The following are just some of the things our students do to make our school peaceful:

- Christmas Baskets for families in our community and for AGAPE, a local charitable organization.
- Playground Leadership Program for senior students, who are led by an instructor and receive training to act as leaders and animators for junior students.
- Peace Circles class sessions for senior grades led by a behaviour technician to promote unity and peace.
- Changes in Lunch procedures eating in the classroom has led to a more peaceful and healthy environment.
- School Skills Group also led by our behaviour technician to help junior students deal with social difficulties and teach them to be leaders for other children.
- Family Fun Festival an evening in May dedicated to promoting family and unity amongst community members.
- École en Santé Souvenir is an active member of this organization which promotes health and well-being in our school.
- Respect Medals each month a theme is selected and teachers choose one student from their class to receive this award.
- Gotcha and Hi-Five Tickets a reward system which recognizes good behaviour and doing good deeds.
- Leader's Corps led by grade 5 students to organize activities during open gym time at lunch.

And for that I thank you all – for your patience and for your valuable input. You have all helped to keep me on track. All of you who are present today help keep me informed. This knowledge base is increased every time one of our H&Ss phones for assistance, asks a question, attends a conference, or fills out a survey. The members of the QFHSA are my educators and teachers. YOU make the difference in this organization. You are vital to my success as President and you are vital to the success of our organization.

Every one of us has a part to play in making our schools the best place possible. What skills, or talents, do you have that would benefit the students in your school? No matter how little time you have to give it, will make a difference. Younger children are thrilled to see their parents in their school – and quickly learn that their school is very important to their mothers or fathers. You are instilling a life-long love of learning for the rewards that it brings. And, secretly, your teenagers are happy to see you involved at the high school level – just don't expect to be acknowledged openly!

Your organization is celebrating its 65th anniversary this year. We have come a long way and achieved some significant milestones along the way. We did a terrific Stop/Arrêt (for school buses) campaign in 1980 with the Quebec Safety League – which led to installing "arms" on school buses to stop motorists from passing buses that were taking on, or letting off, students. Through the Canadian Home & School Federation, of which each of you are a member, we began Teacher Appreciation Week, across Canada, in 1988. More recently we produced our *Children's Literacy Resource Guide* (now available on a CD) with hundreds of ideas on getting children, and students, hooked on reading.

It is my hope that all of you will learn something today that will help you be a better parent. And remember, we welcome suggestions and ideas from each and every one of you. Please do fill in your evaluation sheet – it is a great help to us in future planning. And I thank you all, personally, for your support during the past two years.

For the past twenty years Harold has been an enthusiastic and very positive advocate for QFHSA. There are very few among us who can 'sell' the benefits of being a member of Home and School better than Harold. He not only 'talks the talk' but has shown a strong commitment to the mission of QFHSA through his actions and volunteerism.

Throughout the 1990s Harold gave countless hours of volunteer time to help us organize and carry out literacy programs and activities. Marion Daigle and Harold took their "travelling circus for literacy" to communities large and small throughout Quebec. These travels included the many villages of the Lower North Shore, along the Gaspé coast, the Eastern Townships and the Chateauguay Valley.

BEACON HILL ELEMENTARY SCHOOL COMMUNITY

Working Together to Make a Difference



For many years now, staff, students and parents have been making a difference in the world by working to improve the lives of people in their community and abroad. The following is an overview of some of the projects. Free the Children – rather than accepting gifts from their students during the holiday season, the teachers requested that parents make a donation to the Free the Children Society. In 2007 the \$5000 in donations was used

to build a well in an African community. Last year enough funds were raised to equip a classroom.

Plan Canada – for more than eight years the Home & School has supported, through funds raised by the students, a foster child. Today we support Elie, a boy living in Burkina Faso. We have initiated a *Stomp to Africa* campaign to raise money for Elie with students buying colouring pages of African animals for \$2 each. The pictures are then displayed around the school. The pictures and student messages will be sent to Elie – the funds to Plan Canada.

Dans la rue – for the past six years staff and students have made food donations to this organization. Each month we provide them with four or five large boxes of food.

Grade Six Mentor Program - to assist kindergarten students with the transition to elementary school, each Grade 6 student is a mentor for one Kindergarten student. They also act as "reading buddies" to cycle one students to assist in development of their reading skills.

Fundraising Events:

Dress Down Days (cost \$1) supports the Canadian Breast Cancer Foundation. Terry Fox Run – entire school raises money for cancer research. ALS (Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis) – Day Care Staff held a school bingo.
