Social Programing for Lower North Shore Seniors

The day centres for seniors and those with a loss of autonomy in small communities have the potential to address many of the needs of the seniors and their communities. Seniors and those with a loss of autonomy face obstacles and struggle daily with aspects of everyday life which many people take for granted. For the seniors and those with a loss of autonomy population of the Lower North Shore, the level of difficulty is multiplied due to being a remote and isolated region which lacks facilities, services, and programs.

The Day Centers and programs across the region are meeting some of the needs of the seniors and those with a loss of autonomy. However, it is also clear that a successful day centre requires a dedicated animator, the support of everyone in the community, as well as sustainable funding to keep its doors open on a regular basis and to be able to carry out effective programming.

In this edition we wanted to showcase the programs that are on-going through our Day Centers and the importance of them and take the opportunity to Thank all our partners on and off the Lower North Shore for their on-going support and dedication to our SENIORS.

Day Centers for seniors and those with a loss of autonomy

The Day Centers goal is to help seniors keep their independence and quality of life with therapeutic, preventative and fun activities designed just for them. The following is a brief overview of programs carried out by the Coasters Association and support by its partners.

Currently, there are eight (8) Day Centers in place for seniors and those with a loss of autonomy; Kegaska, La Romaine, Harrington Harbour, Tête à la Baleine, La Tabatiere, St. Augustine, St. Paul's River and Blanc Sablon. In 2017 approximately 550-day center days were held, 180 adapted exercise classes and 140 craft days were held.

Books on Wheels

This program is meant to break the isolation of seniors and those with a loss of autonomy through

social participation and the inclusion of seniors. In 2017, one hundred and fifty-seven (157) Books on Wheels days were held; there are a variety of books, many of which are in large print, if you wish to borrow books, you can contact the Day Center animator in your community or visit the Day Center.

Community Kitchens/Meals on Wheels

One hundred and forty-two (142) community kitchens events were held, as well as various health promotional activities and community events. The Meals on Wheels program is going strong in Chevery and St. Paul's River. Chevery provides outreach frozen meals to Kegeska, Tête a la Baleine, and La Tabatiere. St. Paul's serves the community of St. Paul's River, Old Fort Bay and Middle Bay.



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Home Visits

Animators also carry out home visits; they are offered to seniors who are unable to participate in the Day Center activities (especially during the winter months). In 2017, approximately five hundred (500) home visits were carried out in various communities. It has proven to be a much-needed service and seniors enjoy having the Animators visit them on a regular basis; however, they are always encouraged to participate in Day Center Activities.

Respite Services

The Coasters Association is pleased to have an amazing partnership with the Alzheimer's Society Cote-Nord to provide respite services to the caregivers of the Lower North Shore. Approximately sixty (60) hours per week is allocated to this service and we are happy to say that these hours are being used on a regular basis.

A Special Thank you to the Alzheimer's Society for recognizing the need in our region. In 2017 approximately three thousand (3000) hours were offered to caregivers in Respite Services. Respite care provides caregivers a temporary rest from caregiving, while the person with Alzheimer's, dementia or those who are housebound receives care in a safe environment at home. If you have a love one who suffers from Alzheimer's or dementia, please feel free to call and we will make every effort to support you.

Health Promotion & Prevention

The purpose of the health promotion programming at the day centers is to increase access to health and social services, help break isolation, promote active ageing and maintain independence, as well as provide support for caregivers. This has been very successful, and information is being disbursed through the Day Centers to the local population, via posters, workshops, luncheons. A "Panier des services", in regard to health promotion programs is offered to seniors in the communities through the health center.

Telehealth - CHEP

The Community Health Education Program (CHEP) is a distance support program that offers Englishlanguage health and social services information to remote and rural Quebec communities, mainly via

videoconference. The video conferences are streamed from the Montreal Children's Hospital and communities hook up through the local Community Learning Centers (CLCs).

Community Animation

The community animators support all the programs in their respective communities and are doing a great job! BioMarine Conference Rimouski 2017 October 1st to 3rd 2017

Biomarine is an international marine development network for businesses, governments, investors and various other partners. They hold an annual conference to share successes, develop new partnerships and work on the ongoing innovation in the marine industry.

