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

BILL 56: AN ACT TO PREVENT AND STOP BULLYING AND VIOLENCE IN SCHOOLS

Schools and school boards all across Quebec are preparing their policies and procedures this new school year, updating them to reflect necessary changes that are part of the Ministère de l'Education, du Loisir et du Sport (MELS) Bill 56. The Bill was passed into law in June 2012 and aims to make everyone involved in education more accountable with regards to bullying and violence in Quebec schools.

Bill 56 is titled "An Act to prevent and stop bullying and violence in schools". According to MELS, the Bill involves various amendments to the Education Act and to the Act Respecting Private Education. Bill 56 specifies the duties and responsibilities of the various "school stakeholders and their partners. It also stipulates that school boards must see to it that each of their schools provides a healthy and secure learning environment that allows every student to develop his or her full potential, free from any form of bullying or violence." 1

In short, the Bill defines what bullying and violence are comprised of in an educational setting. It also defines the responsibilities and duties of students, parents, school staff, principals, governing boards, school boards and school ombudsman vis-à-vis bullying and violence in schools. Each public and private educational institution must adopt and

based on a behavior that is intentionally harmful. They also cover the topic of cyber-bullying since so much intimidation and harassment takes place on the internet and in social media sites. There are tip sheets for students, parents and educators alike. There are sources of help for students who are victims of violence or are being bullied. There are also links for parents and educators on what they can do to help out and be actively involved as part of the solution. Everyone should consult the site to update their knowledge of the many forms of bullying in this high-tech era and what the expectations are. Visitors to the website can even declare their support to right the wrongs of bullying, and enter a contest sponsored by MELS.

Many schools will be holding fall workshops and sessions on violence and bullying. The QFHSA will also feature anti-bullying as the main message of our upcoming Fall Conference (see details on page 4 in this NEWS). With an informed effort, we can reduce bullying and violence. Parents need to become involved in education now more than ever.

A MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

SCHOOL BOARD ELECTIONS

As the Quebec provincial election campaign progressed over the summer, we saw schools, school boards and education become hot topics. School Boards had been targets for attack and have experienced dramatic cuts to financing this past year. School Boards are under pressure to justify their existence, maintain current level of service while working with only half the financial resources. They are even being threatened with outright dissolution from some quarters despite our constitutional right to maintain control of our own education system.

Various political parties threw many ideas around such as:

- Extending the school day to 5:00 pm to 'address school drop out rates',
- Extending Bill 101 to restrict Francophones and immigrants from attending English CEGEPS,
- eliminating the legitimate pathway through private school registration to receive English public education eligibility.

School administrations are going to be looking to Home and School parents more and more to help provide extra resources and activities to enhance the school experience of their students.

It is, once again, up to us, the parents.

The English speaking community has always valued education and has been willing to contribute the time, energy and money needed to achieve their goals. Witness the recent student boycott of classes this past summer and note the significance of the English CEGEPS and universities choosing not to participate. Witness the number of parents willing to enroll their children in private school, despite the often enormous financial burden, in order to secure an English education. We acknowledge that there is often a price to be paid for high quality education and we are willing to work harder to meet that price.

Nevertheless, only 15% of eligible voters in Quebec actually make the effort to cast their ballots in English school board elections.


The QFHSA has been making efforts to provide information regarding school board governance and school board electoral lists to their membership and the English Community at large. One area of concern has been to advise our parents to verify on which school board electoral list they are registered and to verify by which school board their school taxes are being collected. (Links to the English school board websites leading to information on school taxation lists can be found on the QFHSA website.) Our Rights Committee and Education Committees' mandates are to study the various educational issues as they arise and to advise and inform our members.

We, as parents in the English school system, have a responsibility now, more than ever, to show solidarity with our English school boards and to support them. Make sure you are registered on an electoral list and, once a school board election has been called, take the time to familiarize yourself with the candidates (websites make that much easier today than in the past) and make the time to cast your vote. If you have high school students graduating and turning 18 years old in the near future, obtain the electoral list transfer form from your school board and make sure their name is registered. Rather than wandering the downtown city streets banging pots, they can be eligible to exercise their right to vote!



SUPPORTIVE PARENTS A Teen's Perspective

If someone where to look at my report card from last year or from any of my high school years, they would see an honors student and automatically assume that these marks came from hard work. They wouldn't be wrong but if I were to also say I am dyslexic, then suddenly I am put into a whole different category.

Throughout elementary school, I struggled to achieve even a passing grade. What I think made a huge difference for me, was the support I received from my parents as well as my teachers. I have know of quite a few kids that are still being labelled lazy or simply as troublemakers because they are not being recognized as having a learning disability. As Dyslexia can also occur with ADD or ADHD, it is difficult for these children to receive the help they need and deserve.

