# QFHSA 64<sup>th</sup> ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING – May 3, 2008 BUSINESS MEETING PROCEDURE

- The Annual General Meeting [AGM] is conducted in accordance with our Constitution, By-Laws and Standing Rules. In the case of any procedural dispute reference shall be made to Robert's Rules of Order Revised.
- 2. Each official voting delegate of each Member Association shall have one vote on any question which comes before the meeting, except for associations more than 250 kilometers from Montreal. Such Associations will still be entitled to three votes, expressed either as an identical or divided vote. Application for such privilege is to be presented in writing to the Executive Secretary prior to the start of the business portion of the Annual General Meeting.
- The quorum for transaction of business at the Annual General Meeting shall be twenty-five percent [25%] of Member Associations in good standing, represented by their official representatives or accredited alternates.
- 4. Voting shall be by ballot or show of hands. All questions shall be decided by a majority of those present and entitled to vote, except those which require a two-thirds [2/3] majority. On ballot votes, the votes of each association shall be handed in by the voting delegates of each association individually but at the same time. Counting of the votes shall be done by non-voting participants.
- 5. A delegate may not speak for more than two [2] minutes on any question under discussion, nor more than twice on any particular motion or resolution. Any person wishing to speak needs to stand and come to the microphone (if we have one).
- 6. Amendments to the Constitution and By-Laws require a two-thirds [2/3] vote of the delegates present and entitled to vote. Notice of the proposed amendments must have been mailed to all Member Associations at least ten [10] weeks prior to the meeting. Modifications to these proposed amendments received two [2] weeks before the AGM will be considered, but no modification may be made from the floor.
- 7. Resolutions to the Annual General Meeting must have been circulated to the Member Associations eight [8] weeks prior to the Annual General Meeting. Resolutions received after the date specified will be presented as Emergency Resolutions only after consideration by the Chairman of the meeting and the Resolutions Committee. Delegates presenting resolutions are reminded that they must be present at the time designated on the agenda for the presentation of their resolution. The presenting party may speak to the resolution, or amendments thereto, for not more than FIVE [5] minutes. In addition to amendments received two weeks before the AGM there may be amendments emanating from the caucus session held earlier, but no further amendments may be made from the floor.

# PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE

#### **PRINCIPLES**

- Justice and Courtesy for all
- One thing at a time
- Recognition of the will of the majority
- Protection of the rights of the minority

#### **PURPOSE**

✓ To conduct business in an orderly and democratic manner by one or more of the following ways: ✓ communications

✓ committee reports

✓ motions or resolutions

To participate effectively in the proceedings of meetings, each person needs to know the fundamentals of partiamentary procedure.

#### THE MAIN MOTION

#### WHAT IS A MOTION?

A main motion introduces a new item of business; it is a proposal that the group take a certain action. It is the basis of all discussion and states the bounds of discussion. All remarks pertain directly to the contents of the motion on the floor. The making of the motion comes first, discussion follows. A subsidiary motion qualifies the main motion or proposes an alternate timetable for consideration.

#### WHEN IS A MOTION NEEDED?

- It forms a basis for discussion on all major decisions of the group.
- When in doubt, ask for a motion to be proposed.
- Motions must be made on all matters involving <u>finances</u> not already included in the budget as approved.
- On minor matters, a question may be resolved by the chairman 'taking the sense of the meeting'.
- The decision must be clearly stated for the secretary to report in the minutes as well as for the benefit of the members

#### THE STEPS TO PRESENTING A MOTION ARE:

- 1. member stands or raises a hand and says: "Madame Chairman/Mr. Chairman."
  - The chairman recognizes the speaker by name.
- 2. The member says, "I move that ...", stating or reading a motion.
- 3. Another raises a hand to be identified by the chairman, then says:

  "I second the motion." The seconder believes the motion should be discussed, but may not necessarily be in favour of it.
- 5. The mover usually speaks first, giving the reasons for the motion. The opportunity to speak to the motion must be given to anyone who wishes to speak to or oppose the motion. Discussion should be addressed to the chairman.
- 6. At the end of the discussion, the chairman says:
  - "If there is no further discussion . . . . . . . " or "Are you ready for the question?" Then:
  - "The motion is that . . . . "
  - "All in favour?" (pau
    - (pause while the count is taken by the secretary)
  - "Opposed?" (pause while the count is taken by the secretary)

"Abstentions?" (pause while the count is taken by the secretary)
"The motion is carried" (or is defeated).