In 2016, this conference was held in Oslo Norway, where Kimberly had the opportunity to attend thanks to a recommendation by Merinov, which was followed by an invitation from Maritime Affairs in Quebec to participate in their delegation. It was here a partnership with Pierre Erwes the BioMarine Chariman was made. Thanks to this partnership, the ongoing bio-development on the LNS was asked to present a workshop on Commercialization and Distribution of Marine Ingredients: Biological Actives and Brands Inspired by the Sea during the 2017 Conference on Monday October 2nd. The Lower North Shore delegation was also given the opportunity to pitch the Lower North Shore (LNS) Cosmetic Concept –Clean Beauty from the Arctic A delegation from the Lower North Shore (LNS) was able to participate in the Bio-Marine conference, Kimberly Buffitt; Lower North Shore Bioproducts Solidarity Cooperative, Dean McKinnon-GIDC (local business), James Buckle- Coasters Association Inc, Julie Monger; MRC, Karla Roberts; Master's Student University of Quebec at Trois Riveres and Jessica Poole; Master's Student University of Quebec at Trois Riveres. A special thanks to the MRC du Golfe du Saint Laurent for giving 4000\$ in funding for Lower North Shore Bio-Products Cooperative to send two delegates to attend the conference. Also in attendance were partners that have been aiding in moving our bio-development initiatives forward, Simon Barnabe- PhD University of Quebec at Trois Riveres, Louis-Charles Rainville-PhD Merinov, David Courtemanche-PhD Merinov and Maxim Tardiff-Biopterre.

On September 29th and 30th the team from the LNS and our pre-existing research team in Quebec (University and CCTT Partners) met with cosmetic professionals (Lillian Georges PhD-Pure Beauty Concepts Consulting firm and Former R&D Innovations lead at Este Lauder Companies ,Greg Chambers- President Clean Culture Laboratories, Vince Penn- VP of Clean Culture Laboratories, Shahan Lazar- Senior VP of R & D, Estee Lauder Inc, responsible for global R &D for all Estee Lauder brands and developer of key industry products for Revlon and Avon) to discuss the opportunity of formula and brand development on the LNS. This meeting was very successful, fostering a clear path forward the next steps would be to put together a list



of all the plants that could be used to make the cosmetics, finalize a business plan to bring 10,000 units of cosmetics to test market, and the proper marketing image for an arctic line.

On October 1st, 2017 an opening ceremony was held by the Premier of Quebec, Prince of Monaco, Minister of Fisheries, Minister of Maritime affairs, Minister of Seas from Portugal, which discussed the opportunities ahead in the development of the blue economy in the world.

On October 2nd, Kimberly Buffitt presented on a panel for commercialization of cosmetics with Lillian Georges, Shanan Nazar, and Vincent Penna. We were also able to speak to a Chinese Busniessman, Danny Qui the Chairman of the Board of Directors of Benthos BioScience, that was introduced to us by Pierre Erwes the conference chairman. Mr. Qui invited us to a meeting with Quebec government officials (Martime Affairs, MAPAQ, etc...), Simon Barnabe-UQTR and Yacine Boumagher-CEPROQ

goodies, laughs, and music took place followed by the viewing of the local Canada Day Parade. The seniors had a blast.

A second outing for the seniors at Beaux Sejours took place in Middle Bay, Quebec, at the beautiful Historic Museum. LNS Housing Corporation

A provisionary board of directors was formed to establish a sustainable Housing Plan for seniors and low-income families on the LNS through the support of the Coasters Association, in collaboration with the CISSSCN. A project was approved by the MRC (for one year) to hire an Administrative Assistant to incorporate the LNS Housing Corporation and work in partnership with the LNS Senior Housing

committees/working groups and other local and regional groups (Municipalities, Local Table Seniors, CISSS Côte-Nord, MRC, CSL, Lower North Coalition for Health, etc...) to identify needs, key priorities, build community profiles, carry out necessary assessments and produce a detailed business plan. The job will be posted, and the candidate selected to start in the New Year. The members of the provisionary board of directors are: Darlene Rowsell Roberts, Randy Jones, Laurette Gallibois, Eileen Scholfield, Tony Roberts, Johanne Beaudoin and Vincent Joncas.

The Coasters Association Inc. has been managing the Residence aux Beaux Sejours, seniors home in the Municipality of Blanc Sablon, in partnership with the CISSSCN since April, 2015, and will continue to do so until the LNS Housing Corporation is incorporated and prepared for management. La Romaine Seniors on the MOVE...

