AJEQ Project Background

- Project is led by the QCGN and funded by Justice Canada
 - Carries forward work that was initiated in 2016 and looks to continue building on the success of the April 2018 Community Forum ("No Justice Without Access")
 - Explores how to improve access to justice in English in Quebec (AJEQ)
 - The Community Forum developed important starting points in three targeted areas to improve access to justice in English
 - Seniors
 - Youth in need of protection or interacting with the criminal justice system
 - People seeking justice from administrative entities
 - As experience and knowledge is acquired, scope and depth of action to improve access to justice in English will be expanded and deepened
 - Engagement of a broad cross-section of English-speaking community representatives and justice system officials is fundamental to project success




Scope of the AJEQ Project

- Access to justice in English touches all aspects of peoples lives
 → It is a concept that is much larger than just "access to courts/lawyers"
- Laws, regulations, administrative polices, and professional practices frame (sometimes enable/sometimes limit) the use of English in multiple settings

Desired AJEQ Outcomes

- Community knowledge of the justice system, especially how components of the system link together and interact on an ongoing basis
- Collaborative relationships between the community and the justice system
- Strengthened community intervention capacity
- Improved access to justice in English



Why AJEQ Is Important

- The use of an Official Language should not be a barrier to access to justice in any jurisdiction in Canada
- Providing people with what they are due in terms of being informed and understood when a person's rights, obligations, autonomy, and freedom are at stake
- When people/citizens need access to justice in English, it is usually in times of critical need or crisis
- Increase the capacity of the justice system to offer justice services in both official languages
- Increase awareness in the legal community and official language minority and majority communities concerning rights and issues related to access to justice in both official languages

 - Successfully built upon the work of the project's Steering Committee and three Work Groups
