QUEBEC TO APPEAL FORGET DECISION

Calling the government's decision "petty and provocative", Alliance Quebec has promised all necessary support and assistance to Nancy Forget in defending against the planned Quebec government appeal to the Supreme Court.

Ms. Forget, a nursing assistant and her lawyer, Julius Grey (a member of Alliance Quebec's legal committee) successfully challenged the legality of French testing for professionals under Bill 101.

On August 31, the Quebec Court of Appeal ruled that the testing regulations violate the Quebec Charter of Rights and Freedom by discriminating on the basis of language.

There is an element of irony in the government's decision to appeal, since it will, in effect, be challenging its own human rights legislation - the Charter of Rights and Freedoms.

Alliance Quebec has supported and represented Ms. Forget throughout her legal battle; a fight she initiated in 1981 after losing her job as a consequence of failing the written portion of the language test. She had passed the oral.

DEMOGRAPHIC WORK GROUP TO SUBMIT BRIEF

The Work Group on Demographic Trends will submit a brief on October 5 to the Standing Cultural Committee of the National Assembly, chaired by Liberal MNA Richard French.

The Committee has asked for reaction from the public to a recent government document, "The Evolution of Quebec's Population and its Consequences.

The Work Group, co-ordinated by former Townshippers¹ Association Executive Director, Royal Orr, will explain some of the more important demographic factors and their effects on the English-speaking community. Their brief will also give a complete picture of the demographic and socio-economic characteristics of English-speaking Quebecers. A special study, commissioned from University of Montreal demographer Jacques Henripin, will be appended to the AQ brief.

The broader aim of the Work Group is to demystify the process of charting demographic trends and to encourage discussion of the uses and interpretation of such research.

The Work Group is co-chaired by John Trent of Outaouais Alliance and Catherine Duff-Caron, member-at-large of AQ's executive. Members include: Graham Weeks, Stuart Richards, Richard Joy, Sonia Aronow, Barbara Rowley, Peter Turner and Kevin Saville.

The Work Group is expected to make a formal presentation to the Standing Committee later this month.

<u>St. Laurent Chapter</u> congratulates its chairperson, Helen McLellan, and chapter member Mary Kieran, for their election to the advisory of CLSC-St. Laurent and CLSC-New Bordeaux/Cartierville respectively.

The Employment/Business & Signs Committee was successful in its summer-long campaign to have bilingual warning signs posted at metro construction sites in St. Laurent. Committee chairperson Craig Berger lobbied the Bureau de Transport Métropolitain to authorize the posting of such signs, which fall under the public health or safety provisions of Bill 101.

The same committee also succeeded in convincing the municipal administration to request a bilingual listing for the City of St. Laurent in the blue pages of the telephone directory. Previously, municipal authorities were unaware of their legal right to have this.

The NDG/Montreal West Chapter held a board meeting Sept. 10 at which AQ Cultural Liaison Animator Sophia Skiadas discussed her role of outreach to cultural communities. The Chapter will be working closely with Sophia to develop contacts and participate in meetings with various cultural communities. The chapter is also planning a number of public meetings and will begin intense networking with other community organizations.

'Sunday in the Park' was held Aug. 26 at Loyola Park. Chapter Chairperson Ron Silverson and Animator Fred Anderson manned the AQ booth, with assistance from chapter volunteers.

The <u>Côte Nord Chapter</u> is conducting a membership campaign with emphasis on Septlles where no organized campaign has yet been held. The AQ booth was set up in the malls of the two main shopping centres during the last two weekends of September. Elliott Ryan is responsible for membership in Port-Cartier and Hans Schobesberger in Sept-Iles.

The Education Committee, under the chairmanship of Brenda Barnes, is exploring the possibility of opening an English section in the local Cégep. Area parents have expressed concern over the travel and costs associated with sending their children to English Cégeps elsewhere. A preliminary feasibility study of the number of English-speaking postsecondary students in the area will be prepared by Committee members for study and possible recommendations to appropriate authorities.

The Health & Social Services Committee, under Louise Jones, is looking at the availability of services for senior citizens.

The West Island Chapter will set up a booth at the Pointe Claire Community Awareness Day to be held Oct. 12 and 13 at the Pointe Claire Shopping Centre on St. John's Road.