7. If anyone calls "Division" (questions the voice vote), the chair calls for a show of hands or a standing vote: "All in favour raise your hand. All opposed ... " If a majority request it, the vote may be taken by ballot. A "ballot vote" is the recommended procedure for election of officers and for resolving a contentious issue.

#### SUBSIDIARY MOTIONS

AMENDMENTS CHANGE MOTIONS: To qualify the idea of a motion, but not to change the subject or the intent of the main motion.

1. "I move to amend the motion by . . . . ":

Inserting or adding a word, phrase or sentence.

Striking out a word, phrase or sentence.

Striking out and inserting a word or phrase or substituting a sentence or paragraph.

- 2. "I second the motion to amend."
- 3. "It has been proposed to amend the motion to read as follows...."

  The chairman states the main motion and the amendment so the group will understand how the amendment changes the motion. Amendment is handled in the same way as a motion with:

Discussion: "Is there any discussion?"

Question: "If there is no further discussion, the amendment is . . . . "

Vote: "All in favour of the amendment . . . . "

Chairman announces the outcome:

"The amendment is carried (or defeated)."
"The motion now before the meeting is . . . ."

(states the motion plus the amendment(s) if it carried)

In dealing with motions, the vote is taken first on the amendment. If passed, the amended motion is voted on. If the amendment is defeated, the main motion in its original form is voted on.

TO REFER: A question is referred to committee for further study and to submit a recommendation to the group at a later time.

TO TABLE: To set the matter aside until someone moves to reconsider it.

TO POSTPONE DEFINITELY: Postpone discussion until more facts are available.

TO POSTPONE INDEFINITELY: The motion may not be considered again that year.

Recommended useful resource materials available for reference during a meeting: A copy of your organization's Constitution and By-Laws. Robert's Rules of Order or other guide to basic rules of parliamentary procedure.

# PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Report to the Annual General Meeting – May 3, 2008 Submitted by Debi Brown, President

The theme for 2006-2007 was Home, School, Community: The Power of Belonging

The theme for this coming year will be: Building Partnerships

- At our 2007 Annual Meeting we enjoyed keynote speaker, Maureen Morris, President, Quebec Provincial Association of Teachers on "The Power of Belonging." We welcomed Diana Donnelly, Carol Meindl and Mary Polychronas as new Directors to our Board.
- 2. At the May Board of Directors meeting the President shared her philosophy that a non-profit Board should be functional, setting policy not doing administration. This followed on the results of a Human Resources Needs Assessment Report that was conducted with funding from Canadian Heritage Official Languages Office. It was agreed that the Board needed to concentrate its efforts on what it does well and literacy stands out as our current success.
- 3. In June Donna Norris attend the QCGN Annual Meeting where she was elected to the Board of Directors. Marlyn Brownrigg attended the CHSF Annual Meeting in Saskatoon as QFHSA representative.
- 4. At the July Board of Directors meeting the President indicated that she preferred a 30 45 minutes orientation session on a designated topic at each meeting rather that covering everything in one meeting. The primary target for Group Affiliate membership was identified.
- 5. In September QFHSA held Executive Workshops for the local associations at the provincial office. It was well-attended and the following workshops were given: Presidents (and Vice Presidents), Treasurers, Membership Chairs, Newsletters, Media and Public Relations and How to set up a Born to Read program.
- 6. In September QFHSA was informed by Canadian Heritage that they would be providing funding for the position of Executive Director. A Personnel Committee was struck and interviews were conducted in late November. Unfortunately, the chosen candidates chose not to accept the position. The search continues.
- 7. Updated Directors' manuals were distributed at the September meeting. The Treasurer presented his five goals/key ideas for the Finance Committee.
- 8. In October the Board received the <u>Report on the Greater Montreal Community</u> Development Initiative.
- 9. In January, Leah Trineer and Debi Brown met with the Minister of Education to discuss the Governance of School Boards. It was a very positive meeting and the exchange of ideas was well received.
- 10. In January, Harold Spanier was successful in his application, on behalf of QFHSA, in securing a City of Montréal Business Tax rebate.
- 11. In February, Rickhey Margolese and Debi Brown attended a conference organized by QCGN themed <u>Community Revitalization</u>: <u>Trends and Opportunities for the Englishspeaking Communities in Quebec.</u>
- 12. In March Debi Brown and Donna Norris met with Maureen Morris, President of QPAT.

