# BONJOUR HI: WHAT FRENCH AND ENGLISH QUEBECERS THINK ABOUT EACH OTHER AND ABOUT KEY ISSUES

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### METHODOLOGY

 The survey was conducted by the firm Leger Marketing for the Association for Canadian Studies and the Quebec Community Groups Network with a national sample 1226 Quebecers 871 francophones 275 anglophones and 106 allophones and was conducted between May 14<sup>th</sup> and may 17<sup>th</sup> 2018 via web panel with a probabilistic margin of error of 3.5 points 19 times out of 20
