of 16-30 in the Municipalities of Blanc Sablon and Bonne Esperance, completing a total of twenty-two (22) weeks surrounding academic upgrading, group-based employability skills, culture history and art, and community development
- ◆ Developed a youth job links program that hired twelve young people on the Lower North Shore, assisting participants in obtaining future employment, returning to school or starting a business
- ◆ Youth Internships (2) funded by the YMCA to participate in a digital skills youth internship program to increase their ability in digital technical skills and digital information processing skills, with a focus on digital skills development
- ◆ Young Canada works and Service Canada projects (2) to assist in the development of the Wildberry/NTFP industry

## Arts & culture

- ◆ Y not Here project, funded by Canadian Heritage to hire two youth to carry out art-based programs on the Lower North Shore
- ◆ Partnered with YMCA and carried out two (2) arts-based programs (Photo/video and Hip-Hop/Break dance) on the Lower North Shore in La Tabatière, Chevery, and St. Paul's River, and developed a How-to Manual as a model for implementing future YMCA youth programs through the Ys of Quebec
- ◆ A YWCA project to hire three youth to assist with the development of a social program, including arts & culture
- ◆ Six secondary students participated in a project "Spoken Heritage On-line Multimedia Initiative (SHOMI) by QAHN, and five youth animators (one per municipality) recorded historical stories of the senior citizens
- ◆ Arts Expo & Conference by Youth Employment Services (YES), a LNS artisan was selected to participate in the project and to attend the conference in Montreal

## **Activities**

### Nutrition

- ◆ Created a "Back to Basics and Cooking Essential Cookbook" by the Youth Participants on the Youth Skills Link Project
- ◆ A project on Healthy Lifestyles used as a case study by Health Canada in 2010

- ◆ In partnership with CHSSN the 5/30 Health Challenge was carried out in five (5) communities along the coast with High Schools (Chevery, La Tabatière, St. Augustine, St. Paul's River, and Blanc Sablon)
- ◆ Nutritional Course developed and course implemented in schools
- ◆ Aided in the application process in the establishment of a Breakfast Program in St. Paul's School and Mountain Ridge School
- ◆ Established the Fitness Center at St. Paul's School, in collaboration with St. Paul's school and the CLC
- ◆ Supported the École en Santé Movement in schools on the LNS

### Early Childhood Development

- ◆ Early Childhood Development Program "Show me the Way" established, and purchased the mascot 'Litou' to aid with the 'Show me the Way' program
- ◆ Purchased Real Game software for the High Schools' POP classes
- ◆ Carried out a needs assessment study and identified the resources, programs, services, and the needs of each community on the LNS in regard to youth ages 0-5
- ◆ Collaborated with social workers from CSSSBCN to carry out the program 'Discipline to Love' consisting of seven (7) parent workshops aimed to guide the parents in the supervision of their children by a healthy discipline
- ◆ Purchased learning material from Invest in Kids and launched the First Five Years program in Lourdes de Blanc Sablon, St. Paul's River, La Tabatière, and Chevery with CSSSBCN via video conference
- ◆ In partnership with CSSSBCN, Speech Therapy services provided to youth

### Bullying & Violence

- ◆ Carried out a needs assessment study of four hundred and sixty-eight (468) students attending ten (10) schools across the coast ages 6-17, four hundred and eleven (411) parents, twenty-six (26) regional organizations, eight (8) institutions and four (4) municipalities and identified the seriousness of bullying and violence in each school, home, and community on the Lower North Shore
- ◆ Developed eleven (11) Bullying Violence Preventative Kits and distributed to eleven (11) Elementary Schools on the coast to provide youth ages 6-12 with learning tools on bullying and violence related issues
- ◆ Seven hundred and ninety-nine (799) t-shirts were purchased, offered in both English and French designs, and distributed to all schools to take part in Pink T-shirt Day

### Drugs and Alcohol

- ◆ Five 'Did you Know' pamphlets on drugs and alcohol were developed, and two pamphlets entitled, "Just say No" and "A Worthwhile Initiative" were produced
- ◆ Collaborated with CSSSBCN and orchestrated 'Mock tail' competitions with the graduating classes of St. Paul's School and École Mgr Scheffer
- ◆ CAD Program implemented in the Municipality of Bonne Esperance