- 13. Throughout the year there were ongoing discussions and meetings with Canadian Heritage Official Languages Office.
- 14. We continue to work with local Home and Schools and Regional Councils. Several schools were visited this year and many issues were addressed.

Throughout the year the QFHSA Board of Directors has watched and supported the parents' right to choose the language of instruction for their children. Following the Leave to Appeal launched by the Provincial Government in the Case of Bill 104, the Board of Directors started a fund raising campaign on behalf of the defendants in the case before the Supreme Court of Canada. Support of this cause is a natural result of the ongoing resolutions of QFHSA in its support of the Right to Wider Access to English Education in Quebec. This campaign has resulted in media attention for the QFHSA and the President has been interviewed by the Montreal Gazette, CJAD and CBC Radio Montreal. All are encouraged to follow this issue and support the campaign. Mr. Brent Tyler, Counsel in this court case, will be the keynote speaker at the 2008 Annual Meeting. The Rights Committee is leading the charge on behalf of the QFHSA.

I would like to acknowledge and thank Donna Norris, Leah Trineer, Beverlee Bishundayal, Oliver Cole, Marlyn Brownrigg, Diana Donnelly, Anne MacWhirter, Carol Meindl, Mary Polychronas, Brian Rock, Barbara Schnider, Barbara Smith and Sheila Splane for their dedication and hard work this past year.

I would also like to thank our resource persons, without whom much work would not have been done: Rickhey Margolese, Donald Smith, Harold Spanier, Shirley Straughton, Norma Stirling, Marion Daigle, Sylvia Adams, Barbara Milne-Smith and Pat Waters.

And I would be very remiss if I did not thank our hard working and supportive QHFSA staff, Donna Sauriol and Carol Ohlin. They are always at the end of the telephone, and email, keeping the Board of Directors informed and up-to-date with the issues. They are key to making the organization run smoothly.

#### **AUDITORS' REPORT**

To the Members of QUEBEC FEDERATION OF HOME AND SCHOOL ASSOCIATIONS

We have audited the statement of financial position of Quebec Federation of Home and School Associations (Federation) as at December 31, 2007, and the statements of revenues and expenses and cash flow for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Federation management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

Except as explained in the following paragraph, we conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform an audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation.

In common with many charitable organizations, the Federation derives revenues and contributions from various sources, the completeness of the non-government revenue and contributions are not susceptible to complete audit verification. Accordingly, our verification of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the Federation and we were not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to revenues and net assets.

In our opinion, except for the effect of adjustments, if any, which we might have determined to be necessary had we been able to satisfy ourselves concerning the completeness of the non-government revenues and contributions referred to in the preceding paragraph, these financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Federation as at December 31, 2007, and the results of their operations and their cash flow for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles.

# AS AT DECEMBER 31, 2007

#### 1. NATURE AND PURPOSE OF THE ASSOCIATION

The Quebec Federation of Home and School Associations is an incorporated, independent, not-for-profit volunteer organization dedicated to enhancing the education and general well being of children and youth. It promotes the involvement of parents, students, educators and the community at large in the advancement of learning and acts as a voice for parents.