I find that dyslexics think differently than so called "normal" students. That is often what makes them such determined students. My parents always told me I was lucky to be dyslexic and I have learned to wear it as a badge of honor rather than something to overcome. Walt Disney and Albert Einstein were both dyslexic and look at what they accomplished!

Editor's Note: With parental support and help, students can achieve educational success. Students having trouble at school should discuss it with their parents, pediatrician and school counsellor. It often does take a village to raise a successful child! Kudos to all those parents like Amanda's who have supported their children and persevered to see them through to success.

REGIONAL COUNCILS WOULD YOU LIKE TO HOST ONE?

Always HUGELY popular at our Fall Conference is the hour set aside for Regional Councils. DYNAMIX 3 SIMPLE RULES

Whether parenting or working with a large group of students, it is important we look at our own behaviour and the impact it has on our children's actions. Although we may have the best of intentions, we inadvertently influence our children's poor behaviour or negative choices. When dealing with a child who is misbehaving, it is easy to blame their environment, parents, friends or even nature. But by doing so, we are relinquishing all responsibility thus disabling us from making a difference. By owning the behaviour we are looking in a mirror and asking "What can I do to change the behaviour?".

Let's look at 3 simple rules I like to remember when working with children. The first is "Set children up to succeed". Imagine asking a child not to jump while standing on a trampoline. Or sit a group of children at a table for long period of time and ask them not to talk. Although children do have to learn to follow rules and "respect their elders", they do have limits.

Evaluating the likelihood of success before acting will create a more positive environment and prevent negative behaviour. By helping children to succeed, they learn success is possible and experience the intrinsic benefits which will leave them wanting more.

The second rule is "Be positive". It may sound simple and perhaps obvious, but all too often we focus too much on negative behaviour rather than positive behaviour. Speaking negatively toward a child or labeling a child will encourage the behaviour. Similarly, focusing on positive behaviour will encourage the behaviour to continue.

The third and final rule is "Connect with the child". A relationship built on control will likely not give you the results you seek. Nobody likes to be forced to do something. Have you ever tried to strap a child into a car seat against their will?

Connect with a child, build trust and respect and they will be willing to learn.

By owning the behaviour we have the power to change the behaviour. Although it's not easy, it's amazing we what we are capable of. What are your rules?



Bullying Prevention Plan

Frightening Facts:

- In Canada, bullying happens to someone every 7 minutes on the playground.
- It is estimated that 160,000 children miss school everyday due to the fear of bullying by other students.
- 64% of students consider bullying a normal part of school life.

What can we do about it? The best approach is not simply focusing on how to deal with a bully, but rather how to prevent bullying from happening in the first place by creating a school community built on Respect, Cooperation & Team Spirit!

<u>Constitution/By-Laws Committee</u> <u>Chairperson – Rickhey Margolese</u>, QFHSA Director

For the last 2 years, our committee of 2 has been looking at the QFHSA Constitution and By-Laws to see what needs to be changed, deleted or added. We have been working with our corporate lawyer Brian Sher. TOGETHER WE CAN MAKE A DIFFERENCE!

Dear DM,

I'm blessed with 2 wonderful children, a boy and a girl. Going back to school is such an exciting time for them — and for me as a parent. But after the excitement of the new gear, new clothes, and new class wears off, how do I get them to stay excited? From: Wanting to Have a Great School Year

Dear **WANTING TO HAVE A GREAT SCHOOL YEAR**,

Going back to school is very exciting for many families – but the real thrill comes in watching our children flourish and have a great year. Like us, the beginning of something new - whether a new gym membership or walking the new dog - can be very motivating... but doing the daily grind needed for success can make us wary. The answers to your question lie in helping our children develop habits of excellence. These habits that will serve them well into adulthood, because well ingrained habits become part of their character.

Success begins with a well thought out plan that takes into consideration your child's age, health, abilities and needs, and what needs to get done. Our children often look to the adults in their lives for examples. Are we also working towards planning ahead, being organized and following through when we get tired? That being said, the greatest lesson we will teach is what we do when we fall off track from a habit we are developing. Do we give up—or do we pick ourselves up and get going again? Leading by example goes a long way to inspiring our children.

The first habit we would suggest for having a great school year is getting enough rest. Young people need more sleep that they think. Teachers in any school will tell you that Sleepy, Grumpy and Dopey don't feel good - and are not able to give their all in class. Parents already know how miserable mornings can be with a sleep deprived child. Children thrive on routines, so once we can establish and maintain a bed time our children fall asleep faster - and we may even get some treasured time with our partners! Schedules are created by starting with the end in mind (i.e. sweet sleeping faces). We then plan backwards for bath time,

dinner, study time, and of course some free time too! You should expect this will take at least 4 to 6 weeks depending on the age of your child. A chart can serve as a visual reminder - to help us stick to the routine and helping our children stay on track. Many a power struggle has been defused with a simple invitation to the child to "go look at the chart".

