QFHSA 63rd ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING - APRIL 28, 2007 BUSINESS MEETING PROCEDURE

- 1. The Annual General Meeting [AGM] is conducted in accordance with our Constitution, By-Laws and Standing Rules. In the case of any procedural dispute reference shall be made to Robert's Rules of Order Revised.
- 2. Each official voting delegate of each Member Association shall have one vote on any question which comes before the meeting, except for associations more than 250 kilometers from Montreal. Such Associations will still be entitled to three votes, expressed either as an identical or divided vote. Application for such privilege is to be presented in writing to the Executive Secretary prior to the start of the business portion of the Annual General Meeting.
- The quorum for transaction of business at the Annual General Meeting shall be twenty-five percent [25%] of Member Associations in good standing, represented by their official representatives or accredited alternates.
- 4. Voting shall be by ballot or show of hands. All questions shall be decided by a majority of those present and entitled to vote, except those which require a two-thirds [2/3] majority. On ballot votes, the votes of each association shall be handed in by the voting delegates of each association individually but at the same time. Counting of the votes shall be done by non-voting participants.
- 5. A **delegate** may not **speak** for more than two **[2] minutes** on any question under discussion, nor more than twice on any particular motion or resolution. Any person wishing to speak needs to stand and come to the microphone (if we have one).
- 6. Amendments to the Constitution and By-Laws require a two-thirds [2/3] vote of the delegates present and entitled to vote. Notice of the proposed amendments must have been mailed to all Member Associations at least ten [10] weeks prior to the meeting. Modifications to these proposed amendments received two [2] weeks before the AGM will be considered, but no modification may be made from the floor.
- 7. Resolutions to the Annual General Meeting must have been circulated to the Member Associations eight [8] weeks prior to the Annual General Meeting. Resolutions received after the date specified will be presented as Emergency Resolutions only after consideration by the Chairman of the meeting and the Resolutions Committee. Delegates presenting resolutions are reminded that they must be present at the time designated on the agenda for the presentation of their resolution. The presenting party may speak to the resolution, or amendments thereto, for not more than FIVE [5] minutes. In addition to amendments received two weeks before the AGM there may be amendments emanating from the caucus session held earlier, but no further amendments may be made from the floor.

PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE

PRINCIPLES

PURPOSE

- Justice and Courtesy for all
- One thing at a time
- Recognition of the will of the majority
- Protection of the rights of the minority
- To conduct business in an orderly and democratic manner by one or more of the following ways:
 - ✓ committee reports
 - ✓ motions or resolutions

To participate effectively in the proceedings of meetings, each person needs to know the fundamentals of parliamentary procedure.

THE MAIN MOTION

WHAT IS A MOTION?

A main motion introduces a new item of business; it is a proposal that the group take a certain action. It is the basis of all discussion and states the bounds of discussion. All remarks pertain directly to the contents of the motion on the floor. The making of the motion comes first, discussion follows. A subsidiary motion qualifies the main motion or proposes an alternate timetable for consideration.

WHEN IS A MOTION NEEDED?

- It forms a basis for discussion on all major decisions of the group.
- When in doubt, ask for a motion to be proposed.
- Motions must be made on all matters involving <u>finances</u> not already included in the budget as approved.
- On minor matters, a question may be resolved by the chairman 'taking the sense of the meeting'.
- The decision must be clearly stated for the secretary to report in the minutes as well as for the benefit of the members.

THE STEPS TO PRESENTING A MOTION ARE:

- member stands or raises a hand and says: "Madame Chairman/Mr. Chairman." The chairman recognizes the speaker by name.
- 2. The member says, "I move that ... ", stating or reading a motion.
- Another raises a hand to be identified by the chairman, then says:
 "I second the motion." The seconder believes the motion should be discussed, but <u>may not</u> necessarily be in favour of it.
- 5. The mover usually speaks first, giving the reasons for the motion. The opportunity to speak to the motion must be given to anyone who wishes to speak to or oppose the motion. Discussion should be addressed to the chairman.
- 6. At the end of the discussion, the chairman says: *"If there is no further discussion" or "Are you ready for the question?"* Then: *"The motion is that" "All in favour?"* (pause while the count is taken by the secretary) *"Opposed?"* (pause while the count is taken by the secretary)

"Abstentions?" (pause while the count is taken by the secretary) "The motion is carried" (or is defeated).

7. If anyone calls "Division" (questions the voice vote), the chair calls for a show of hands or a standing vote: "All in favour raise your hand. All opposed ... " If a majority request it, the vote may be taken by ballot. A "ballot vote" is the recommended procedure for election of officers and for resolving a contentious issue.

SUBSIDIARY MOTIONS

AMENDMENTS CHANGE MOTIONS: To qualify the idea of a motion, but not to change the subject or the intent of the main motion.

1. "I move to amend the motion by":

Inserting or adding a word, phrase or sentence.