# 2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

# a) Revenue Recognition

- i) Membership fees are received mostly in the fall of each year and are taken into revenue over the period from the first of September to the following thirty first of August.
- ii) Program funding and grants are received from Federal and Provincial agencies for various donor fiscal years and are taken into revenue over each donor's fiscal year.
- iii) History and archive grant revenue is recognized to the extent of the costs which are expensed in any given year.

# b) Expensing Capital Purchases

The Association expenses all purchases of a capital nature.

# c) Contributed Services

Volunteers at the Federation level contribute approximately 19,100 hours per year to assist the Federation in carrying out its activities. Because of the difficulty in determining their fair value, contributed services are not recognized in the financial statements.

# 3. FUNDS HELD IN TRUST

The Federation has funds in trust amounting to \$9,500. The donors have requested that the interest earned on the funds in trust be used to pay for awards given out at the annual general meeting. A committee is appointed to consider all submissions for the awards, and to choose the ones, they consider best, meet the guidelines.

# CHSF Spring Board Meeting and Annual Meeting 2007

The CHSF spring board meeting and 2007 Annual Meeting was held in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, from June 7<sup>th</sup> to 9<sup>th</sup>, 2007.

The CHSF board had decided to review 25% of the statement of policy annually in order to keep policies current. Therefore, a portion of each bi-annual board meeting is dedicated to reviewing the constitution and by-laws. These revisions are then voted on at the Annual Meeting. Other items on the agenda included the Drug Wise project with Health Canada, future partnerships, trust fund issues, various committee responsibilities, and the Marilyn Ashby Citizenship/Advocacy Awards.

# Mid-Term Meeting November 8th - November 10th, 2007

Every year the mid-term meeting is held in Ottawa where the CHSF office is located. The agenda for this three-day business meeting included: constitution and by-laws, standing rules, executive/committee reports, budget, and housekeeping items. The following projects and proposals were discussed: DrugWise Parents project, video games rating, Weight of the World, and Parenting the Net.

The QFHSA firearms resolution passed at the 2007 QFHSA AGM was approved by the CHSF board as was the OFHSA (Ontario) resolution on a National Sex Offender Registry. These resolutions will now return to the provincial boards, and be voted on at the CHSF 2008 Annual Meeting.

Board members also participated in a strategic planning session, discussed violence in schools, and school bus safety. Bill Jeffery of the <u>Centre for Science in the Public Interest</u> made a presentation on school nutrition policies across Canada.

Provincial sharing is an important part of both business meetings. These sessions raise awareness of initiatives and challenges facing parents, Home and School organizations, and educators in all provinces.

# Activities 2007-08

- 1. <u>Gazette Raise-a-Reader Grant (2006)</u> A generous grant of \$9,707 was received in April 2007. These funds have been used to support literacy projects and for the purchase of books and other educational resources for families, schools and community groups throughout the province. Born to Read bags of books and library resources are among the most requested. Mailings have gone to: Ayers Cliff, North Hatley, St. Paul's River, La Tabatière, Chevery, Harrington Harbour, Témiscaming, Sherbrooke, New Carlisle, Kegaska, Hopetown, Gaspé, On Island: books and other resources have gone to Dawson Community Centre, Edgewater and Roslyn Elementary Schools and Lindsay Place High School.
- 2. <u>Gazette Raise-a-Reader Grant (2007)</u>
  QFHSA has been chosen as one of the recipients of funds from the Montreal Gazette Raise-a-Reader campaign held on September 27, 2007, in downtown Montreal.
- 3. <u>Geoff Kelley, MNA Jacques-Cartier</u>, once again has donated \$500 to cover mailing costs. We are grateful for his continuing support for our literacy initiatives.
- 4. <u>Donation-in-Kind Tembee Paperboard Group</u>. A generous donation of hundreds of National Wildlife Federation magazines for pre-school children. They have been distributed to daycares, community preschool groups and schools throughout Quebec.
- 5. <u>June 25-27, 2007 Literacy and Libraries: Making it Work</u> at the Centre for Literacy of Quebec at Dawson College. Dorothy Nixon and Marion Daigle were among 60 librarians

and adult literacy providers from across Canada, the U.K., USA and Australia. It was an intensive and informative institute sharing ideas and activities dedicated to bringing an egalitarian system of library services for all ages. A full report appeared in the September 2007 issue of the QFHSA NEWS.