Teaching our children time management is a gift that keeps on giving. Once it is part of their repertoire, it will lead to reduced stress and tears (for example, from the discovery that the big assignment is due tomorrow). Most schools provide agendas equipped with planners. Helping children understand how to best use these tools, and forming the habit of using them every day will make their lives easier and less stressful. Whether you tend to be a very organized person or not, your best chance to help your children succeed is to have them see you using and benefiting from your use of a work agenda or family calendar.

When children get in the habit of being organized in their daily lives, it carries over into school. When a child has a pattern of putting away their papers into the right pochettes or binders, they are much more likely to stay organized. This is important at home too. Take a picture of their work area when it is well organized and post it on the wall. This will reduce arguments and give clear direction of what is expected of them when the job is done. Over time, these behaviours will develop into habits, and become part of who they are and what they do. This skill will be invaluable as they move towards adolescence and have increased demands placed on them.

Along their paths to habits of excellence, the road to success will not always be smooth. Our children will need to be prepared that bumps will happen — and be prepared to persist. Being able to rise to the challenge and accept disappointments without giving up on ourselves or our hopes will serve them well. Because when the going gets tough... the tough dig in, and stick with tried and true means to achieve success.

WHEN PARENTS ASK "WHY SHOULD WE JOIN THE HOME AND SCHOOL? WHAT DOES IT GIVE US?"

HOME AND SCHOOLS GIVE PARENTS AND EDUCATORS A VOICE IN EDUCATION.

Being a member of your Home and School association doesn't mean you must volunteer or attend meetings. Some members contribute the annual dues and help in

that way. They are entitled to receive the QFHSA NEWS, at least quarterly, updating them on issues of importance on the provincial front as well as local association updates. Members also receive liability insurance coverage



for Home and School-sponsored events. Other members jump right in and volunteer as often as they can, even if they work and yet others only help out with an event here and there.

All members are represented by the QFHSA on the provincial and national front (via CHSF Canadian Home and School Federation), ensuring educational concerns are discussed at all levels. The QFHSA has acted as a governmental and policy watchdog and voice over the years on several occasions, concerning school boards, English language rights, provincial education budgets, special needs students, health, immigration, literacy and so much more.

MODERNIZING THE COPYRIGHT ACT AND MORE

I would like to extend a sincere thank you to QFHSA for inviting me to attend their AGM in the spring. Your meeting was insightful and thought-provoking. Kudos to the planning committee. It was a wonderful opportunity for me to meet your Members, Staff and Board. The Canadian Home and School Federation's (CHSF) Spring Board and Annual General Meetings were held in Charlottetown, PEI in June. CHSF's Executive is Janet Walsh, President; Deb Giesbrecht, 1st Vice President; Cynthia Richards, 2nd Vice President and Eva Cameron, Secretary/Treasurer.

Some of the highlights of those meetings include a visit from Life Member, Mr. Tom Wilkinson, discussing the highlights of CHSF in the 1990's; compiling CHSF's recent history; arranging a Strategic Planning Session; a focus on technology and the well-being of children; as well as joining with Concerned Children's Advertisers on their newest project. Additionally over the past two years CHSF has advocated to the Federal Government for a Minister of State for Children and Youth.

As many of you may know, CHSF has been concerned with the Copyright Modernization Act (Bill C-11). CHSF recognized the importance of copyright reform in the 1990's and since then has partnered with national education organizations (Education Coalition Copyright – ECC) who are concerned about the impact copyright will have on education policies and practices in Canada. The focus of these national organizations, which represent seven million Canadians, is to ensure the quality of education in Canada. The education sector respects copyright. CHSF submitted a brief regarding the Copyright Modernization Act (Bill C-11) to the Legislative Committee of the House of Commons in January 2011. Canada's copyright laws were last updated in 1997 when the Internet was still in its infancy and paper copying was the primary method of sharing information.

Educational institutions currently pay for content and for copying materials, and, for the education community, copyright reform is not about getting material for free. Currently the education sector pays its fair share.

Bill C-11 provides the legal framework necessary for students and teachers in elementary and secondary schools, colleges, and universities to use publicly available Internet materials in their educational pursuits. The ECC members believe the education amendment is essential at a time when governments are simultaneously increasing levels of connectivity, promoting skills development and innovation, and supporting the use of the Internet in classrooms.

The Bill also includes education as an allowable purpose, under certain conditions, within the copyright fair dealing provision. With this provision, the federal government has established that fair dealing is available to students and teachers and that copyrighted materials can be used for educational purposes.