Striking out a word, phrase or sentence.

Striking out and inserting a word or phrase or substituting a sentence or paragraph.

- 2. "I second the motion to amend."
- 3. *"It has been proposed to amend the motion to read as follows"* The chairman states the main motion and the amendment so the group will

understand how the amendment changes the motion. Amendment is handled in the same way as a motion with:

Discussion: "Is there any discussion?"

Question: "If there is no further discussion, the amendment is"

Vote: "All in favour of the amendment "

Chairman announces the outcome:

"The amendment is carried (or defeated)."

"The motion now before the meeting is"

(states the motion plus the amendment(s) if it carried)

In dealing with motions, the vote is taken first on the amendment. If passed, the amended motion is voted on. If the amendment is defeated, the main motion in its original form is voted on.

TO REFER: A question is referred to committee for further study and to submit a recommendation to the group at a later time.

TO TABLE: To set the matter aside until someone moves to reconsider it.

TO POSTPONE DEFINITELY: Postpone discussion until more facts are available.

TO POSTPONE INDEFINITELY: The motion may not be considered again that year.

Recommended useful resource materials available for reference during a meeting: A copy of your organization's Constitution and By-Laws. Robert's Rules of Order or other guide to basic rules of parliamentary procedure.

Oliver Cole, Chairperson of the Education Committee, presented the report and gave an update on the progress of the School Success Plans survey.

Joanie Beaubien Rossy, Membership Chair, spoke to this report.

7. <u>CANADIAN HOME & SCHOOL FEDERATION</u> (Book of Reports, pages 25-27) Anne MacWhirter, QFHSA 2005 delegate to CHSF, spoke to her report. She reported that the other provincial organizations were very interested in Quebec's Letter of Reaffirmation for local association membership. CHSF has been gathering information on student safety on buses. Michelle Armstrong has been nominated by Quebec and Ontario to serve as Central Vice-President for another two-year term.

8. **LITERACY** (Book of Reports, pages 34-35)

Marion Daigle, Literacy Resource Chair, noted that the principal activity of the past year has been the launch of the *Children's Literacy Resource Guide* at the Fall Conference. This project was funded by the Department of Canadian Heritage. The *Guide* has been distributed to all Home & School local associations, educators, literacy and community organizations. The principal at Roslyn Elementary School, for example, photocopied the book for all the teachers and the school inaugurated their Born to Read program on January 27th - Literacy Day. Marion was also the keynote speaker at the Saskatchewan Association of School Councils AGM on April 7-8, where she discussed the *Guide* and gave a workshop.

9. <u>CONSTITUTION</u> (Book of Reports, page 29)

Norma Stirling spoke to the report. As previously circulated to the local associations, the Constitution Committee recommended two amendments to the By-Laws, Article II, Membership and Fees, Sections #7 and #8.

MOTION: Michel Belleville (Lindsay Place High School)/Lisa Chartier (Hillcrest Academy) to accept the addition of Section #7 to the By-Laws, Article II, Membership and Fees. CARRIED

Article II, Section 7

- 7. Voluntary dissolution of a local Home & School Association requires the following procedure:
 - (a) A decision by an Association to disband can only be taken by a two-thirds vote of members present at a General Meeting, provided that there is a quorum at such a meeting in accordance with the Association's By-Laws, and that a formal notice of such an intent has been forwarded to all members, and that a motion to disband has been included in the announcement of the General Meeting.
 - (b) The reasons for a proposal of dissolution shall be forwarded in writing to Federation at least sixty (60) days before any action is taken.
 - (c) In the case of a decision to dissolve, all assets shall be sent to Federation to be held in trust until the association is re-constituted.
- **MOTION:** Charlene Vacon (Forest Hill)/Diane Lussier (Riverview) to place Section #8 to the By-Laws, Article II, Membership and Fee on the floor for discussion.

CARRIED

Note: Proposed changes to the wording are *in bold italics*.

- 8. If a school is being closed, the following procedure shall be applicable:
- (a) Where there is a Maintaining Association connected with said school, this association shall be merged with the Maintaining Association(s) of the school(s) to which the pupils are being transferred.
- (b) If there is no association at the new school(s) the association of the old school shall do its utmost to establish a Home & School Association at the new school(s).
- (c) School closings do not affect the membership status of individual parents.
- (d) The disposal of all assets, including equipment, belonging to the local association connected with the school being closed shall be the responsibility of said association. If said association wishes it may place its assets in trust with Quebec Federation pending final decision as to its disposal.
- MOTION:Elisabeth Gimber (Bishop Whelan)/Beth Weaver (Dunrae Gardens) to amend
the last sentence of Section 8 (d) to read: If said association wishes, it may
place its monetary assets in trust with Quebec Federation pending final
decision as to its disposal.CARRIED

(with two abstentions)

- MOTION: Deborah Richardson (Arundel)/Laurie Betito (Sunnydale) to amend the first sentence of Section 8 (d) to insert *monetary* and to remove the words *including equipment* so that (d) reads: *The disposal of all monetary assets belonging to the local association connected with the school being closed shall be the responsibility of said association.* CARRIED
- MOTION: Margaret Gurinskas (John Rennie High School)/Diane Lussier (Riverview) to accept all of Section 8 with the amendments to (d). CARRIED The By-Laws, Article II, Membership and Fees, Section 8 (d) now reads:
 - (d) The disposal of all monetary assets belonging to the local association connected with the school being closed shall be the responsibility of said association. If said association wishes it may place its monetary assets in trust with Quebec Federation pending final decision as to its disposal.

