## Message From Our Board of Directors

The board of directors was elected in September of 2018 to fulfill the role of governance for Literacy Quebec. When the board members took office, the year was shaping up to be an eventful one. We had just been granted a special three year project from the English Secretariat to develop, expand and promote our network; we continued to oversee the financial and legal operations of the corporation and were there to give any support needed to our wonderful and experienced executive director. Who could have foreseen that shortly after our first meeting in October we would be surprised with the news that our executive director was to become a mom in Spring 2019. Though thrilled for her, we quickly shifted into "what now" mode, motivated by a need to ensure that Literacy Quebec stayed on course for the 2018-2019 year.

But, stay on course we did. Thanks to Margo Legault and her expert direction of the organization, the reins were gradually handed over to our 2018 summer student, Gabrielle Thomas. Gabrielle officially took on the position of interim Executive Director in early April 2019. Margo welcomed her little bundle at the end of April – the date coinciding with the Scotiabank Race in which Literacy Quebec took part.

To say that we have built a strong team of board and staff would be an understatement! Staffing jumped from being a one and a half person operation to adding four contracted positions, as well as several internships and volunteers. The board quickly stepped up to support Gabrielle as she welcomed the new members to the team.

With having entered our 40th year of operations, we have never been so busy. And it is such an exciting time! New partnerships have been developed, new initiatives undertaken and new opportunities for growth of our network have emerged.

Thank you to all of our wonderful staff: Margo, Gabrielle, and Lauren; our contractors: Chris & Jaime; our interns and volunteers: Sarah Conley, Kerry Whelan, Gary Purcell, Kate Shaw and our volunteers from the YMCA; and to all of our members, who were with us at the start, and who continue to be the grassroots of our organization.

## **Message From Our Excutive Director**

A society that invests in literacy is more socially inclusive, safer and creates more vibrant communities. Our work at Literacy Quebec has proven this statement true time and time again – especially in this past year.

This year, Literacy Quebec was recognized as the leading advocate for literacy in the Official Language Minority Communities of Quebec (OLMCs), through a 400,000\$ grant over three years from the Secretariat for relations with English speaking Quebecers. The project, entitled Empowering Literacy Networks, has allowed us to significantly strengthen our network and expand our reach. We have been able to increase our human resources, develop working tools and offer better support to our member organizations. One of the main objectives of the project is to develop partnerships with government agencies and other networks. In year one, we have solidified ties with the Office of Literacy and Essential Skills as well as the literacy network for OLMCs outside of Quebec (Réseau pour le développement de l'alphabétisme et des compétences - RESDAC). This partnership will see the creation of a national literacy organization in the coming years.

We were also able to improve our awareness and outreach efforts through our participation in the ScotiaBank race and the creation of our Literacy Quebec podcast. Both initiatives gave and continue to give us a platform to reach a wider audience all while showcasing the work being done by our member organizations and others across the province.

Going on maternity leave at such a pivotal moment in our organization's history would normally be daunting, but the competency of our trusted Gabrielle and the ongoing support from our hardworking and committed board of directors made it easy. As the Literacy Quebec staff and volunteers braved the harsh weather on ScotiaBank race day, I welcomed my little one into this world.

Gabrielle and I would like to acknowledge the efforts and contributions of our wonderful group of dedicated volunteers, including our Board of Directors (Joy, Eric, Michèle and Sia). We would also like to extend our gratitude and sincere thanks to our staff, contractors, and interns for their continued efforts in moving us forward.

Our team is driven by a vision of empowering people, influencing lives and building a stronger society through literacy. As we head into our 40th anniversary in 2020, we invite you to share our vision and join us as we move forward together.

## **Support to Our Members**

## **Projects & Grants**

#### **Empowering Literacy Networks**

#### With the Secrétariat Aux Relations Avec Les Québécois d'Expression Anglaise

One of the highlights of 2018 was being invited to sign a new \$400 000 3-year grant from the secrétariat aux relations avec les Québécois d'expression anglaise for a project entitled Empowering Literacy Networks.

Year 1 of this project was lead by Project Coordinator Olivia Kurajian, who worked with us from October 2018 to March 2019. In our first year, we were able to strengthen and develop partnerships with other English networks and organizations. These partners include: CHSSN, QCGN, CEDEC, OLES, RESCAC, QFHSA and LEARN. We also recruited a policy intern to our organization and kickstarted the revision process of our Family Literacy Toolkit. Another highlight of our first project year was when we brought our members together in February 2019 for a working meeting about evaluation practices and measuring our impact.

Year 2 of this project is being lead by Jaimie Cudmore and Chris Shee, who became our Project Coordinators in March 2019. They have worked diligently in boosting Literacy Quebec's profile through the creation of the LQ Podcast. In the year to come, they will be hard at work collecting data from our network and solidifying key partnerships for our network.