- 6. Lindsay Place High School Special Literacy Project
  - Diana Donnelly, President of LPHS Home & School Association, and Marion Daigle are assisting the teachers with funding for resources to help selected Secondary 2 and 3 mainstream students who are experiencing reading difficulties. This is a very successful program. Students also volunteered to 'hawk' newspapers for the 2007 Gazette Raise-a-Read campaign on September 27. They were a hit!
- 7. <u>January 27/08 Family Literacy Day</u> Many schools and communities hold literacy events during the week and on January 27. Edgewater, Roslyn and Mecatina schools held Born to Read celebrations during the week. Others hold events during the year.
- 8. Children's Literacy Resource Guide
  - In 2007 four new topics were added:
    - √ The Sticks and Stones of Cyberspace
    - $\sqrt{Babies}$ , Toddlers and TV
    - √ Teenagers and the Environment
    - √ Talking to Children about the Environment

A CD 2007 was completed in November. The cost for either a print copy or CD is \$20 which includes shipping and handling.

- 9. Community Learning Centres (CLC)
  - Harold Spanier, QFHSA liaison for the new CLC, works with the Literacy Committee on the CLC needs where literacy activity is concerned. Community Learning Centres include: Riverview (Verdun), Mecatina, Netagamiou and St. Paul's River (Lower North Shore), Baie Comeau (North Shore), Gaspé-Percé (Gaspé).

    October 16 Harold Spanier and Marion Daigle participated in a Lower North Shore telephone conference on a wide range of topics.
- 10. October 27 Fall Conference workshop Get a Head Start on Learning Raise-a-Reader. Harold Spanier, Casey Stilwell (Edgewater) and Marion Daigle highlighted literacy awareness issues, science and media and how the Children's Literacy Resource Guide can be used as an effective tool in a local membership campaign.
- 11. Community events, schools visits, etc.
  - March 28, 2007 Rotary Club of Westmount Marion Daigle was guest speaker on literacy.
  - April 1, 2007 Quebec Anglophone Heritage Summit

    Dorothy Nixon and Marion Daigle met many members of the multicultural community organizations with links to the anglophone community.

- April 28, 2007 Boys Day Out A community event in NDG for boys 8-12 and their parents. Organized by Pat (Lp) Camozzi, singer/songwriter/author, assisted by Harold Spanier from QFHSA.
- <u>July 26, 2007 Dawson Community Centre</u> Harold Spanier and Marion Daigle met with Barbara Lasky of the Moms & Tots program regarding Born to Read.
- <u>September 2007 Giant Book Sale</u> Le Faubourg, sponsored by the Centre for Literacy of Quebec. QFHSA was, once again, a recipient of a \$400 gift certificate towards the purchase of books. Books went to schools, community groups and as book awards at the Fall Conference. Donna Sauriol and Marion Daigle made the book purchases.
- September 26, 2007 Atwater Library and Computer Centre. Marion Daigle represented QFHSA at the launch of the first of 4 satellite adult literacy collections sponsored by the Centre for Literacy of Quebec.

The Greater Montreal Community Development Initiative (GMCDI) is a project that aims to mobilize community leadership around issues that affect the English-speaking communities of Montreal.

The QCGN created a **Youth Standing Committee** in this proactive approach of mobilizing the English speaking youth of Quebec communities. The diversity of our youth presents challenges. However, they are our greatest assets and need to be developed. The QCGN intends to create partnerships with governmental agencies, key stakeholders and community organizations to build the necessary infrastructure for the youth of the English speaking communities.

The Executive Director Network was also put in place where all member organizations that like to participate can do so. This network is crucial to networking information and receiving pertinent information that can be beneficial for all organizations.