The following Motion was proposed from the floor after discussion regarding the ownership of property (non-financial assets) purchased by Home and School Associations.

MOTION: Michel Belleville (Lindsay Place High School)/Franca Celli (Hillcrest Academy) That QFHSA research the subject of the dispersal of equipment belonging to Home and School Associations connected with a school being closed and to inform the local associations of its findings prior to June 15, 2006. 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PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Report to Annual General Meeting – April 28, 2007 Submitted by Donna Norris, President

The theme for 2005-2006 was Spirit of Volunteer.

This coming year the theme will be: Home, School, Community: The Power of Belonging.

Highlights of 2006\07

- 1. At out 2006 Annual General Meeting we started our year with a celebration for Donna Sauriol for her years of dedicated service to QFHSA. We also welcomed two new directors to our board.
- 2. In May, Elena Purser and Michelle Armstrong attended the Canadian Home and School Federation's Annual Meeting in Fredericton, New Brunswick. Michelle Armstrong was nominated for another two year term as Central Vice President representing Quebec and Ontario at the Executive table
- 3. In June, Norma Stirling and I attended the Quebec Community Groups Network (QCGN) Annual General Meeting in Gatineau. Elections were held and Martin Murphy remains as President. Please see the QCGN report for further details. The Community Learning Centre's launch also took place at the end of June and Marion Daigle attended on behalf of QFHSA.
- 4. In August, QFHSA held Executive Workshops for the local association at the provincial office. It was well-attended and the following workshops were given: President, Membership, and Newsletters/Publicity. Elena Purser also presented to the Board of Directors the workshop on Drug Wise Parents, a CHSF/ Health Canada initiative that is ongoing.
- 5. September we launched the QFHSA Newsletter on our website. Beverlee Bishundayal oversees the information and layout for the newsletter which may be downloaded and used by the local associations.
- 6. Our Fall Conference was on October 21st at Macdonald High School. The large group of volunteers merits our special appreciation for their efficient and gracious hospitality and organization as the host school.

Our Keynote Speaker: Noel Burke from the Ministry of Education, Leisure and Sport (MELS): The Community Learning Centres (CLCs) were the topic of the day. Mr. Burke explained how the centres would operate, how the committee was established that would choose the CLC locations and oversee their development. A clip of a CLC already in operation in the US was shown. A question period followed the presentation. Since this was the first time that most of the parents present had heard about the CLCs, there were a lot of questions.

There were 11 workshops to choose from; approximately 150 people attended.

- 7. In November, we had an information booth at the QPAT (Quebec Provincial Association of Teachers) Convention. The Literacy Resource Guide that was launched at the 2006 Fall Conference was still very popular with teachers. Anne MacWhirter presented a workshop on the Born to Read project. The Canadian Mid-Term Meeting was held in Ottawa in November. Our delegate, Debi Brown, represented us in discussions and decisions at the National table. Also Norma Stirling attended a QCGN (Quebec Community Groups Network) meeting held in Montreal. Norma is a member of their Governance Committee.
- 8. In February our Executives Appreciation Dinner for local Home and School Associations Executives was held Feb. 16th at Le Parchemin, in downtown Montreal. Once again this year it was a great success, with 33 people attending, despite winter weather. Laurie Betito (Dr Laurie) was our guest speaker. Dr.Laurie has an evening talk show (Passion) on CJAD. - 10. We continue to work with Regional Councils and local Home and Schools. Several schools were visited this year and help was offered to those who were merging with another school [Lester B. Pearson School Board Major School Change].
- 11. Michelle Armstrong left the QFHSA Board when she relocated to New Brunswick. She is presently the acting Central Vice President representing QFHSA and the Ontario Home & School until the CHSF Annual Meeting in June this year. Marlyn Brownrigg has accepted the nomination to be the CHSF delegate and represent QFHSA at the national table.

