IN OUR COLLECTIONS

The Quebec Library Association (1843-1868)

The year 1866 is a landmark in the history of the Literary and Historical Society of Quebec. After surviving two fires (February 1st 1854 and October 25th 1862), the contents of the library was largely The Museum was totally depleted. destroyed. Of our 4 000 volumes, only 700 were saved along with the manuscripts. So when the Quebec Library Association sold their collection to the Society, it was a welcomed addition that increased our own to 8500 volumes. Though many titles of this precious collection have been sold or lost throughout the years, about 2000 volumes still remain in our Library today, including many books belonging to the Quebec Library.

The Quebec Library was the very first public library to be established in Canada in December 1779. A good deal of other libraries and cultural organisations, including the Lit. & Hist. (January 1824) came into existence during the first half of

the 19th century but most were short-lived. Among these was the Quebec Library Association which was established in December 1843 and incorporated on March 17th 1845. Many members and proprietors of the Quebec Library joined the new Association. Eventually both were amalgamated and the older library passed out of existence on July 23rd 1847.

By 1865, bad management had caused the Quebec Library Association severe financial problems, A catalogue printed that same year reveals that the Library owned 6990 volumes as well as a good number of English and foreign newspapers and leading magazines. Then in 1866, the collection of the Quebec Library Association was sold to the Literary and Historical Society for the modest sum of \$500 and the Association was dissolved in March 1868. Shortly afterwards their archives were also transferred over to the Lit, & Hist, where they remain to this day. mainly include the Act These incorporation and by-laws, minute books, financial papers, registers, membership lists and correspondence of the Association throughout its existence.

Oral History Program

I am pleased to inform members about an exciting new initiative of the "Lit. and Hist."; an oral history program. It will involve documenting different aspects of the recent history of Quebec City's English-speaking community through a series of interviews. The interviewees will be local English-speaking senior citizens. The interviewers will be students from three local English-language schools: St. Patrick High School, Quebec High School and CEGEP St. Lawrence. The interviews will be recorded on video and preserved as a primary historical source in our archives center. They will also be incorporated into some of the historical exhibits that will be installed in the now-empty part of the Morrin College building that houses our library. This will occur when the cultural center that I am helping to plan for the Society opens, a few years from now.

Last December, the Jeffery Hale Foundation delighted us by granting the Society \$7 000 to plan the project. Komi Gratias Gligbe, a sociologist with extensive experience in managing development projects, was our choice as project coordinator. Komi is a native of Togo, where preserving the memories and experiences of older people is a way of life. As Komi puts it, he grew up hearing that "when an elder dies it is like a library that closes."

Komi has been busy planning the project since February. Much of his work has involved meeting with local resource people who have very generously given him information and advice on everything from making interviewees comfortable to using the latest recording technology (mini-DVDs, for your information). A number of these people are also sitting in at our planning meetings. They include Pierre Ross (of CEGEP Limoilou) and Meb Reisner, both of whom have carried out oral history projects; Gail Quinn of Holland Centre; Marianna O'Gallagher of Irish Heritage Quebec; Paul Hinton of St. Patrick High School and Quebec High School, and James Lambert from the archives at Laval University.

Komi has also written a planning document which he will use as he seeks funding to actually run the oral history program. If all goes according to plan, the program will start up this September. We will keep you informed about our progress!

The Lives of Laurens Van der Post By J.D.F. Jones

This is a fascinating book! The biographer, J.D.F. Jones, given full access to the Van der Post papers, has succeeded in exposing the many fanciful claims of Van der Post upon which his fame rested, while still revealing his


charismatic charm and skill as a story teller.

Born into a comparatively modest Boer farming family in 1906 in the then Orange Free State, he lived in England off and on from 1928, working as a journalist and writer, and being sent by the British government to investigate the possibilities of agricultural development in different parts of Africa. He gradually worked his way into London cultural society, becoming friends with writers, composers and politicians.

Many of his readers, myself included, who had been enthralled by the account of his travels into the Kalahari desert and his studies of the bushmen, which were enlarged and expanded by the BBC into documentaries, lecture tour etc., were disappointed to find that most of his material on the Bushmen was lifted from the work of earlier anthropologists, and that his sojourn among the Bushmen consisted of camping about a mile from them and having brief encounters and conversations through an interpreter (not even from the same tribe).

He charmed his way into the confidence of Margaret Thatcher and influenced her greatly with his supposed knowledge of Southern African society and politics, persuading her to ignore the advice of her ambassadors and experts on the spot. His admiration for Ian Smith in Rhodesia and his distrust of Mandela in South Africa prolonged the agonies of the winding up of colonial power in those countries. He also became a close friend and mentor of Prince Charles and had considerable influence over him as well, in this case probably more benign.

As is so often the case with a well-written biography, it is also a history lesson of the period spanned by the subject. I was very glad to be reminded of many important events, which were taking place in Africa during that time. Van der Post was a mesmerizing charismatic character, held in deep affection by his many friends, who seemed to be able to accept his inability to distinguish reality from fantasy.
