Research Objective

Project objective:

 Demonstrate the linguistic dimension of poverty in Québec to inform the province's policy responses to poverty and support the goal of a poverty-free Québec



Methodology





Census of Canada

- Unemployment rate data
- Income data
- Low-income cut-off data
- Poverty rate data

Limitations on poverty rate data

- Not equipped to capture homelessness
- Not applied on reserves



Findings






- English speakers experience a **poverty rate almost twice as high** as French speakers (10.0% versus 5.8%)
- English speakers represent 14.9% of the population in Québec but 23.0%
 of all Quebecers living in poverty
- English-speaking youth and seniors experience disproportionately higher rates of poverty
- 54.0% of English speakers living in poverty are **visible minorities**





Poverty Rate (%) in Québec by Region (2021)








Poverty rate in Québec by age group (2021)


■ English speakers ■ French Speakers







Poverty rate in Quebec by gender (2021)









Issues



Language-based Disparities

- Disparities between English and French speakers: English speakers experience higher unemployment and poverty rates, and earn lower incomes. A higher proportion of English speakers also live below the LICO
- Language barriers experienced by English speakers include lack of French-language proficiency and lack of French-language learning programming
- Need to adopt a linguistic lens when reviewing poverty data and understanding factors that contribute to poverty



Access to Wrap-around Supports

- There is a need for wrap-around supports including food security programs, transportation, housing, childcare, and mental health care. Essential services must be available in English
- This programming cannot only provide English speakers with foundation to pursue employment programming, but also help to lift them out of poverty directly



Access to English-language Services

- There is a need for English-language services both in regard to employment and other sectors such as healthcare and social assistance
- There is also a need for resources such as accompaniment and translated documents to help English speakers access current French-language offerings



Regional Disparities

- English speakers in the often regions experience higher unemployment rates and earn lower incomes than French speakers in the same regions, as well as English speakers in other regions
- More qualitative data is needed to examine experiences of poverty in rural, remote, and Northern areas



Vulnerable Groups

- English-speaking visible minorities experience a higher rate of poverty than French-speaking visible minorities, English-speaking non-visible minorities, and French-speaking non-visible minorities
- English-speaking non-permanent residents and immigrants experience a higher rate of poverty than French-speaking immigrants, English-speaking non-immigrants, and French-speaking non-immigrants
- Vulnerable groups benefit from employability programming that considers their specific circumstances and unique barriers they face