AUDITORS' REPORT

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

AS AT DECEMBER 31, 2006

1. NATURE AND PURPOSE OF THE ASSOCIATION

The Quebec Federation of Home and School Associations is an incorporated, independent, not-for-profit volunteer organization dedicated to enhancing the education and general well being of children and youth. It promotes the involvement of parents, students, educators and the community at large in the advancement of learning and acts as a voice for parents.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

- a) Revenue Recognition
- i) Membership fees are received mostly in the fall of each year and are taken into revenue over the period from the first of September to the following thirty first of August.
- ii) Program funding and grants are received from Federal and Provincial agencies for various donor fiscal years and are taken into revenue over each donor's fiscal year.
- iii) History and archive grant revenue is recognized to the extent of the costs which are expensed in any given year.
- b) Expensing Capital Purchases

The Association expenses all purchases of a capital nature.

c) Contributed Services

Volunteers at the Federation level contribute approximately 18,700 hours per year to assist the Federation in carrying out its activities. Because of the difficulty in determining their fair value, contributed services are not recognized in the financial statements.

3. FUNDS HELD IN TRUST

The Federation has funds in trust amounting to \$9,500 which represents the original contributions of \$ 5,000 made by four donors, plus a contribution of \$4,500 made in the current year by the family of one of the original donors. The donors have requested that the interest earned on the funds in trust be used to pay for awards given out at the annual general meeting. A committee is appointed to consider all submissions for the awards, and to choose the ones, they consider best, meet the guidelines.

CANADIAN HOME AND SCHOOL FEDERATION (CHSF) ANNUAL MEETING Report to the Annual General Meeting – April 28, 2007 Submitted by Elena Purser, delegate

The Canadian Home and School Federation held its Annual Meeting and Board of Directors meetings in Fredericton, New Brunswick, from June 1-3, 2006. All provinces were represented except for Newfoundland and Alberta. Elections for the positions of Central and Western Vice-presidents were held at this time and both Michelle Armstrong and Terri-Lynn Huddlestone were re-elected to these positions.

A presentation was given by André Lafargue, an audiologist, on the Phonic Ear system. This is a voice amplification system used in the classroom to improve the ability of students to hear the teacher's voice over the ambient classroom noise. Research provided showed that the use of "sound field amplification systems" improved reading levels, test scores and classroom participation while curbing behavioral issues and referrals for special education services. This system also lowered the amount of time off teachers took due to stress and vocal fatigue. Several school boards have begun implementing these systems in their schools including the Commission Scolaire de Montreal.

CHSF has entered into a partnership with the Media Awareness Network (MNet) to create and distribute a new parent-based educational program entitled "Parenting the Net Generation". The goals are to educate parents about the Internet and what their children may be doing online, to encourage active participation of parents in their children's Internet activities and to give parents tools to help their children make wise, safe and responsible online decisions. MNet delivered a training session to the CHSF Board and is providing a free one-year license for this workshop to CHSF and all provincial associations. A press release announcing this partnership will appear in September 2006.

A possible partnership between CHSF and CEA is being explored. This partnership would see CHSF organize and present a National Parenting Conference that would be funded by CEA and held in conjunction with their own AGM. Discussions are ongoing to finalize the details of undertaking such a large and expensive event.

During provincial sharing Wendy MacDonald, the delegate from P.E.I., discussed a new workshop that had been created by their provincial association. This workshop deals with the subject of Cyberbullying. P.E.I. kindly agreed to provide copies of the program to all the provincial delegates as it fit well with the MNet project.

At the awards dinner on June 3, the National Volunteer Award was presented by President Georgina Allen to the CHSF Secretary/Treasurer Bev Mullen.

The 2006 Mid-term meeting will be held in Ottawa on Nov. 25-28. The next AGM will be hosted by Saskatchewan in Saskatoon on June 6-9, 2007.

CANADIAN HOME AND SCHOOL FEDERATION MID-TERM MEETING - Dec 1/06

Report to the Annual General Meeting – April 28, 2007 Submitted by Debi Brown, QFHSA delegate

Since I sit on the CHSF Trust Fund Committee my participation at the Board table was brought into question and a motion was made to suspend a CHSF Standing Rule and allow me to be the voting delegate for Quebec at the table.

We started off the meeting with Provincial Sharing. Many provinces are now going through what QFHSA went through when mandatory Parent Committees were put in place by the Education Ministry. They are finding it difficult and worry about their membership. Prince Edward Island does not have this issue; the government has requested that they take the lead in finding ways of getting more parents involved in the school. They have also been given the money to accomplish it and have been encouraged to bring in community partners.

The QFHSA recommendations to CHSF were discussed the first day of meeting.

- The first motion, to amend Section 1B of the CHSF Standing Rules, was defeated.
- The second motion was presented and received as a friendly reminder. There was a reminder that the table at the time, including the Quebec Delegate, agreed to accept the "variance" at the time.
- The third motion, to change the name was withdrawn until an opinion as to the legal name of the fund was determined.

It was moved and carried that the Membership fee for 2007 - 2008 and 2008- 2009 remain at \$2,150. The board thanked those provinces that contributed amounts above that. CHSF is seeking additional funding sources. The board is seeking project ideas that could be turned into projects for grants.