# The vitality of the English-speaking communities of Quebec Conference

The weekend of February 29 to March 2, 2008, QCGN hosted a conference, with funding from Canadian Heritage, at the Université de Montréal. The theme was Community Revitalization: Trends and Opportunities for the English-speaking Communities of Quebec. Participants and speakers included former and current Commissioners of Official Languages Victor Goldbloom and Graham Fraser; provincial Minister of Immigration and Cultural Communities Yolande James; André Pratt of La Presse; Jack Jedwab of the Association for Canadian Studies; Professor Richard Bourhis, Director of the Centre d'études ethniques des universities montréalaises, the media, and many leaders of the English and French communities. Approximately 250 people attended. QFHSA was represented by Debi Brown and Rickhey Margolese. In addition, Donna Norris was there as a Director of QCGN and Brian Rock, a delegate from the North Shore Communities Association. A summary of the conference will be published in a book.

At the Annual General Meeting in June 2008 the QCGN will welcome additional members and these new members as well as the current members will have the opportunity to be nominated to the QCGN Board of Directors at the next AGM in 2009.

The first resolution was considered as a *caucus of the whole* in order to involve everyone in the discussion. Resolutions 2, 3 and 5 were considered in separate caucuses and 4 and 6 were combined for caucus discussion.

There were no amendments to any of the resolutions themselves, but there were some added destinations.

#### Disposition of 2007 Resolutions

Following the adoption of the resolutions at the Annual General Meeting, French translations were done and bilingual versions, with covering letters, were mailed to the appropriate destinations.

During the summer, President Debi Brown and Vice President Marlyn Brownrigg met with the new Associate Deputy Minister for English Education, Leo La France, to discuss some of our concerns.

The most significant reaction to our resolutions was to the one on Firearms Control. The Government of Quebec forwarded it to the Minister of Justice & Public Security. Reply from them was an in depth analysis of our resolution. Then, early in January, we received a very comprehensive reply from Stockwell Day, Minister of Public Safety, Canada. His response is being printed in the March 2008 issue of the NEWS.

# Statement of Policy (as of 2007)

#### EDUCATION #36

Adequate and sufficient funds and teacher training be allotted when curriculum is requirements (2007/3).

## EDUCATION #42

Materials and teacher training be available as soon as new curriculum (2001/03); <u>new curriculum be implemented only after textbooks have been approved and translated (2007/2).</u>

# EDUCATION – SYSTEM #7

Access for English-speaking residents within a reasonable distance in rural areas (1983/3; updated 1998/4); ensure all English speaking residents have access to current network of English schools within a reasonable distance (2007/04).

## EDUCATION – SYSTEM #22

That there be a permanent linguistic voters list for School Board elections (2005/5); <u>said</u> list to be dependent on School Board attended by their children, and that the parents remain on this list after their children have finished their secondary education (2007/6).

#### SAFETY #11

Gun ownership is a privilege, not a right, and gun ownership should be linked to a rigid screening process; with improved mandatory program of education, military assault weapons be banned, all firearms be registered, sale of ammunition be controlled (2007/5).

# COMMUNITY LEARNING CENTRES (CLC) Submitted by Harold Spanier, CLC liaison

Your Federation is involved!

The CLC (Community Learning Centres) is a formal partnership of one or more schools, public or private agencies, and community groups, working together for the benefit of students, families and community, particularly for English language education and community development. The Québec-Canada Entente for Minority Language Education funds it within a three-year mandate.

One element is to drop video conference/ Internet technology into the CLC site. The technology is a tool to share innovation and opportunities. For example, distance learning and tele-health have potential to bring opportunities to the community.

As of this writing, there are about 22 Quebec CLCs in rural and urban communities.

It is believed that the presence in the community of a CLC results in strengthening community engagement, which leads to improved student learning, stronger families and healthier communities.

Surveys of Quebec CLCs indicates that they are interested in issues dealing with the family, and it has been envisioned that in the future, each CLC would have a family centre.

In November 2007, it was proposed that Quebec Federation of Home and School Associations be a lead partner to create a model for the family centre. It was suggested that we begin by offering a package of workshops. We would animate workshops and distribute the content to the CLC network using the videoconferencing technology.