The Chapter will sponsor an information meeting for the Hudson members on Oct. 16 at 7:30 at Hudson High School.

 $\underline{V.E.Q.}$ (Voice of English Quebec) has completed the second part of a study on the community in the Saguenay/Portneuf region. This demographic profile includes statistical information and a compilation of the attitudes of English-speaking people. The study will be released early next year.

V.E.Q. sponsored a kiosque at the Quebec '84 summer festivities to highlight the contributions of the English-speaking community to the economic, socio-cultural and religious development of the Quebec City region.

This summer, the Employment Opportunities Committee of the Animation Department placed over 100 students in part-time employment. The Job Club gave local English-speaking youths a chance to work in French. During the next year, V.E.Q. will co-ordinate a Young Achievements Club as an outgrowth of this club.

Sister Marianna O'Gallagher, a history teacher at St. Patrick High for 20 years, has been named Director of Heritage and Cultural Programmes at V.E.Q. The association's participation in Quebec '84 was her first project. The programme now will concentrate on setting up an information resource centre for the English-speaking community in the areas of local history, genealogical research and institutional services.

Finally, V.E.Q. will hold its annual Fall Fest '84 under the theme "Fall Fun For All/Ca se Fête Ensemble". Activities run from Oct. 6 to 8 with a pancake breakfast Sat. a.m. at the Manège Militaire on the Grande-Allée in Quebec City; games and rides all weekend on the grounds of Place Georges-V; a Sunday evening casino and dance at the Château Frontenac; and an equestrian event on Mon. on the grounds of St. Patrick Church. The fest= ival brings together members of the local English-speaking community to share their heri tage and culture with all Quebecers.

Saguenay Chapter's Health & Social Services Committee is currently compiling a directory of services available to the local English-speaking community. The booklet will include listings of doctors, lawyers and other professionals who offer services in English. Committee Chairperson Eric Thompson reports that many names have been listed for the Saguenay; however, the Committee is still seeking information for the Lac St-Jean region.

Public meetings of the chapter will continue to be held on the 3rd Wednesday of every month at the Club de la Direction at 8:15 pm.

The <u>Lower Laurentians Chapter</u> will kick off its membership campaign with the Second Annual Heritage Day Family Outing on Sat., Oct. 13 from 2 to 5 pm at the Harrington Community Centre. Chapter representatives were recently invited to speak to the Morin Height's Women's Guild.

Tom Mulcair, Legal Affairs Director for Alliance Quebec, spoke on the topic, "Language and the Law" at a public meeting on Sept. 27 in Shawbridge sponsored by the chapter.

A new government policy on continuing education aims to transfer responsibility for adult education from the Ministry of Education to the regional CFPs (Commissions de Formation Professionnelle) and the MMSR (Ministère de la Main-d'oeuvre et de la Sécurité du Revenu). The Education Programme has been working with organizations active in the adult education sector to exchange information and develop common positions.

French Second Language

On Sept. 11, representatives of 13 provincial organizations met in response to a request from AQ to plan joint action on a number of issues regarding French second-language instruction. Items such as federal funding, responses to the Superior Council Report and community-based approaches elicited interest from the groups, which will meet again Oct. 25.

Ontario School Board Reorganization Case to Supreme Court

The decision of the Ontario Court of Appeals which granted the control and management of schools to the linguistic minority is being appealed to the Supreme Court. AQ intervened in the Ontario case, based on the impact the decision would have in Quebec.

English-speaking Parents' Network

Ross Clark and Fred Wiseman are working as co-ordinators for the Network - or ESPN as it is often called. A phone line has been installed and requests for information can be made by calling (514) 288-3703. ESPN's founding convention will take place Nov. 16 and 17. AQ provides support services to the network, which will be the first organization to bring together all English-speaking parents in the province.

HEALTH AND SOCIAL SERVICES PROGRAMME

The first provincial seminar of the 1984-85 programme year will be held Oct. 12 and 13 at the Protestant School Board of Greater Montreal offices, 6000 Fielding Avenue, in Montreal. The seminar will include workshops designed to develop a better understanding of the MAS (health and social services) system, as well as sessions dealing with the provincial and regional implications of the reorganization of social services.

