


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Grassroots Community Participation Is Vital

A Message from the Executive Director

I WAS RECENTLY LISTENING to "The New World Disorder," a five-part series on CBC Radio's "Ideas" program with Nahlah Ayed. The first episode primarily looked at the deterioration of democracy in the United States. At one point, Ayed asks author Omar El Akkad what a Utopian society would look like compared to the usual Dystopian ones that are so often explored in fiction. The author said he was starting a new project that explored just that, a Utopian society.

El Akkad's Utopian society starts at the grassroots, where the citizens' primary motivating factor is the welfare of the children. Everything is geared toward the assurance that all children would have a happy childhood, despite

any financial or climate change difficulties. In this society, citizens look out for their immediate neighbours and local communities instead of looking to big government to solve all their problems.



He felt that the only way to bring such a society into being was to not save our participation in the electoral system for provincial or federal elections only, as that is not where real satisfying, tangible, and immediate change can happen. Instead, we need to be more actively involved in local politics and vote at the town council and school board levels (and in our cases, at the Home and School and the Governing Board levels). It is at the grass roots level where we can actually make tangible change.

Waiting every 4 years to change a premier or a prime minister is not going to do it for us. I found this a fascinating idea, and it's one that we at Home and School already understand. We do believe in local leadership, in our Home and School executives, in our Governing Board parents, in our teachers and principals, and we support our elected school commissioners.

That is part of the reason why we are fighting so hard to keep our

school boards. We feel that those who lead our school boards actually have the success of our students at the heart of every decision they make. We may not feel confident that the provincial government is as serious about supporting student success and child welfare. Given recent legislation, it seems that our provincial government is far more focussed on defending the French language.

The QFHSA has always supported the institution of the school board even if we may not have always 100% agreed with decisions school boards have made over the years. But as an institution, as the last democratically elected representatives to an Anglophone institution, we trust our school boards and we really must fight to hold onto them.

In 2023, we are not facing school board elections. They

will not come around again until November 2024. In the meantime, there is much we can do to get as many parents involved in local decision making as possible and to encourage participation in local elections.



The mission of Home and School is to enhance the educational experience of all students. Home and School is geared toward helping the school provide the healthy and happy environment that is necessary for students to grow and learn. When a Home and School is active and successful, it can create a small, local Utopia where everyone benefits.

Let us keep our eyes and ears open and when the Fall of 2024 comes around, let us encourage our parents to vote in the school board elections. Let's continue to build from the bottom upwards and make tangible change.

News from the 79th Annual General Meeting

AGM 2023 The Time Is Now!



AFTER SUCH A JOYFUL AWARDS BANQUET on May 26th where everyone enjoyed being together in person, it was a bit disappointing to hold a virtual annual general meeting yet again, but it must be acknowledged that it is an excellent way to get the most participation.

This year we had 26 member associations represented at the June 1st event, which is a number not seen in many years. We had representation from Western Quebec, Central Quebec, and the Eastern Shores along with the delegates from the Greater Montreal Area.

Treasurer Leah Trineer reported on the draft financial review to the dele-

gates. The fiscal year 2022 saw our membership fees slowly increasing as Home and Schools became more active, attracting their membership back to their activities.



Federal and provincial funding was available as well, so the year ended with a \$16,916 deficit, which was less than what had been feared.

Of all of the above resolutions, the resolution to maintain sexuality education as a separate program received the most attention. The discussion was lively and it was clear

many delegates had strong opinions on the topic. However, these opinions may not have represented the local association's view on the matter. The fact is that resolutions do not always get discussed at local Home and School meetings prior to the Annual General Meeting.

When the QFHSA's Annual General Meeting was held in person, time was usually allotted for small-group caucusing of each resolution. It was certainly more time consuming, but the delegates had this opportunity to have a say in the final wording.

Knowing that the 2023 annual meeting would be virtual once again, the QFHSA's Resolutions Committee organized a virtual caucusing session on May 15th. Unfortunately, the meeting did not generate a lot of interest among local Home and School Associations. We hope that next year, there will be more participation in pre-annual general meeting discussions about the proposed resolutions—both at the local level and with the QFHSA. Look for invitations to join the Resolutions Committee's caucusing session prior to AGM 2024.

After the resolutions were adopted, it was time to elect a new board of directors and the executive officers. See the following page for a recap of the election.

With a new team in place and a stable financial situation, the QFHSA is ready to face the challenges of the new year. The time is now!

Gasser. When describing Nicole's contribution to Butler school life, Home and School Member Anne-Lise Kyling often used the word, "unbelievable." It is the perfect word to describe Nicole's incredible dedication to the Butler community. Reliable, optimistic, and kind, Nicole possesses all the qualities that make a person a Volunteer of the Year and an indispensable part of a school community.

