The Black Community Resources Centre's Intergenerational Health & Social Services program aims to engage, educate and support the overall wellbeing of youth, seniors and everyone in between.This Fall, the BCRC is set to host a variety of workshops and activities. Starting in September,we will be hosting interactive workshops that will inform members of our community on the various resources available in our community.

In October, community members will have the opportunity to attend virtual Food and Nutrition workshops with The Depot Community Food Centre in NDG. These workshops aim to provide participants with useful information to help support their overall health and well-being.In November, we will tap into creative expression with a series of Storyscaping...

... workshops in collaboration with Quebec Writers Federation. During these workshops participants will have the opportunity to enjoy a 3 part workshop series of creative writing and spoken story song. These workshops will take place in addition to our weekly Conversation Tuesday workshops that take place every Tuesday from 11 to 12 PM and our Fun Night Friday workshops that take place every Friday from 5 to 6 PM. All of our workshops are completely free and are hosted on Zoom.

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BCRC RESEARCH UPDATE

The BCRC has just released two reports on our website: The Black in Quebec (BlQ) Summary Report and the Education to Employability Study (E2E).

The Black in Queber Summary Report provides an overview of the Black in Quebec Project which took place from Fall 2019 to Fall 2021 and conducted research on the well-being and vitality of Quebec's English-speaking Black community across several thematic areas. The project produced an Analysis of Outcomes and Information Gaps

documents, held focus groups, and conducted surveys all in an effort to present a profile of the vitality of Quebec's English-speaking Black community.

The Education to Employability Study took place from September 2021 to March 2022 and was a research project focusing on the educational experiences of English-speaking Black Quebecers and how they relate to employability outcomes for members of the community. This project was conducted in collaboration with the Provincial Employment Roundtable of Quebec and the E2E study also has a French version of the report.

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CAN WE TALK: RESEARCH OPPORTUNITY FOR RACIALIZED ESBC


We envision the Knowledge Hub as a platform working towards the aim of establishing BCRC as a reference in the production and dissemination of knowledge about the English Speaking Black Community (ESBC) in Quebec. First thing to consider is what we conceptualize as the ESBC, which is diversely shaped by people of very different social and cultural backgrounds.We hope to engage as many people as possible in this venture, and while we are doing so, contribute to the ongoing efforts at re-establishing the terrain of Black history in Quebec.

Can We Talk will be a research opportunity for racialized ESBC youth to investigate systemic racism and institutional methods of discrimination (i.e. in healthcare, education, employment, and justice). Alongside the contribution to Black scholarship, we envision Can We Talk as a tool in returning agency over the realities and present-day issues of the Black experience back to its writers, while creating a positive environment for community discourse and a vehicle for Black empowerment.

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A BRIEF UPDATE ON THE ANIMATION PROJECT

66 the youth are engaged, and the project is gaining momentum

On April 1st, 2022, the BCRC began organizing and structuring its animation project. The objective is to create an animated series inspired by our youth-authored book Where They Stood: A Historical Account of the Evolution of Black-Anglo Montreal. Thus far, we have successfully recruited a cohort of 10 Black-English speaking youth interested in receiving training in 2D animation. To provide a holistic training experience in 2D animation, the BCRC partnered with Toon Boom, Cinesite, AnnexPro, Concordia, and a few Dawson professors. Toon Boom generously donated more than 15 Harmony and Storyboard pro licenses, and in return, the BCRC purchased Toon Boom's courseware training. Cinesite donated equipment (4 HP pro sprout systems) and hosted a workshop for our youths. The film animation department at Concordia university has been highly supportive, taking a vital role in the project by helping to shape and structure the timeline. A few of the department's teachers have volunteered and led workshops for our youth. In addition, the department has offered this project as an internship for their students.

With two student interns onboard, the project continues to develop. Additional partnerships are brewing, the youth are engaged, and the project is gaining momentum.

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FEATURED STORY OF: BCRC'S VERS UNE JUSTICE ÉGALE PROJECT COORDINATOR

Faile du vélo à Montreal

My name is Veronica, the communication coordinator for BCRC's Vers Une Justice Égale project. During the past months, I animated workshops along with my colleague Stessy.

Based on my experience, I believe that this project is not only important, but necessary. The participants would always let us know how much they appreciated the content of our workshop. We cover a wide range of subjects, from teaching children as young as six years old about cycling etiquette in urban settings, to antiracism workshops.

Moreover, we had several opportunities where a lawyer was present. The participants had direct access for their legal questions to be addressed and answered. It encourages the youth to ask their hypothetical questions and feel more empowered regarding their rights.

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They appreciated that Vers Une Justice Égale provided a wide range of topics which may not be covered in their school curriculum. Furthermore, Stessy and I make an effort to connect our subject to ongoing news/stories around us. It makes our subject more relatable and easier to understand.

As someone who wished that workshops covered by Vers Une Justice Égale was available during my youth, it feels fulfilling to be able to equip the youth with knowledge of their rights and better prepare them for the laws of the society they live in. Lastly, we provided the participants with BCRC merchandise like pens, bags and insulated water bottles which makes them happy as they get to bring home some souvenirs. By extension, they also get to talk to their friends and families about the workshop they attended.

Overall, I feel grounded and humbled to be able to provide these workshops. We cover important subjects that may not be deeply taught in schools. Most importantly, it feels great to see the youth feel more empowered and confidence knowing that they are more educated about their rights.