The lack of a formal report from the Trust Fund was discussed. The Executive and/or the Treasurer were instructed to call a meeting in the absence of the Chair within a reasonable time.

We discussed the "Breakfast for Learning" Program. The Executive was charged to explore a partnership/endorsement and report the details to the Board.

We had a presentation by CAHPERD, seeking a partnership or links to parents.

The CHSF Annual Meeting 2007 is being hosted by Saskatchewan and will be held in Saskatoon. There were no resolutions brought forth or any nominations for Life Members. It was decided that the individual room bookings for the AGM were not going through the CHSF office, but would be made by the delegate or their provinces. The registration fee remains at \$150.00.

The Drug Wise Parent Resource Kit and the MNET Internet Safety workshops were discussed. Both are CHSF initiatives could be doing better. Several Provinces have not yet launched the MNET workshops and are not meeting the quotas of the Drug Wise Parent resource kit. QFHSA has trained several parent leaders to go into their communities to facilitate a workshop and distribute the Drug Wise Parent Resource Kit into the schools, but not enough to really make the impact we had hoped for. We are still in need of several more parent leaders to step forward and help get this well-researched kit into the schools for parents. Substance use among adolescent and youth is still a reality; this kit has the information on prevention, recovery and community initiatives and will assist parents on all levels.

The MNET Internet Safety workshop covers a large area of internet safety. It will explain what the average child is doing on the internet and what they are being exposed to. The QFHSA initial launch was scheduled for the Fall Conference, but had to be cancelled when the facilitator was unable to attend.

The license for the rights to hold these MNET workshops are sponsored by Bell Canada for the period of one year. This sponsorship was obtained by discussions between CHSF Central Vice-President Michelle Armstrong and Cathy Wing from MNET. Presently discussions with Bell Canada are being held to extend the sponsorship for another year with the updated presentation.

Marilyn Ashby has contacted CHSF pertaining to the two Health Awards she sponsors every year. She feels that the naming the two awards under the Health label are not working as well as it could. Marilyn does not feel that we recognize their full potential. Many areas are being left out, health has a very wide spectrum and most of it goes unnoticed. She requested we take a look at it and discuss what we feel it should be called.

The idea of "rebranding" home and school to avoid the confusion with "home schoolers" was discussed and it was decided that we need to think about rebranding the name to better identify who we are.



Central Vice President's Report

Report to the Annual General Meeting – April 28, 2007 Submitted by Michelle Armstrong, Central Vice-President for Quebec & Ontario

Annual General Meeting 2006

The Constitution Committee recommended the re-integration into the By-Laws, Article II, Membership and Fees, #7 and #8. These two sections were not included in the 1999 revision of the Constitution and By-Laws. The voting delegates approved this recommendation with motions proposed from the floor and passed to amend wording as indicated *in bold italics*.

ARTICLE II

- 7. Voluntary dissolution of a local Home & School Association requires the following:
 - a) A decision by an Association to disband can only be taken by a two-thirds vote of members present at a General Meeting, provided that there is a quorum at such a meeting in accordance with the Association's By-Laws, and that a formal notice of such an intent has been forwarded to all members, and that a motion to disband has been included in the announcement of the General Meeting.
 - b) The reasons for a proposal of dissolution shall be forwarded in writing to Federation at least sixty (60) days before any action is taken.
 - c) In the case of a decision to dissolve, all assets shall be sent to Federation to be held in trust until the association is re-constituted.
- 8. If a school is being closed, the following procedure shall be applicable:
 - a) Where there is a Maintaining Association connected with said school, this association shall be merged with the Maintaining Associations(s) of the school(s) to which the pupils are being transferred.
 - b) If there is no association at the new school(s) the association of the old school shall do its utmost to establish a Home & School Association at the new school(s).
 - c) School closings do not affect the membership status of individual parents.
 - d) The disposal of all *monetary* assets belonging to the local association connected with the school being closed shall be the responsibility of said association. If said association wishes it may place its *monetary* assets in trust with Quebec Federation pending final decision as to its disposal.

Thanks to Marg Funnel for completing the Canadian Heritage Minority Languages grant application and reports during the year. This is an extremely onerous task. We also thank Donna and Carol for all the assistance they offer to Marg. As Marg has indicated her desire to withdraw from this task, we are seeking someone to step up to the plate and take it over. Marg, I am sure, is ever willing to be a mentor to the volunteer.

We received a supplemental project grant from Canadian Heritage to do three community workshops and they were well received. I would like to thank Donna Norris and Donna Sauriol for their efforts and time to put together, execute and tie up loose ends of this project.

Generally speaking, the financial picture of QFHSA is not good. Our attempts to increase the program funding from Canadian Heritage failed, as did our attempts to secure private/corporate sponsorship. Our revenue sources are limited. Any ideas and offers of assistance are greatly appreciated.