On June 29, 2012 the Copyright Modernization Act was passed by the Senate and was given Royal Assent by the Governor General. This new copyright law provides opportunities for learning and, for Canadian students to excel in the digital world, including exceptions permitting the educational use of Internet materials and the recording, and Internet transmission of lessons. These changes will facilitate online learning, including distance education. The Canadian education community has made some important gains with the new copyright legislation. The Government will announce a schedule of implementation to enact the Bill since there are sections that require the development of regulations. CHSF will keep their members posted as the implementation unfolds.

Some dates for you to keep in mind:

- The CHSF Board of Directors will be holding their Midterm Meeting in Ottawa November 8 -10 inclusive. While in Ottawa CHSF will lay a wreath at the National War Memorial at the National Remembrance Day Ceremony.
- Teacher/Staff Appreciation Week will be celebrated Feb. 10 –16, 2013 and again, CHSF will be providing posters.
- CHSF AGM 2013 will be held in Newfoundland, May 30 June 1.

As you wind up for a new school year, provincially and locally, remember that it is all about the students. As parents, we need to be involved and be a parent-in-the-know. CHSF advocates for a strong public education and health system which nurtures the well-being of Canadian children and youth in their homes, schools, and communities. We know that parents do make a difference. Pat yourself on the back – you deserve it.

WORKPLACE LITERACY AND ESSENTIAL SKILLS

Low literacy skills can threaten health and safety in the workplace. Investing in workplace literacy programs provides a way for employers to improve health and records while boosting productivity. "The 2012 Miner Report, Jobs of the Future: Options and Opportunities, predicts the next decade will see a 1.5 million shortfall in the number of workers able to fill available jobs (in Canada)", reports ABC Literacy. The Government of Canada has identified nine essential skills needed for the workplace. These skills are used in every job to varying degrees and at different levels of complexity. They provide the foundation for learning all other skills and enable people to evolve with their jobs and adapt to workplace change.

The nine essential skills are:

- 1. Reading
- 2. Document Use
- 3. Numeracy
- 4. Writing
- 5. Oral Communication
- 6. Working With Others
- 7. Thinking
- 8. Computer Use
- 9. Continuous Learning
- **1. Reading** The ability to understand reading materials in the form of sentences or paragraphs. We use this skill to scan for information, skim overall meaning, evaluate what we read and integrate information from multiple sources.
- **2. Document Use** The ability to perform tasks that involve a variety of information displays in which words, numbers, symbols and other visual characteristics are given meaning by their spatial relationship. We use this skill

when we read and interpret signs, labels, lists, graphs and charts.

- **3. Numeracy** The ability to use numbers and think in quantitative terms. We use this skill when doing numerical estimating, money math, scheduling or budgeting math and analyzing measurements or data.
- **4. Writing** The ability to write text and documents; it also includes non paper-based writing such as typing on a computer. We use this skill when we organize, record, document, provide information to persuade, request information from others and justify a request.



5. Oral communication - The ability to use speech to give and exchange thoughts and information. We use this skill to greet people, take messages, reassure, persuade, seek information and resolve conflicts.

- **6.** Working with others The ability to work with other workers to carry out tasks. We use this skill when we work as a member of a team or jointly with a partner, and when we engage in supervisory or leadership activities.
- **7. Thinking** The ability to engage in the process of evaluating ideas or information to reach a rational decision. We use this skill when we solve problems, make decisions, think critically and plan and organize job tasks.
- **8.** Computer use The ability to use different kinds of computer applications and other related technical tools. We use this skill when we operate cash registers, use word processing software, send emails and create and modify spreadsheets.
- **9. Continuous learning** The ability to participate in an ongoing process of acquiring skills and knowledge. We use this skill when we learn as part of regular work or from co-workers and when we access training in the workplace or off-site.


Look at Me!

In the first book, we get to know a girl named Katniss and she isn't as lucky because she lives in the poorest of twelve districts. She lives in districts twelve the mining district. There are 12 districts and the Capital. The Capital is in control of all the districts and forces everyone to work and give up their resources. To keep the districts in line, the Capital selects 2 children age 13-18 from each district every year to a fight to the death in an arena. They call this event "The Hunger Games"! The rest of the book is about how Katniss deals with the Hunger Games with a boy from her district called Peeta.

In the second book, we discover that the Capital was not happy that Katniss and Peeta survived the Hunger games together. They were asked to come back again for the second time for another hunger games. But this isn't a normal Hunger Games. It's the Quarter Quell, meaning every 25 years, instead of the annual Hunger Games, a Quarter Quell is held. For this, it means that instead of selecting 2 children per district, they select 4. The final book is about how Katniss finds Peeta even though he had been brainwashed by the Capital and wants to kill Katniss. Katniss must make him remember and convince him to join forces with her to fight the Capital. The rest of the book is about how Katniss fights the Capital. What will she do when she finds out that the leader of district 13 wants her out of the way? Will she succeed and win over Peeta again?