- ◆ A 'Reach for the Top' competition was held at St. Paul's School with twenty (20) Elementary and six (6) Secondary students
- ◆ Created a 400-page information tool entitled "Life Choices" to inform youth of important life choices (i.e.: health and sexuality, responsibility & legality, smoking, drugs and alcohol, etc.)
- ◆ Developed a prevention plan on drugs and alcohol to teach youth the consequences of their actions and help them analyze situations, be tolerant and accept differences in others
- ◆ A youth assessment study was carried out with five (5) High Schools regarding smoking
- ◆ Coast wide promotion of the campaign "Take your Butt Outside"

### Teen Resources

- ◆ Created a resource library handbook of all in office resource material and online research pertaining to teenage issues and categorized them into seventeen (17) content topics
- ◆ Developed Parents with Teens Resource Website Guide
- ◆ Produced 25 Survival Packs for parents with teens containing books covering 17 teenage content topics and disbursed them to 5 high schools
- ◆ Carried out the Voices and Choices survey in three (3) schools (École Mgr Scheffer, St. Paul's School, and St. Augustine)
- ◆ An implementation Plan, Operational Manual, First Aid Manual, and a Training Manual were produced for the French Immersion Teen Camp
- ◆ A feasibility study created identifying the demand for a French Immersion Teen Camp along the Lower North Shore
- ◆ Completed a financial assistance guide for post-secondary students. The guide includes information on: loans and bursaries programs, scholarships and awards, financial support from Colleges and Universities, tools to find employment, and student employment
- ◆ Created a program called "Youth Motivation" which seeks to decrease the dropout rate, inform students of educational/employment opportunities and motivate youth to pursue post secondary education, and take leadership roles
- ◆ Established a Community and School Life volunteer Scholarship award since 1991 for Secondary students.

### Disabled Population

- ◆ Partnership with Group Accessibility in St. Augustine to provide activities for the disabled population through the Senior Day Center
- ◆ Resource report identifying potential sources of funding at both the provincial and federal levels in regard to establishing a group facility for the physically and intellectually challenge population
- ◆ Completed a business plan template to establish a group facility for the physically and intellectually challenge population.

- ◆ Worked in partnership with CSSSBCN to improve services and programs for the physically challenged population and assisted with various projects.
- ◆ Carried out a study on services for the physically and mentally challenged

## Challenges

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- ◆ Sustainability of KIDS Summer Camp, BCNenF, Avenir d'enfants, R2 programs (3 years remaining for the programs)
- ◆ Extreme cost to bring youth together for events, training, etc..., and lack of equipment and infrastructures for youth and family activities
- ◆ High cost of transportation on and off the territory for youth to travel to sporting, arts and culture events, recreational events, etc... and for youth to travel out to school
- ◆ Lack of employment opportunities, must leave home to work
- ◆ Exodus of our youth, and high drop-out rate in the region
- ◆ No special consideration for students from the Lower North Shore with regards to Loan and Bursaries, therefore, parents would have to maintain two households while their children attend post secondary education off territory, this attributes to the high dropout rate
- ◆ Introduce more French in the schools, enrich French in elementary and advance in Secondary
- ◆ Insufficient French Second language opportunities for youth in Anglophone communities, and unilingual Anglophone youth have a difficult time finding employment on the territory, due to insufficient French Second Language skills
- ◆ Lack of tutoring support system and mentoring systems, services, and programs (ex: literacy – youth at risks), and in specific areas of education and vocational training
- ◆ Shortage of equipment and programs to implement Drug and Alcohol Prevention activities (i.e.: Reach for the top equipment, etc...), and lack of funding to implement CAD program throughout the Lower North Shore
- ◆ Lack of training programs for animators at youth centers to deal with Drug and Alcohol issues
- ◆ Lack of funding for animators, on all programs, to do physical recreational programs
- ◆ No infrastructure implemented for disabled population, and lack of activities and employment opportunities for the disabled population
- ◆ High poverty status in the communities, high percentage of people living below low income cut off
- ◆ No high-speed internet on territory, and high cost for telephone and video-conferencing services
- ◆ Isolation - need for completion of route 138 (most communities are remote and inaccessible)
- ◆ Government (provincial & federal) offices located off the territory, language is sometimes an issue



