Public health guidelines fluctuated from week to week, major social movements and political events provoked significant debates, and youth were yet again faced with existential questions during an unusually tumultuous time.

As always, I remain proud of Y4Y's flexibility and ability to pivot to address the issues youth are facing in the immediate. Our strength as an organization, and as a community, is rooted in our ability to listen and to amplify young voices. I believe that this is the key behind our success in continuously reaching new regions of Québec and forming new partnerships. This was evident during our first major in-person event since the start of the pandemic, during which young people collaborated on a strategic plan that

will guide the organization and the community more broadly as it navigates into a post-pandemic world. Y4Y is well-placed in the upcoming year to focus more acutely on those struggling the most with the challenges caused by the aftermath of the pandemic, notably with regards to mental health. My hope is that the organization continues to champion solutions and community-building for youth and by youth.

This past fiscal year also marked a change in leadership at Y4Y with Kathleen Mulawka acting as interim Executive Director. It would be remiss of the organization not to recognize that its successes over the past year are the result of her dedication, grit and creativity.



#### Letter from the Executive Director

Dear Friends.

This year tested the strength & stability of Y4Y as an organization, because the population it aims to serve, members of Québec's English-speaking youth community, were forced to test the limits of their resiliency in innumerable ways. The pandemic was hard on everyone; our organization learned about the profound impact it has had on the youth of our community, and we took the resulting responsibility very seriously. It required us to recalculate priorities, redouble our efforts to reach out, and ramp up the representation of community concerns to those in positions of power.

And thanks to the incredible work carried out over two years by the hundreds of youth involved in the Priority-Setting Summit Project, Y4Y can structure its future work according to the needs identified by youth, for youth.

The dynamic, diverse group of young people who

comprised the staff team at Y4Y in 2021-22 rose to every occasion, and never settled for "good enough"when it came to creating safe spaces for youth to sound off on the issues they are facing. In addition to the project-related work across the province, the team transformed what youth were sharing into policy briefs, campaigns, info sessions, workshops, panel discussions, research initiatives, and press releases. None of this would have been possible without a concerted and consistent team effort. I am so proud of the woman who led that team with quiet confidence, grace under pressure, and a laser-like focus on the mission of the organization - Kathleen Mulawka. She stepped in at a new territory frequently. She brought a wealth of experience to the job, yet took every opportunity to learn new skills to improve the way the organization started as Executive Director in January of 2021.

Thank you to the Board of Directors, as well as the Volunteers, Advisors, community partners, and other friends of Y4Y for your support during this challenging year. We look forward to finding more ways to engage with Québec's English-speaking youth communities in the years ahead.





## **Bead the Way**



Spearheaded by local animator Susieanne Kudluk and funded by the Qarjuit Youth Council, Y4Y launched a beading project at the Kangirsuk Youth Center at the start of 2021. This was an initiative meant to bring together the young women of Kangirsuk, Québec.

Prompting the initiative, Susieanne had informed Y4Y that the women in the community really appreciated the art of beading, but few of them possessed the ability to do so. This project, therefore, was meant to help them learn a new skill that they would carry throughout their lives and pass along to the next generations. Bead the Way was designed to help the young women in Kangirsuk learn new creative skills through weekly workshops on beading and jewelry making, while strengthening economic opportunities for youth in the North. Susieanne led the sessions twice a week at the Kangirsuk Youth Center. While COVID-19 often forced sessions to be postponed or canceled, it is clear that the project was a much appreciated activity for all of its participants.

Y4Y Québec's podcast, entitled Say La Vie, increased understanding of the experiences, diversity, and culture of English-speaking youth in the province.

The project's goal was to increase the sense of belonging among English-speaking youth in Québec society through inspirational storytelling and by featuring youth artistry. The project exceeded expectations by culminating in Episode 12, which celebrated the work of youth community organizers during the pandemic. The final episode of Say La Vie was released on March 28th, 2022.

## Priority-Setting Summit Project (PSSP)

Concluded



Over the course of two consecutive years, the PSSP involved hundreds of youth across the province in the design and development phases of creating a Strategic Plan for the English-speaking Youth Community of Québec.

The Youth Advisory Committee, formed in early 2021, guided the project through consultations with youth on issues of importance to them, recruitment of youth for participation in the two Summit events, and educational activities designed to engage youth in the process of turning issues into positive community actions. Youth Participants reported that they gained insight into government processes as well. Collaborations with project partners such as the Institut du Nouveau Monde, YES Montreal, LOJIQ, Apathy is Boring. As a result of the work completed by the youth who participated in the PSSP, Y4Y held a final event to elaborate on the actions described in the Strategic Plan during its Youth Forum 2022. The Plan, and the community priorities it identifies, will serve as a guiding light for Y4Y's work in the years to come.







My passion for advocacy and creating change, motivated me to become a Youth Advisor for Y4Y Québec. During that time, I had the opportunity to animate workshops, learn about civic engagement, and meet professionals notably in communication, career development and strategic planning. I was fortunate to meet Michael Teed, Miriam Groom, and Marie-Dina Salvione, among many others.

My tasks as a Youth Advisor involved working on two Priority-Setting summits, which enabled the creation of a project in collaboration with other youth participants, community leaders, and governmental partners. In other words, this opportunity has made me more informed and empowered about the ways I can generate change in my community.
