Our young filmmakers & Project R.E.E.L. (Redefining Expression, Education, and Leadership)

On February 29, the group returned from seven exciting days of filming in New York City. During the week, the youth interviewed numerous inspiring individuals from a variety of community- based organizations. Among these, the group spent time with students from the Brooklyn 'Freedom School', conscious artists from the 'Black Out Arts Collective', politically active Bronx DJ's from 'Rise Up Radio', activists from 'Justice for Youth Coalition' and 'Global Action Project' and student organizers from Columbia University. Throughout the week, the group was exposed to a wide variety of individuals and experiences, each one offering a wonderful opportunity to expand the world view and understanding of the youth. Even

more exciting, however, is the extent to which the youth took advantage of these opportunities- following each new encounter, the youth would leave engaged in animated discussions (both formal and informal) about their experiences, reactions and perceptions. In all, the week was an amazing experience (according to both animators and participants). It was a chance to experience and learn about different cultures, different struggles and different perspectives. Upon returning from New York (on February 29) the groups completed filming in Montreal and have since begun the process of editing their film. This phase will likely last until the beginning of May.
