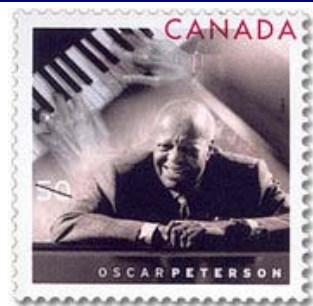

Dr. Williams, a Montreal native is the President of a “comprehensive, searchable bibliographic database of references” called Blacbiblio.com Inc.

“Blacbiblio was nurtured to fruition thanks to the rigorous training undertaken at Concordia’s Entrepreneurship Institute for the Development of Minority Communities (EIDMC), Black Community Economic Development Program: creating and managing sustainable enterprises in the Black Community.”

The company is based in Montreal and federally incorporated. “It offers, develops markets, promotes, and sells database content and multimedia services and licenses to institutions and commercial customers.”

NOVA SCOTIA'S NEW LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR



Mayann E. Francis, currently CEO and Director of the Nova Scotia Human Rights Commission, has been appointed Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia, by Prime Minister Harper.

A Nova Scotian native, Ms. Francis was the first woman to hold the post of Nova Scotia Ombudsman. In an interview by Canadian Press, Harper stated "as lieutenant-governor, [Francis] will continue to serve her province and country well." Ms. Francis will be sworn in as Nova Scotia's 14th Lieutenant Governor on September 7, 2006 in Halifax.

Williams is also the founder of Ethnocultural Diffusions a tool to collect the oral history of Blacks in Montreal. Writer of two books on Black history in Montreal, and she recently received her Doctorate from McGill University in Library and Information Studies. Her dissertation research was on the history of Black printed publications in Montreal, 1934-2005.

Williams' research thesis was entitled, 'Sankofa: Recovering Montreal's Heterogeneous Black Print Serials'. The word Sankofa derives from the Akan people of West Africa. In the Akan Language Sankofa is expressed as "se wo were fi na wosan kofa a yenki." The literal translations means, "it is not taboo to go back and fetch what you forgot."

"Sankofa" teaches us that we must go back to our roots in order to move forward. That is, we should reach back and gather the best of what our past has to teach us, so that we can achieve our full potential as we move forward. Whatever we have lost, forgotten, forgone or been stripped of, can be reclaimed, revived, preserved and perpetuated.

Sankofa is ever present in Blacbiblio, geared towards collecting the evidence of the Black experience in Canada. There are almost 10,000 sources already in the database with 25-35,000 references to be entered. The development of the database started 10 years ago, with information dating back to 1632 - the document of a Jesuit Priest doing missionary work in Quebec with a young Black slave named Oliver.

Oliver was the first slave to be sold in New France. He was 8 or 9 years old. The story of Oliver came from excerpts of the Jesuit priest's diary. It was common in New France for Slave owners in Quebec to be responsible for their slaves, which meant educating them in the Catholic faith to be "good Catholics," clothing, feeding, and not working their slaves after sun down.

Any person can refer to Blacbiblio "for information that has been so far hidden," stated Williams. She added, "I want to help people to understand how to do research and discover the Black experience in Canada."

As the work continues, people will have an option of accessing the database online through flexible subscription plans.

Presently, volunteers are needed to add references to the database. The volunteers would also be able to register as "a scholar" to help build up the database. This way people can get involve in the project and further their knowledge of a particular issue pertaining to their own interest, eventually becoming "subject specialists" or "scholars" in their own field.

As a result Ms. Williams believes, "people really learn a lot, [the database] is a good opportunity for people who want to become familiar with Black sources."

Williams has received numerous awards for her work, including the "Anne-Greenup Prize for the fight against racism and the promotion of civic participation," in 2002, at the National Assembly in Quebec.

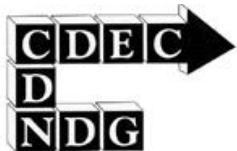

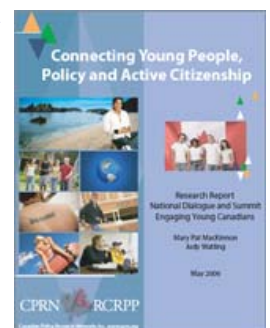