Declining enrollment and closed schools have impacted our membership and thus the fees received. Expenses continue to rise faster than our revenues. The current composition of the Board of Directors, with seven Directors travelling from off-island, has increased costs.

As we move forward we must do some hard thinking about our finances. We have requested funding from Canadian Heritage to do a Human Resource Needs Assessment which will look at both the current volunteer and paid human resources of QFHSA and hopefully provide some recommendations as to how we can maintain this organization and make it viable.

In closing, I wish to put forth a request for an individual who would be willing to serve as the Chair of the Finance Committee with intent to becoming the Treasurer when I complete my term in 2008.

FALL CONFERENCE 2006

Was pleased to encounter a LifeLink - First Aid and CPR – representative among our displayers this past year. And it made me conscious, again, of the importance of telling people how important it is to upgrade their CPR skills. And I think the idea of incorporating a fun evening with friends and a session spent upgrading CPR skills is a great idea. And a trained CPR person will come to your house, what a bonus.

DESIGNATED TAXI for Young People

Young people don't always think ahead and the idea of there being a designated driver assigned at a party is not likely high on their list of must haves. ThinkFirst suggests you set up a taxi account, or buy cab vouchers, for your teenagers. Then, if they are placed in a difficult situation, they have an easy way out.

HEART DISEASE

This is now the leading cause of death for Canadian women. More women die of heart disease, or a stroke, than all forms of cancer. Specific factors impinging on women are given. Estrogen helps protect you between 12-50. 45% of women between 18-74 have increased LDL cholesterol; 80% of women 65-74 have high LDL cholesterol.

Pomerleau responded. He indicated that the contents of a school are the responsibility of the school board which manages them. Please see sections 266-273 of the Education Act (EA) regarding the ownership of schools and their contents. In the event of a major fire, robbery, vandalism, for example, the regime d'indemnisation compensates school boards for the loss of property. This plan came into effect in 1980 and is administered by the government. See details in section 474 of the Education Act and Measure 50550 of the school board budgetary rules, published yearly. School Closures and Mergers The demographic decline of the English speaking population continues to affect the school populations in school boards across Quebec. English school boards across Quebec experienced a decline of 2000 students in 2006-07. English Montreal School Board St-Ignatius of Loyola and St Patrick's Elementary School; Wagar High School 2006 -2007 Federick Banting and McLearon Elementary schools Carlyle and St. Gabriel's Elementary schools were spared. -St. Gabriel's (120 students) formed a Home and School Association in 2006.

2007 - St Joseph's Elementary will transfer to Huntingdon Academy The building will become the Greater Huntingdon Community Learning Centre - Franklin and Howick Elementary Schools have been given a 3-year reprieve but have to increase their enrollments by July 2009.

B. **QFHSA Publicity**

 "Getting to the Heart of It: Dealing With Bullying in the Classroom, Schools, and Cyberspace" (collaboration with McGill University's Centre for Educational Leadership) – March 27, 2006

Media releases were sent out to Montreal-area print, radio, and television outlets in March publicizing this conference. An article was featured in *The Gazette* profiling one of the panellists, David Knight who was bullied as a student.

• <u>AGM 2006</u>

Media releases were sent out in mid-April regarding the winners of the Buzzell Award, Gordon Paterson Award, Lewis Peace Prize, and the Pat Lewis Humanitarian Award. The media releases were sent out to Montreal-area print, radio, and television outlets, as well as 28 community newspapers. An article was featured in *The Gazette* profiling Phil Daigle and Owen Funnell – winners of the Buzzell Award. The CBC also did a report about the students at Thorndale School who won the Pat Lewis Humanitarian Award for the Montreal evening news.

• Executive Workshop – August 25, 2006

A workshop was given on media and publicity by Beverlee Bishundayal. Themes discussed in the workshop included: contributing to the *Home and School NEWS*, school newsletters, press releases, and dealing with the media. The newsletter/publicity kit was also updated and distributed to the schools represented that evening.

Fall Conference

Media releases were sent out in mid-October to Montreal-area print, radio, and television outlets, as well as 28 community newspapers across Quebec highlighting the Keynote Speaker, the launch of the Community Learning Centres project, and selection of workshops.

<u>National Addiction Awareness Week – November 19-25, 2006</u>
 Media releases were sent out to Montreal-area print, radio, and television outlets, as well as 28 community newspapers across Quebec highlighting CHSF's Substance Abuse Program. [Now known as the Drug Wise Parent Project]</u>

C. C.A.C.E. Meetings

 Meeting with CBC Radio and CBC Television – March 24, 2006 The CACE group discussed CBC's objectives for focusing on educational issues. The panel from CBC included staff members from the radio and television departments who expressed that education is a priority for their broadcasts. The panel discussed some situations that arise when covering educational issues such as: getting permission to air footage of children on television, having access to the schools/students, and how to train people as designated spokespersons for your educational institution or group.