For over 15 years, Nicole has worked tirelessly to enhance Butler school life. She has been a member of the Home and School's executive and served on the school's governing board. Her lovely speeches to parents are a memorable part

of school events. And if there is a job to be done, you can be sure Nicole will be on hand to help. She runs the school's Breakfast Club, she prepares treats and sweets for staff and students, she hauls Christmas trees for the Home and School fundraiser, and so much more.

Her commitment to Butler's school community has be-

come legendary. Students sometimes ask Mrs. Nicole where she sleeps, and she replies with a smile, "On the couch in the staff room." She has been known to spend part of her Sundays preparing food for the next day's Breakfast Club and to check in with her fellow volunteers even when on a well-deserved vacation abroad.

To the students, Nicole is a fixture of their daily lives, offering high fives and encouraging words whenever needed. And though she does not actually sleep on the staff room couch, Nicole is a superhero to the Butler community. Now that her children have graduated out of the school, Nicole "is trying to pass the 'flambeau' to other parents," according to Anne-Lise. There is no doubt that Butler will always have a special place in Nicole's very generous heart.

How was the pollinator-friendly garden created? It began with a construction project that happened over lunch hours and even on PED Days. Sidney, James, and Austin helped to build planters, benches, and a shed to

store the garden equipment. In the process, the students learned to use power tools, with adult guidance, of course. The three also created a garden pathway by laying down a barrier and carefully shoveling two tons of pea

gravel.

Once the planters were made, other Bee Team members filled them with earth and planted flowers. The team learned such gardening skills as how to mix soil types and plant seeds/flowers at a

proper depth. The team also took on the responsibility of watering the garden twice weekly—not a simple task as no exterior water hose was available.

The QFHSA salutes the inspiring Bee Team for their wonderful efforts to nurture our environment.

The May Regional Councils:

Catching Up, Sharing Ideas, Tackling Challenges

WHEN A GROUP of Home and School executives get together with QFHSA staff and board members, you can be sure there will be a ton of information shared and a few laughs, too! This was the case at the spring Regional Council meetings, which were held on the evenings of May 1st and 4th.

A total of 13 Home and Schools participated in the Zoom meetings; both small rural and large suburban schools were represented. And although most of the Home and Schools were from the Greater Montreal area, a couple joined us from Western Quebec (an advantage of holding the meetings on Zoom).

Membership Services Coordinator Marlyn Brownrigg began by sharing the QFHSA's latest news, including the upcoming awards banquet and the annual general meeting. She then gave a short presentation on how to run a successful election for local Home and School executives. As most Home and School Associations hold their elections in the spring, the timing was perfect. Then the open discussion got underway. It was a lively, warm, and fun exchange. We discussed fundraising, events, and the challenges of the 2022/23 school year.

Fundraising: Something Old, Something New

What fundraising activities have local Home and School Associations been doing this year? The three most popy ular answers were: chocolate bars, pizza/sandwich lunches, and book fairs. There have been some twists on these old favourites, though. A couple of Home and Schools have simplified their lunchtime fundrais-

ers, offering pizza only (and sometimes strictly cheese pizza).

When it comes to book fairs, they are offered in a number of different ways. At one school, for example, classes go to the fair with their teachers during the day and parents visit the fair during Portfolio Night. Another school combined the book fair with a weekend holiday fair that brought the parents to the school. Still another Home and School moved its book fair to the local community centre, a change that doubled the revenue.



Next in popularity is a raffle/auction fundraiser. A raffle can be hugely successful, especially when parents donate a treasure trove of items for it. A couple of Home and Schools are doing their raffles online.

Other fundraisers local Home and Schools are doing include Félix and Norton cookie dough, Big Box Cards, Recipes in a Jar, bottle drives, bake sales, catalogue sales, photos with Santa/the Grinch, meat fundraisers, and a spring flower sale.

One Home and School had the neat idea of combining all the online vendors it uses into a one-day blockbuster Holiday Fair. Parents made their orders for ice cream, cookies. cheese, etc., in advance and went to the school on Holiday Fair Day to pick up their purchases. Once there, they could enter the holiday-wreath raffle and visit the book fair.

Events and More Events!

Home and Schools are very good at bringing the fun into fundraising by organizing events that the school community looks forward to and enjoys. As mentioned above, a bunch of online fundraisers can be turned into a holiday fair. Or a school gymnasium can be transformed into a stunning art gallery featuring the students' artwork. (You can find out more about Beacon Hill's art gala on page 20 of this newsletter.) Families get to attend comedy nights, movie nights, dances, and more!

