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The Facts: Status of Women

Feminization of poverty

- Feminization of migration
- Rise of single motherhood across North America

- 1.9 million women in Canada live on a low income.
 - 30% of single mothers are raising their children in poverty in Canada



The Facts: Status of Women

In Montreal: 1 900 000 people

- 475 095 families are monoparentales (20%);
- 82% of all single parents in Montreal are women.

We do not know:

How many are immigrant single mothers are in Montreal What would be the % of Immigrant Single Mothers speak English as their First Official Language (FOL)



The Facts: Immigrant education

- Low educational achievement (Heath & Brinbaum, 2014; Garcia Coll &Marks, 2011)
- Significantly lower levels of educational performance in QC,
 Manitoba, Saskatoon (PISA reports 2006, 2010, 2016)
- In Quebec, "an acute immigrant performance disadvantage in this province" especially when linked to the SES of immigrants (Volante, Klinger, Bilgli & Siegel, 2017, p. 338)



Overview of Research Purpose

Single motherhood at the intersection of immigration and education

Better understanding of

- Quebec Context & Immigrant Education (Accueil et integration des eleves allophones) (Policy analysis)
- Parent-school interaction from the perspective of Immigrant single mothers (Face to face interviews)

Pre-migration **expectations** and post-migration **experience**Intersectional lived experience of single motherhood
Better social support systems for single mothers in general

More *specific support systems* targeting the immigrant experience of SM



Preliminary Findings

Immigrant Single Mothers (ISM)

Parent-school interaction an additional stressor

Low self-efficacy

Regardless of SES, participants had a difficult time advocating for the needs of their children and gaining institutional support (principals, teachers or CSDM)

Impact of negative interactions

Low educational attainment (teenage girls underperform)

10/12 children do not want to go to school

2/12 want to return to their country of origin