D. Other Activities

- Editorial Board on Education With CBC April 4, 2006
 - A round-table discussion took place between CBC staff members from the radio and television departments and other groups/institutions in the education sector that were invited by the CBC. Beverlee Bishundayal and Wanda Leah Trineer represented QFHSA. Other panellists included teachers from elementary schools, principals, school board representatives, and CEGEP administrators. The focus in 2006 for CBC's "Montreal Matters" project was "SCHOOL". To quote from the CBC's website (http://www.cbc.ca/montrealmatters), Montreal Matters is a "comprehensive, revealing and thought-provoking exploration of an issue that matters to Montrealers. [...] This is an annual event that allows us to put our finger on the pulse of the community". Some of the issues discussed were: the relevance of literacy and phonetics skills throughout life (QFHSA's *Children's Literacy Resource Guide* was discussed and a copy was given to the CBC), vocational training, the disappearance of the "neighbourhood school", technology in the classroom, and the roles of teachers/principals.

MEMBERSHIP DEVELOPMENT [Grants/outreach/promotional materials] Report to the Annual General Meeting - April 28, 2007 <u>Submitted by Margaret Funnell</u>

Mandate:To prepare the application for the Department of Canadian Heritage [DCH]
Program funding; to participate at meetings of-and-communicate-with the Quebec
Community Groups Network [QCGN]; to prepare programs and outreach for off-
island communities; to apply for other projects that may from time to time be
funded by DCH; to produce new or revised promotional materials linked to
membership development. In addition a member sits on the Finance Committee.

QFHSA is a member of the QCGN whose five-year agreement with the Federal Government for the disbursement of the Official Languages Communities Support Program funds was renewed two years ago in April. QCGN members sign a contract with the Department of Canadian Heritage for the Program grant and for any Project grants. The Quebec Federation of Home and School Associations [QFHSA] President plus one other delegate represent QFHSA at the QCGN meetings across the province.

In April 2006, QFHSA again received DCH Program funding. The results-based management requirement means detailed reports are linked to the instalment payments given out during the year. QFHSA has applied for Program funding for 2007/2008, hoping for the means to provide increased staffing support.

The DCH Program funding, plus membership revenue, and a Ministry of Education, Leisure and Sport [MELS] grant are QFHSA's main sources of revenue. The Program funding allows QFHSA, amongst other outreach activities, to:

- bring parent members from off-island Home and School Associations in more remote areas to its workshops, Fall Conference and Annual General Meeting [AGM], to important Regional Council meetings at the time of the Fall Conference and AGM and to subsidize Regional Council meetings off-island.
- subsidize cost of parenting workshops and visits by QFHSA representatives, when
 requested, to local and potential Associations to describe our services and to offer
 support.
- publish four issues per year of the *Quebec Home & School NEWS*, provide important materials both for the Fall Conference and AGM, and to print and distribute important membership and promotional material including, this year, pamphlets on a revised *It's About Us, Raise with Praise* and *Why a Home and School is Important*.
- network with educational and community partners where we interact with parent representatives and volunteers, educational, social and health professionals, and other community personnel. This year networking included, amongst many activities, the Canadian Home and School Federation [CHSF] Annual Meeting in Fredericton, New Brunswick, and a mid-term meeting in Ottawa; Born to Read project and many other literacy activities; and the Network Lunches on Montreal's West Island where the community partners meet for talks on topics of importance to the well-being of youth.

QUEBEC COMMUNITY GROUPS NETWORK (QCGN)

Report to the Annual General Meeting – April 28, 2007 Based on the Report to the Board of Directors, December 2006, by Norma Stirling, Delegate

- Mandate: QFHSA is one of twenty-four English-language community organizations across Quebec belonging to QCGN. QFHSA is represented by its President and another delegate appointed by the Board of Directors. QCGN usually meets four times a year.
- <u>Update on Strategic and Operational Plan</u> Currently, QCGN (<u>www.qcgn.ca</u>) is undergoing major changes. When QCGN was founded in 1995 its raison d'être was to manage the funding agreements between the minority language groups in Quebec and the Dept. of Canadian Heritage. This is no longer the case. To help us better understand where QCGN is headed and why, the following is an excerpt from the draft Membership and Governance Policy paper which was accepted at the QCGN Meeting of Nov. 10-11, 2006.

"The QCGN was originally created to simply negotiate funding agreements with the Department of Canadian Heritage. For many years the QCGN has worked assiduously to intervene more effectively at the national and provincial levels to ensure that the Government of Canada designs and implements policies and programs that are in keeping with the letter and the spirit of the Official Languages Act. In the recent Collaboration Accord, signed by the Department of Canadian Heritage and the QCGN, the QCGN is identified as the principal interlocutor between the department and the ESCQ." Consequently, the government expects the QCGN to be a key player in representing the interests of the ESCQ in developing policies and programs that respond to their needs." *[ESCQ – English Speaking Communities of Quebec]

As is outlined in its three-year strategic plan adopted in May 2005, it is moving from a board of 24 members to a different structure, yet to be determined, that will truly represent and support the whole of the English Speaking Community of Quebec.