- ◆ Lack of government funding

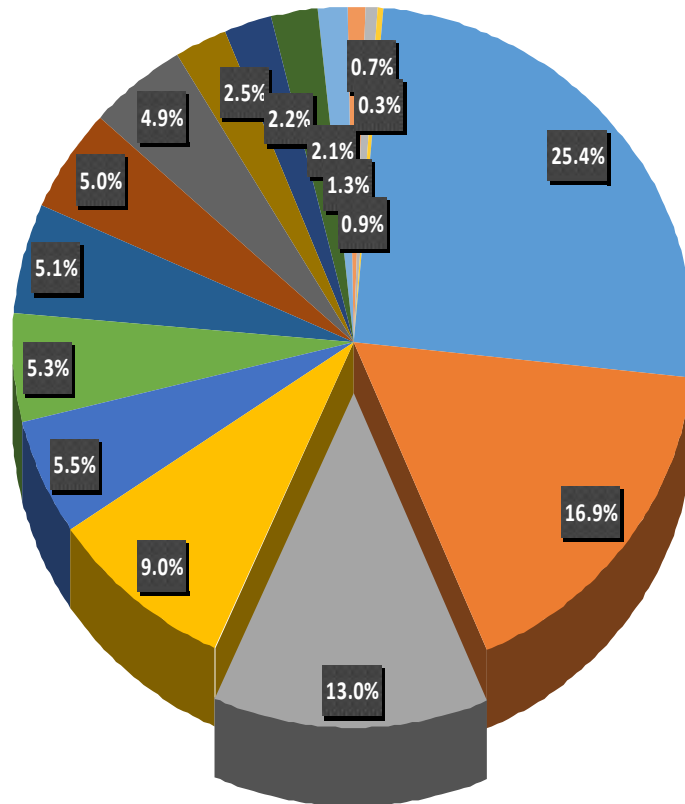

### Contribution PIE chart (social programs)

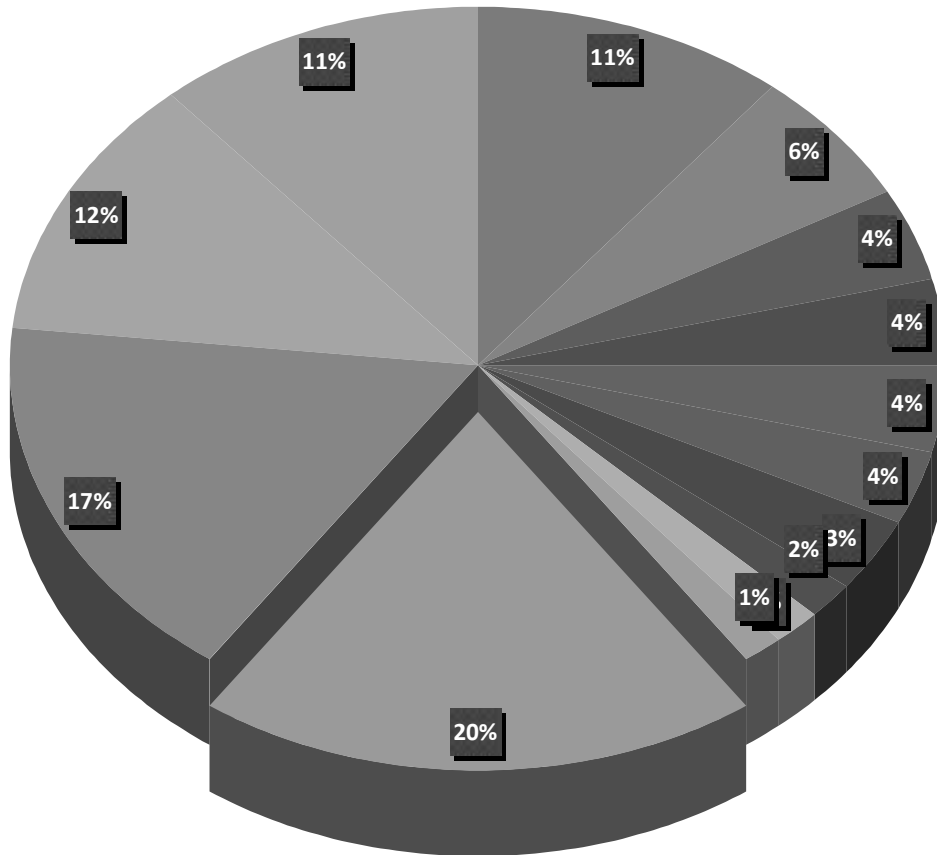
