Coasters Association 2020 AGM

On Thursday March 19th from 9:00 to 11:30 am the Coasters 25th Annual General Meeting & 31st Anniversary, took place via teleconference. The original date was March 24th, from 2:00 to 4:00 pm, and in normal circumstances the AGM would have taken place at St. Paul's School with local physical attendance and also by video conference or Zoom for those participants who were on the coast and off the coast . However, these were not average circumstances, as we were trying to navigate a serious pandemic. Nevertheless, given the current

serious situation regarding Covid-19, the AGM was successful. Participation was comprised of (representatives from off coast, such as Canadian Heritage, QCGN, CEDEC, Q'uanglo Communications, and JCW Education Consulting, the Coasters Auditor. Also regional and local representation from Commission Scolaire du Littoral, CISSS, Mayor from Golfe Saint Laurent., CJAS, our Board of Directors and staff, as well as residents from various communities on the Lower North Shore. Given the time frame for the meeting, many issues were discussed, and resolutions were passed. The minutes will be produced shortly and available for review once completed.



02 RESTRUCTURING

The Coasters Association has the objective of protecting and furthering the interests of the population and contribute to the vitality of the region. Our mission is to develop knowledge of the needs and expectations of the sixteen communities on the Lower North Shore and act in partnership with community leaders, organizations and stakeholders to design and deliver community strategies, programs and services which respond to the region's development challenges and which profile the unique cultural and natural resources of the region.

The Coasters Association foster and support five (5) principle goals. One (1) of those goals is to develop, diversify, and sustain the LNS Economy and retain youth. the Consequently, Coasters established the Northern Research Center (NRC), a division aimed at building entrepreneurship in the region. A focus of the NRC is to support SME's through business incubation. Business incubation is how the Coaster Association supports the Lower North Shore Bio Products Solidarity Cooperative. The Research Center Northern is managed by an Advisory Committee of the Coasters Association.

Nurturina and enhancing community vitality and leadership the social and promoting development of vulnerable groupings are also principle goals of the Coasters. It is in this respect that the Wellness Center (WC) was established. A division aimed at providing residents of the Lower North Shore an abundance of activities programs, and information to youth, seniors, and those with loss of autonomy. In this issue of the newsletter the Coasters is pleased to provide an update of the Northern Research Center and Wellness Center.



A standard research center focuses primarily on the investigation of novel ideas and questions in science, social science, business, engineering, etc. and attempts to provide answers and theories for these areas. Research centers can be seen as "innovation pumps" where they receive influents such as research funds, experts and ideas which churn out concepts, laws, studies and

applications to be of use to the public and private sectors. While this is one of the objectives at the Northern Research Center of the Coaster's Association, it is not its sole objective. Given the region's dynamics, the NRC takes an innovative approach in incorporating the structure of a research center into developing the social and economic fabrics of communities.

At the time of its creation in 2014, when it was formerly known as the Lower North Shore Research Facility, the Coasters Association consulted with the communities of the Lower North Shore (LNS). Eleven (11) primary industries were defined which had been a part of the Lower North Shore's socio-economic fabric for the past 40 years. The industries identified were the following:




Our Services



Following an ecosystemic approach model, the team listened and incorporated feedback from the communities of the LNS about what they believed was working and where they were struggling. The Coasters team also did extensive research into any of the feasibility studies that were carried out since the 1970's to determine previous recommendations and opportunities that were highlighted. This first chronicle of research was where the Northern Research Center was founded.

Since then, strategic partnerships with universities, other research institutions (CCTT's), private enterprises and non-profits have been created to solidify the base of the NRC. Along with these partnerships, a variety of professionals were recruited. They, along with the current staff at the Coasters, were hired and mandated to provide structure, support and a means to offer a variety of services and programs that make the research center unique.

The pillars will give you a sense of how to work toward your optimal wellness, but it's by no means prescriptive. The path to wellness is not one-size-fits-all.

CARROTS

Ensure your soil is soft and not compacted. Don't plant too close together, they need space to grow, about 2 to 3 inches between each carrot.



Best left for a fall harvest They grow big, don't try to crowd a cabbage!




Remember to set up a trellis or stand when planting cucumbers, they like to climb. Harvest as soon as they reach the size you want.



Check to see if the bush beans or pole beans, pole beans will need a trellis! They like warmth, so don't plant too early

POTATOES

Always let seed potatoes sprout in a cool room before planting. For larger potatoes be sure to leave ample space between each, and don't pack them in the soil too tightly.



It is very important to keep in mind the short growing season we have here on the coast when selecting your seeds. Always check the maturation period, which means how long it will take for the seed to become a full grown plant, in our case, the smaller that number the better chance of it producing high quality plants.

Stick to a watering schedule, especially while the fruit are developing. Pinch off your inferior stems for better and bigger tomatoes

IOMATOES




Plant a lot, they can be kept and eaten all through the fall and winter. Rutabaga are planted and harvested later in the growing season, they are also known as winter turnip!



Can be planted before the last frost, they dont mind. Don't just grow beets for their roots, use greens in cooking



Got sunshine? The more the better They need pollination, hope for bees or do it yourself!



No seeds needed, just plant the white bulb off scallions you bought at the store. Don't plant too many, they grow and regrow quickly all summer long