## **Bâtir des ponts vers l'insertion sociale Building Bridges towards Social Insertion**

#### **PACTE** operation projects

Another project that Literacy
Quebec had the pleasure of
working on this year was our
social insertion initiative *bâtir des ponts vers l'insertion sociale*.
Spearheaded by Chris, the
primary objective of this project
was to help isolated individuals
find volunteer opportunities in
English.

Social isolation appears frequently in individuals who are out of the workforce (whether they be retired, off work due to illness, or on maternity leave), as well as in individuals who have moved or are newly arrived



immigrants. This isolation can be especially difficult for English speaking individuals, as opportunities to break their social isolation are less frequent, and harder to find.


Chris started this project by reaching out to various not-for-profit organizations. He found out about their volunteer recruitment process and was also able to sensibilize them on the realities that prospective volunteers may face when having low literacy levels, or being of English expression. This part of the project reached 35 front line workers (Executive Directors, Volunteer Coordinators, etc.) in the not-for-profit sector.

The second phase of this project was to help individuals dealing with social isolation through the process of finding a volunteer opportunity suited to their personal interests. We were able to help 25 individuals in this process, either through training, accomangment, or direct placement.

## **New Horizons for Seniors Project Grant**

Last year, Literacy Quebec launched the Verdun Stories
Project. Funded by the New Horizons for Seniors Project
Grant, Literacy Quebec and The Suspicious Fish partnered to
produce a book for the community, by the community. The
Verdun Stories is an intergenerational anthology of creative
writing pieces by local artists and aspiring authors. Many of
the pieces were written in creative writing workshops hosted
by Suspicious Fish and their dynamic volunteer Kate Shaw,
reaching over 30 people. Adapted measures such as



talk-to-text were used in this project to help ensure that all residents, no matter their literacy level, were able to participate.

We would especially like to thank Gabrielle Thomas (LQ team member), Gary Purcell (Suspicious Fish team member), and Anna Evangelista (LQ volunteer) who worked diligently to make this project a reality. It is also important to note that over 350 volunteer hours were contributed to bring this project to life!

On March 2, 2019, we hosted the official launch of the *Verdun Stories* book at Café le 5e in Verdun. Through this launch we reached 150 individuals!

#### **Family Literacy Day**

#### **Health & Wellness Fair**

Literacy Quebec participated in the Verdun Health and Wellness fair on May 31st. This is a wonderful opportunity for us to connect with health and wellness organizations and service providers and let them know how literacy can affect the wellbeing of the people they serve. It is also a great opportunity for us to raise awareness within the community at large. Through this event we were able to reach 500 individuals.

## **Scotiabank Charity Run**

Organized by Chris Shee, Literacy Quebec was able to participate and raise funds in the Scotiabank Charity Run. Chris recruited 16 individuals, who all ran and raised funds for literacy. Together, LQ volunteers and runners contributed over 500 volunteer hours to this initiative.

#### **Direct Services**

Literacy Quebec offers a range of training and professional development services to community organizations and front line workers. This year Literacy Quebec was able to provide three workshops on a variety of topics, benefiting 55 individuals.

- Workshop on Volunteering

- Workshop on Clear Writing and Plain Language
   Hosted by Concordia QUESCREN in Montreal, QC.: 30 participants
- Workshop on Early Childhood Literacy and Mother Goose
  Hosted by CCS (Collective Community Services) in Verdun, QC.: 10 participants

#### **Book Giveaways**

Literacy Quebec regularly receives donations of high quality new English books. To help spread the love of reading, we distribute these books throughout the community in a few ways. By far the most popular way is simply by setting up a table outside our office doors with a sign that says free books! Passersby can pick themselves a new read (or two) and continue on their way. This has proven to be very successful, particularly on warm summer days when Verdun Street has significant foot-traffic.

The recipient of this year's Freda Hudson award was Maureen Floen from RECLAIM Literacy. In 15 years, Maureen has contributed over 3000 volunteer hours to tutoring. 

## **Communications & Campaigns**

Literacy Quebec's online presence continues to grow. Our Facebook page has seen a significant increase from 294 to 472 followers. Our Twitter continues to be our largest platform, now with 740 followers (a steady increase from 681 last year). Instagram has also seen growth, not with 220 followers, an increase from the 148 followers we had previously.



Our YouTube Channel had one new video uploaded to it this year. Although this is not a significant platform for us, YouTube continues to be a useful tool in sharing video content.

#FamilyLiteracyDay and #InternationalLiteracyDay.


## **Our Most Popular Posts**