The following items are some of the other major initiatives under consideration:

- <u>Membership and Governance Committee</u> The structure that the QCGN will adopt is under study by a Membership and Governance Committee.
- <u>HSSNPI</u> "The goal of the Health and Social Services Networking and Partnership Initiative (HSSNPI) is to build the networking and partnership capacities of English-speaking minority communities in Québec so as to improve access to health and social services in English." (<u>www.qcgn.ca</u> HSSNPI Program).
 The CHSSN (Community Health &Social Services Network) database is now available from their website. (<u>www.chssn.org</u>)
- <u>Greater Montreal Community Development Initiative</u> This is an endeavor by QCGN to provide a voice to the English Community on the island of Montreal in the absence of Alliance Quebec.

- <u>Grants & Contributions Task Force –</u> In Feb.2006 the federal government introduced Bill C-2, The Federal Accountability Act, and in June 2006 the Treasury Board announced a Blue Ribbon Panel on Grants and Contributions This unit is working on ways to advise the government on improvements to the application and reporting requirements in order to help members achieve the best balance between accountability and efficiency. One of the ideas being explored is multi-year funding.
- <u>Meeting with Officials of Canadian Heritage</u> Beverley Caplan assured the Board that there is a new government commitment to linguistic duality and consequently to the ESCQ.
 a) Josee Vernier is the *Minister of International Cooperation and La Francophonie and Official Languages*. This is a new cabinet post.

b) The Canada-Quebec Agreement for Education has been signed with MELS. By this agreement, the government of Canada will match MEL's funds over the four years from 2005 to 2009. This gives Quebec a maximum of \$56,497,500 per year for 4 years up to a total of \$ 225,990,000 to be spent on teaching of English as a second language and on the minority English education.

- <u>Community Learning Centers</u>- A presentation was made on behalf of MELS by Peter Riordon formerly with the QESBA. The information was the same as that presented at our Fall Conference by Noel Burke.
- By bringing together the diverse members of Quebec's English-speaking community, the **Community Table** provides a strong mechanism for voicing our opinions, sharing our experiences and influencing policy. With a clearer understanding of our needs, the Government Table represented by Human Resources Development Canada and other government partners can better coordinate the policies and programs designed to support the English-speaking minority."
- <u>School Closures: Resources for Quality Education: Immigration</u> The QFHSA Resolution 2006/1 on Wider Access to English Education was received and the QCGN is considering their approach to these issues, to be discussed at the next meeting. It was noted that in Quebec, 10.000 maternal English students were attending French Language schools. (According to MELS figures, this could be closer to 17-18 thousand.) Better programs are drawing English students into the French system. The English system does not have the funds to offer these programs. It should be noted that in other provinces the francophone leaders are able to mobilize all levels of those communities, but they have a finely tuned organization to do so. QCGN is working towards that goal.

Fifteen Community Learning Centres (CLC) were initiated by the Minister of Education, Leisure and Sport on December 6, 2006 and are under the supervision of LEARN (Leading English Education and Resource Network). The CLCs are located among the nine English school boards, Littoral School Board and Jewish Day Schools Association.

Project Goal

"To support and monitor the development of a diversified group of Community Learning Centres (CLC) which would become hubs for education and community development in the English-speaking community and serve as models for future practice."

Budget A total of \$5.3 million over 3 years:

\$2.5 million has been allotted through the Quebec/Canada funding for minority language education initiative. These funds must be matched in cash or in kind for the total of \$5.3 million. These funds will cover the 15 projects, video conferencing systems, CLC staffing (LEARN), Professional Development and conferences.

QFHSA and the Community Learning Centres

- June 29 attended official launch of the project at Aeroport Hilton, Montreal
- August 28 Board of Directors Meeting agrees to involvement in the project and a letter to be sent to local associations encouraging participation. This was done.
- August 30 QFHSA's Potential for Involvement Donna Norris, Brian Rock, Leah Trineer, Carol Ohlin and Marion Daigle brainstormed on the parental involvement support we might offer.
- October 21, 2006 Fall Conference Keynote Speaker - Noel Burke, Assistant Deputy Minister, MELS: *Community Learning Centres: The Future of English Schooling in Quebec* Workshop – follow up on morning session led by Linton Garner, Community Development Agent.
- December 6 Launch by MELS at James Lyng High School, Montreal Fifteen schools chosen by a Select Committee from applicants among the nine English School Boards, Littoral School Board and Jewish Day Schools.
- February 14, 2007 Provincial Resource Committee Teleconference meeting of a group of English language community organizations to be involved with CLC network