Home and Schools also get involved in initiatives to support a worthy cause. Home and Schools organize sandwich-making sessions for the homeless or help at community walks that raise funds for local non-profit organizations. One highschool Home and School is making student mental health its focus. Last year, the group gave students "A Cookie for Mental Health." This year, students are receiving "Be Kind to Your Mind" pins. Home and Schools are promoting meatless meals, supporting Black History Month events, and creating committees to promote internet safety.

One of the most anticipated events of every school year is, of course, the year-end celebration! At the Regional Councils, Home and Schools shared their plans for the momentous occasion. There will be bubble parties, splash days, park days, and big yearend parties featuring food trucks, games, magicians, entertainment, door prizes, barbecues, picnics, inflatable toys, music, and DJs. There is no shortage of creativity when it comes to making the final days of the school year memorable for all.

Some Event Planning Tips

- 1. When planning a large event, see if your school board/ city/borough/neighborhood organization can lend you items and equipment. One Home and School was able to borrow barbecues and pop-up tents.
- 2. Approach local businesses for donations. Free cups of coffee go a long way!
- 3. Bouncy inflatables: Though they are not covered by the QFHSA's insurance policy, see if you can partner with your school and benefit from the school's insurance policy.

Tackling the Year's **Biggest Challenge:** Recruiting Volunteers

Quite a few Home and School Associations are dealing with a volunteer shortage, making this by far the year's biggest challenge. The pandemic interruption has made it necessary for Home and Schools to double their efforts to reconnect with parents and encourage their participation.



This lack of volunteers has forced Home and Schools to adapt their activities. It is why, for example, some have changed their year-end

events from barbecues to picnics. It is very hard to run a big event when you cannot get volunteers to lead the necessary committees. In some Home and Schools, the problem was compounded by delays/low registration for the police check process.

Most Home and Schools are still holding some or all of their meetings online. While they are a lot easier for parents to attend, online meetings do not build parent connection/engagement the way in-person meetings do. During the discussion, Marlyn

talked about the advantage of making the first meeting of the year



in person. It really helps Kindergarten/Secondary I parents get to know Home and School.

Although Home and Schools may hold their in-person meetings wherever they wish, meetings held at school are often more convenient. It saves time/is easier for the principal—and parents do appreciate having the principal or another member of the administration present at Home and School meetings.

It is amazing how much can be discussed (and accomplished) in a couple of 1½-hour meetings. Thank you to all who joined us. It is always inspiring to hear of your exceptional efforts to raise funds and organize activities and events to the benefit of all.

Karen Henchey, Communications Officer Recruiting and Retaining Volunteers for Executive/ Committee Positions: A Few Tips

1. Spread the word that all are welcome!

"A good leader grooms a successor." Let parents know what positions are open. Reach out to potential volunteers and invite them to try out a position or shadow the person currently in the role. Double up a job if necessary (i.e., have co-presidents).

2. Document your activities and keep good records.

- Create a handbook/procedure manual that explains how to do your fundraisers.
- Have checklists/organized guidelines. One Home & School keeps an events template with instructions on a Google Drive. It's a great starting point for new volunteers.
- Have a wrap-up meeting after an event (at the next Home & School meeting, for example) to discuss what worked and what needs to be improved.
- Make full use of those annual president's and treasurer's reports. They're helpful for future volunteers and when shared with parents, a good way to let your community know what you do.

Make sure there is a good hand-off to your successor.

- Pass on your acquired knowledge.
- Mentor the newcomer. Be available to answer questions in the early days.
- Connect a newcomer with a seasoned mentor from another Home & School.



A Guided Tour of Some of the Highlights of Language Legislation in Quebec: 1961-2023

OUR JOURNEY BEGINS on March 24th, 1961, when the Québec Liberal Party government led by Premier Jean Lesage established l'Office québécois de la langue française. The Minister of Youth was Paul Gérin-Lajoie, and in 1964, he became the first person since 1875 to be appointed Minister of Education, serving in that position until 1966. As Minister of Education, he was the driving force behind major changes in Québec's education system. He did not run for re-election in 1970.

