In August 2019, ELAN celebrated 15 years of serving the English-language arts community of Quebec.



ELAN members are a reflection of an evolving Quebec identity that celebrates the province's cultural, artistic and social diversity.






# **Represented Disciplines**

#### ArtEd Initiatives

In 2019, ELAN launched the ArtistsInspire Grants program in collaboration with LEARN as a new source of funding for official-language minority schools to hire artists. The \$1500 ArtistsInspire Grants will enable students and teachers to participate in hands-on creative experiences about and in the arts.

ARTS2U is a feed of arts and culture events listings. Technologies such as data structuring, natural language processing, AI, and machine learning must be understood and made available to arts producers. ARTS2U is connected with a network of arts producers in multiple disciplines across the country, who are participants in the digital transformation of the sector.





# **ArtistsInspire Grants**

ArtistsInspire Grants offers support for Schools and Artists from Quebec's Englishspeaking communities to connect through hands-on creative experiences. This is an ELAN/LEARN partnership funded by the Government of Canada's Action Plan for Official Languages. The \$1500 ArtistsInspire Grants are available to all 300 English-language public schools in Quebec to facilitate artistic & cultural learning experiences during the school day.



#### Arts, Culture, Education Initiative (ACE)

From 2018-20, ACE is providing facilitation and coaching to support school leaders, community partners, arts organizations and artists from 20 schools across Quebec to plan and implement ACE projects. ACE projects are given over \$5000, and take place over an extended time period. These projects are cross-curricular and achieve education program goals in multiple subject areas.



Information about arts events is compiled into a structured database and fed to media for display on their websites, and directly to arts audiences, saving producers time and bypassing marketing intermediaries.

# **State of the Arts**

State of the Arts (SotA) was an ELAN project aimed at better understanding how artists, cultural workers, arts organizers, funders, and audiences are all connected, and how these groups can help each other strengthen the arts community through thoughtful collaboration and meaningful exchanges.

From Summer 2018 to Winter 2019, ELAN undertook consultation activities in an experimental project design stretching over three iterative phases, which included interviews, focus groups (Assertion and Affirmation Sessions), surveys, a one-day Activation Conference, and an experimental cocktail party.

# **Identifying Funding**

ELAN has identified over 100 funding sources at the provincial level, from funding bodies such as CALQ, SODEC, the Ministry of Culture and Communications, the Ministry of Tourism, and Emploi-Québec.

#### **Official Languages Act**

The 50th anniversary of the Official Languages Act occurred in 2019. The Act provides support for French-speaking communities outside Quebec, and the English-speaking minority here in Quebec. ELAN participated in consultations in Quebec and Ottawa to ensure that the larger community remembered the important role played by the Arts and Culture sector.

#### **Community Media**

Traditional radio and TV print media have been severely impacted by the digital shift. Community media has been particularly hard-hit as revenues decline and costs rise. The federal government created a support program for community media in 2018, and ELAN filled a gap to represent the interests of community and campus radio and television. The Quebec Community Newspapers Association in turn represents English-language print media in Quebec.

#### Workshops

ELAN hosts various workshops for artists to hone professional skills & gain insight into funding resources.









2019 workshops at a glance:

#### CBC "Getting Media Attention"

CBC's annual workshop, offered exclusively to ELAN members in May, guided artists in best practices for getting media attention.

# How to Survive and Thrive in the Music Business

Two workshops were held in April, in partnership with Future Music Market and Genison. These workshops were held in Hudson in February, and in April at the Goethe Institute (Montreal).

# **Hack Arts Montreal**

Hack Arts Montreal hosted a 2-day hackathon in December, featuring ARTS2U, Culture Creates, Design Thinking Montreal, and Wired on Words.

# **ArtEd: Mental Health**

ELAN Quebec's ArtEd Initiatives hosted a Mental Health First Aid 2-Day Certificate Program for Adults Who Work with Youth.

# **Casting Workbook**

Tamara Lagrandeur from Casting Workbook visited ELAN to present the various uses of Casting Workbook, as well as how to how to create a self-tape, find an agent, and market yourself as an actor.

#### The Interacting Audience: A National Dialogue

This panel, live-streamed from the Banff Centre for Arts & Creativity and featuring June Park, explored themes of audience interactivity, authentic invitation, high-risk versus low risk interactivity, directed versus self-directed interactivity, and laying out the rules of engagement.

#### Inclusion

In summer 2017, after several years of internal discussion, the English Language Arts Network (ELAN) embarked on a process of creating an Inclusion Plan.

The Inclusion Plan outlines the actions that have been taken by ELAN in the development of our policy and introduces actions that will be taken over a five-year period from 2017-2022.

Conversations about inclusion, diversity, and equity have made clear that many of Quebec's English-speaking artists face specific barriers due to discrimination based on race, gender, disability, Indigeneity, language, and a number of other factors.

This plan mobilizes our priorities as an organization serving the Englishspeaking community of Quebec to integrate values of inclusion and equity in the specific areas of our work in Membership, Human Resources, Governance, Advocacy, and Communications.