The Seniors of La Romaine have been busy the last three (3) years with help from our partners such as the Coasters Association, CLE, PARSIS and student projects. All activities are held at the "joie de vivre"; Seniors day center activities are held from Monday to Thursday, the seniors participate in activities such as paint, crafts, knitting, walk in a group or just have a coffee and chat. Men also participate and come to play "pool" three times a week. Twice a week a community kitchen is held, and a meal is shared. Celebrations are also held every two (2) months to celebrate the birthdays of seniors in the community. Community gardens are also a positive activity for the seniors in the community.





In 2016, the Club Anti-Âge employed a senior to work on the museum/interpretation center which has been open to the public since May 2017. This employee is responsible to carry out the research and to entertain the visitors. The center recounts the past, with a time line, a genealogic tree and an even a model of the village in the early 50.



Currently a documentary is being done with the seniors to share stories about the past, such as; old jobs like telegraph, cooking without electricity, how they got their jobs, was it passed on to them by their dad, ie: from generation to generation...

Harrington Harbour Day Center

This past summer (2017) was a very busy time at the Day Center in Harrington Harbour. On June 15th there was a cupcake sale to raise awareness on the Mistreatment of Seniors. One hundred and twenty (120) cupcakes were made and sold. Thank you to the population for their generosity.





On June 30th a celebration was held to celebrate Canada's 150th Birthday with the Residents at the DG Hodd Pavillion and some family members. Following the singing of 'O Canada, a lovely dinner was held. Thank you to everyone who came to make the day a special one for the residents.





The residents were out and about in the village and the Golf Cart was a very useful means of transportation. It allowed the residents to explore the village and breath in the nice salty air. Those that were able, also strolled out on the wharf to see the fishing boats docked there, and continue over to the Table, St. Paul's Tourism Development Association, and the Eastern Lower North Shore Harbour Authority. Priorities, strategic orientations, and challenges were identified by consultation participants, and recognized as the most critical issues that need to be addressed to ensure the long-term viability of the Lower North Shore. Major accomplishments were also presented. The results of the consultation were:

• The Coasters Association will provide the Québec representative of the Office of Commissioner of Official Languages with a summary report of the meeting, and the Québec representative of the Office of Commissioner of Official Languages will recommend the Commissioner of Official Languages request a meeting with the Auditor General of Canada.

The report was forwarded to OCOL for the pan-Canadian consultation held in Montreal on November 30th, 2017. David Johnson has visited the coast on two occasions and Charles Taker on a number of occasions, we value their partnership and we look forward to their next visit with the new Commissioner of Official Languages.

Partnership with the native community of Pakuashipi

They participated in the "Blanket Exercise" at Mgr Scheffer school and the community of Blanc Sablon organized by CLC/CSL, and attended the Remembrance Day event in St. Paul's, tour of the fish plant and museums of St. Paul's and Middle Bay with the support of Garland Nadeau, and the bio-product coop with Kimberly Buffitt.

Therefore, priorities must be promoted to access resources for vulnerable seniors to meet their basic needs, increase availability of housing for seniors so they can remain in their communities as long as possible and maximize the use of material, financial and human resources.

Recent Meetings/Activities of the Coasters Association

Results of the LNS Research Center Partnership Meeting

A total of thirty-four (34) guests were connected by teleconference and Zoom Video at four regional sites in Chevery, La Tabatiere, St. Augustine, and St. Paul's River, and one off-coast site in Quebec City, coming together to attend the three -day partnership meeting of the Lower North Shore Research Center from May 23rd, to 25th, 2017.

Five (5) organizations presented, six (6) objectives of the Research Center were discussed, thirteen (13) industries were identified on the Lower North Shore, three of the thirteen industries were targeted (Bioproducts development, Tourism development, and Agriculture & Farming Development) setting objectives, actions, identifying actors, partners, and funders. A two-year timeline was set for various actions of the three industries. Nine (9) partnerships were established, and eleven (11) enhanced.




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Seniors of St. Augustine

The day center has a part-time animator (10 hours) who is responsible for directing the different activities. The center has planned activities such as: community events and crafts days. At the moment they are making quilts and aprons and preparing for a spring sale, at which time the seniors in Chevery will be invited. On November 13th, 2017, they celebrated caregivers' week with a lunch, crafts sale and storytelling, twenty (20) people were in attendance.

The Animator in Tête à la Baleine was very busy this past year organizing community events, dinners, crafts days, fundraisers, books on wheels, meals on wheels, community kitchens, respite services to family caregivers and home visits to isolated and lonely seniors. Since September 2017, the animator has not been available, however, a club member has been keeping things moving and just recently organized and carried out a caregiver's event.