On December 9th, 1968, the Union Nationale government of Premier Jean-Jacques Bertrand created a Commission of Inquiry on the Position of the French Language and on Language Rights in Québec, also known as the Gendron Commission. Its mandate was as follows: to make an inquiry into and report on the position of French as the working language in Québec; to recommend actions to support the language rights of the majority and protect that of the minority; and to ensure the full development and spread of the French language in Québec in all lines of business, be they educational, cultural, social or econom-

Jean-Denis Gendron, a linguist and assistant dean at the Faculty of Arts of l'Université Laval. In 1969, Union Nationale Deputy Premier and Minister of Education Jean-Guy Cardinal introduced Bill 63, the Act to Promote the French Language in Québec. Bill 63 required children receiving their education in English to acquire a working knowledge of French, and also required everything to be done so that immigrants acquired the knowledge of French upon their arrival in Québec.

ic in nature. The commission was chaired by

The Québec Liberal Party government of Premier Robert Bourassa, elected in the general election of April 1970, amended the Gendron Commission's mandate, making it responsible "first and foremost for the issues of French B language at the workplace, the integration of new

Quebecers in the province's Francophone community, and the language rights of our citizens." Bill 63 was repealed as the result of unprecedented opposition by Québec's francophone population, which believed the bill was too weak a measure. Education Minister François Cloutier introduced Bill 22, the Official Language Act, which made French the sole official language of Québec in July of 1974. On June 27th, 1976, the Charter of Human Rights and Freedoms, also known as "the Québec Charter" came into effect.

Le Parti Québécois won a majority in the general election held on November 15th, 1976, and René Lévesque became premier. Claude Laurin, the Minister of Cultural Development, introduced Bill 101: the Charter of the French Language,

> which received royal assent on August 26th, 1977. The bill made French the normal and everyday language of work, instruction, communication, commerce, and business.

Robert Bourassa returned to power in the general election of December 2nd, 1985. In December 1988, his Liberal government invoked the notwithstanding clause in introducing Bill 178, An

Act to amend the Charter of the French Language (Bill 101). This followed the Supreme Court of Canada ruling earlier that year that declared void Bill 101's provisions for unilingual public commercial signs and advertising, and for acceptance of trade names in French only. On June 17th, 1993, Bill 86 again modified the Charter of the French Language to allow the use of languages other than French on outdoor public signs in Québec, as long as French was most prominent.

Welcome to the 21st Century! Lucien Bouchard resigns as premier and party leader of le Parti Québécois and is replaced by Bernard Landry on March 8th, 2001. Diane Lemieux, the Minister of State for Culture and Communications, sponsors Bill 104, An Act to amend the Charter of the French Language (Bill 101). Its mission

was to define and conduct Québec policy in the areas of linguistic officialization, terminology, and the francization of the civil administration and enterprises.

Let us jump ahead to 2018 and the election of the first Coalition Avenir Québec government under Premier François Legault. Minister of Immigration, Diversity, and Inclusiveness Simon Jolin-Barrette invokes the notwithstanding clause sponsoring Bill 21, An Act respecting the Laicity of the State, which comes into force on June 16th, 2019.

Jean-François Roberge, Minister of Education and Higher Education, sponsors Bill 40, **An Act to amend mainly the Education Act with regard to school organization and governance.** Bill 40 receives royal assent on February 8th, 2020, turning *les commissions scolaires* into *les centres de services scolaires*. The nine English school boards do not become school service centres.

And no doubt, the most controversial move of all, Simon Jolin-Barrette, Minister Responsible for the French Language, invokes the notwithstanding clause preemptively, sponsoring Bill 96, An Act respecting French, the official and common language of Québec, which receives royal assent on June 1st, 2022, with some exceptions. Bill 96 attempts to unilaterally amend the Constitution Act of

1867 in the following manner:

CONSTITUTION ACT, 1867

166. The Constitution Act, 1867 (30 & 31 Victoria, c. 3 (U.K.); 1982, c. 11 (U.K.)) is amended by inserting the following after section 90:

"FUNDAMENTAL CHARACTERISTICS OF QUEBEC

"90Q.1. Quebecers form a nation.

"90Q.2. French shall be the only official language of Quebec.

It is also the common language of the Quebec nation."

Court challenges abound as Bills 21, 40, and 96 slowly make their way through the judicial steeplechase of the Courts of Québec. It is the prediction of many legal experts that referrals to the Supreme Court of Canada will be inevitable during 2023.

He was elected to the QFHSA Board of Directors on June 1, 2023.

She is a former president of the English Parents' Committee Association (EPCA) and served as vice-chair of the Council of Commissioners for the Western Québec School Board.

Wayne Daly, the chairman of the Western Québec School Board, writes that Rhonda was "an advocate for students and staff, and was committed to doing whatever necessary to promote and support teaching and learning in our schools and centres." One of Rhonda's friends writes, "Her kindness and dedication to our neighborhood are qualities that will not be quickly forgotten by anyone who knows her."

The QFHSA salutes Rhonda Boucher for her many years of dedicated service to her own community and far beyond. Our thoughts are with her family in this difficult time.

The QFHSA Office is closed from June 30th to August 15th, but the staff will be monitoring emails. Have a great summer!