Included during the weekend are presentations on the use of the Information and Documentation Project, as well as workshops designed to develop contact and negotiation skills with institutions on local issues.

CLSC Development

Monthly Report

With completion of the CLSC network underway, Alliance Quebec has a unique opportunity to participate in the process. Chapters and Associations can get involved by fielding candidates for election to advisory committees or by proposing candidates for appointment.

Within the next few months, many elections for advisory committees will take place: three in the South West Chapter area; three in East Island; one in TMR/Côte-des-Neiges/Outremont/Snowdon E.; one in the Côte St. Luc/Hampstead/Snowdon W. area; and two in West Island. A meeting has been scheduled in early October between Alliance Quebec and the Federation of CLSCs to discuss the relationship between CLSCs and the English-speaking community.

Summer Works Project

COMMENT IN THE FRENCH PRESS

During the past month, a number of important events have occurred which could affect the linguistic dossier in Quebec and Canada. A new federal government has been elected. D'Iberville Fortier has started as the new Commissioner of Official Languages. At the provincial level, a new Minister, Louise Harel, has taken over Cultural Communities and Immigration, while Gérald Godin has retained responsibility for the application of Bill 101. September was also the month of Canada's first-ever papal visit, which saw Pope John Paul II encourage Canadians to take pride in their bilingual heritage.

Jean-Louis Roy in a <u>Le Devoir</u> editorial, Sept. 14, comments on the future of bilingualism in Canada. He believes Mr. Fortier will carry on the tradition of Keith Spicer and Maxwell Yalden and execute the job of Official Language Commissioner with "steadfastness and prudence". Mr. Roy is also happy with the election of Brian Mulroney, singling out his responses to the questions which were asked of all three parties by the Fédération des Francophones Hors Québec (FFHQ) concerning minority language rights. "Mr. Mulroney," he writes, "on more than one occasion, has proven his respect for the Official Languages Act as well as his preoccupation with the protection of minority rights." Although a certain level of bilingualism has been reached on a federal level, Mr. Roy be= lieves that linguistic equality is a long way off and will require a "strong signal" from Mr. Mulroney. "This signal will indicate to us whether or not we will be condemned to stag= nation and regression," he writes, "or on the contrary be revitalized with a breath of fresh air."

In a Le Devoir editorial of Sept. 26, Gilles Lesage compliments the Lévesque overnment for its wisdom in retaining Gerald Godin as Minister responsible for Quebec's fanguage dossier. "By his flexibility and charm", writes Mr. Lesage, "he has succeeded over the last four years in reducing the amount of tensions in a delicate situation." Mr. Lesage also commends Mr. Godin's efforts in making his colleagues understand that "political solutions are by far preferable to judicial dictates."

Many Canadians were surprised at the frank comments made by Pope John Paul II on his recent visit to Canada. Michel Roy in La Presse Sept. 17 notes the appropriateness of the Pope's plea for Canadian unity made in Manitoba, "that pinnacle of Canadian multiculturalism and stage for the exhaustive fight of Franco-Manitobans for their constitutional rights." He then urges all Canadians to make a daily practice of the Pope's observations that, "the historic experience of the two founding peoples of Canada, that have moulded together in a life existing on mutual respect and assurance for each other's cultural uniqueness, has providently created a climate of cultural diversity which is the character of Canada today."

Finally, Alliance Quebec welcomes Frank Rackow as the new Communications/Research Programme Assistant. His background includes community journalism and minority language rights research with the Canadian Federation of Students in Ottawa.

QUEBEC SCHOOL TELECASTS MOVE TO RADIO-QUEBEC

Radio-Québec will air some programs in English starting this month.

The Quebec School Telecasts, educational programming produced by the Ministry of Education, will be broadcast on the provincially-owned network as of Oct. 15. The English-language programs will be aired twice daily from 11:00 to 11:30 am and from 1:00 to 1:30 pm, Monday to Friday, except holidays, until the end of May.

The move comes as a result of a decision last spring by the Government of Quebec to transfer all responsibility for educational programming from the Ministry of Education to Radio-Québec. Coincidentally, the federally-owned network, the CBC, had already decided to cease providing air time to Provincial Education Ministries.

The Radio-Québec network, by and large, covers most of the geographic areas of the province to which the CBC broadcasts.
