All of you reading this have already hit the ground running, and that is pretty much how it has been at the QFHSA provincial offices. With the start of the school year, hosting more than 50 people at our Executive Workshops on the 26th of September, the upcoming School Board Elections on November 2nd and the Fall Conference on October 25th just around the corner, it has been all hands (and then some) on-deck.

We've already published a Special Edition of our Newsletter on School Board Elections, and we are excited about the upcoming Fall Conference on The Brain on the 25th of October. This edition of our newsletter is chock full of stuff, a cornucopia if you will.

As the VOICE of parents and members we need your help this time... Please shout loud and clear to all you know to VOTE on November 2nd as the turn-out is critical to the existence of our education system! Even if you are on the "wrong" electoral list at the end of the revision period, get out and VOTE anyway! Let the government know we want to keep the school boards in the hands of the parents!

What a great question.... Why should you pay \$18 to join the QFHSA?

Yes there is a fee to join the QFHSA. It supports our mission and the operating costs that go with its execution. (See mission on the side panel)

While all the committees and executive positions are carried out by volunteers just like you, we do pay a skeleton-like staff of 1 full-time and 2 part-timers to carry out the day to day operations. Costs like; rent, bank fees, travel, legal fees, and accounting fees are just part of the day to day bills.

The bulk of our funding comes from government grants, but membership fees contribute to much more. Our Fall Conference and AGM for example; with many of our members travelling from great distances, your fees can help to subsidize their costs.

The QFHSA is a provincial association whose diverse membership includes large urban schools, as well as smaller rural schools, some with as few as 45 children. These schools get additional support from the QFHSA as part of our library support projects, and are sent boxes of new and second hand books as there are very few ENGLISH resources in their areas.

There are free training workshops for new Home and School Executives and other parent workshops which are fully subsidized.

The QFHSA is an independent organization that speaks for parents on educational issues. Through its resolutions and briefs, the QFHSA presents to the governments and school boards and other organizations the parents' point of view on often contentious issues. Membership in Home and School gives parents the opportunity to express their point of view on various educational matters as well. You are not paying \$18.00 to volunteer but to be a part of a larger and louder "voice".

The QFHSA promotes literacy through various writing contests, the Reluctant Reader program in various high schools and the Born to Read program which is administered by local Home and School Associations.

We hold memberships in wider organizations like the Canadian Home and School Federation and the Quebec Community Groups Network, as well as well as core membership in Quebec Anglophone Heritage Network and partner with the Community Learning Centres. Your membership fees support a system much bigger than it appears on the outside.

\$18.00 *could* get you between 5 and 10 coffees this year or it can give you a voice and a vote in your local Home and School Association. Take this opportunity to improve the educational experience for all the students in your school. Aren't your children and their future worth it?

A MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

QFHSA: SERVING A UNIQUE ROLE THIS OCTOBER.

The November school board elections will soon be upon us. The lists of candidates for commissioners are now available and many seats are being contested. Electors have an unprecedented opportunity this year

to vote for the position of Chair. But who do you vote for? What do they stand for? Why is it important?

The role that Home and School can play this fall is crucial. As an independent body, we can provide opportunities for the public to meet with the candidates in their Electoral Divisions with "Meet the Candidates Nights" in October. We are doing all we can to create awareness of the importance of getting on the right electoral list and getting out to vote. We have heard the rumours that unless there is a substantial increase in voter

turnout in November, above the 16.7% in the 2007 English school boards elections and the 7.2% turnout in the French school board elections, we may face two choices: Elimination of school boards altogether or the merging of the current school boards. Our 9 English School boards could be reduced to just five (5).

Although the right to have school boards in the minority official language is entrenched in the Canadian Constitution, that does not preclude the government from making drastic changes in the current system. We already feel the effects of the enormous budget cuts the school boards are struggling with. We have to prove to the government that we value our school boards and that we support them. If you do not have a seat being contested in your Electoral Division, please go out and vote for your Candidate for Chair. If you find yourself on a French list rather than an English list, go out and cast a vote anyway! Tell your grandparents, aunts, uncles and neighbours to go out and vote!

The more people who cast a vote in these elections, the better. If you never bothered to vote in a school board election before, make this the time you do! Seriously.

By-Laws: The QFHSA office hopes to have a By-Law template ready by the fall conference.



We've Been Busy with the RER of the QFHSA

In the past year and a half we've headed east to Quebec City **2x** to present our positions in the National Assembly. First, we spoke out against Bill 14 and more stringent language laws. The second time, we presented on Bill 60 and the Quebec Charter of Values.

Sure.... the government that brought these Bills forth is no longer in power, but YOU DID THAT, we did that! We spoke up for the rights and freedoms for everyone, we are the voice of parents! That is what we do! Our mission (on page 3) says it right there, we are the VOICE, your voice!

In May at our AGM we adopted 2 resolutions, and as a result of this work, we've gone west and met with officials on Capital Hill about Resolution 2014-01 Financial Literacy. We spent a half an hour (that is a lot of time when it comes to government meetings) with Yaelle Gang, a policy advisor to the Minister of State for Finance, the Honourable Kevin Sorenson. We've taken action, spoken up, and we've been heard, and there will be results.

Our Resolution 2014-02 on the Permanent Linguistic Voter's List for School Board Elections has had some responses, too! Good reminder to TELL EVERYONE you know to make sure they are on the right list, and to vote on November 2nd, 2014.


Chair of the QFHSA Education Sub-Committee is Mona Segal.

Perspectives of a Parent Commissioner

Looking back on my years as a commissioner brings a sense of pride and accomplishment. I spent ten years as a member of the Council of Commissioners at the Lester B. Pearson School Board; five as a parent commissioner and five as a commissioner. It wasn't always easy. In fact at times it was extremely difficult. However, they were years of great learning and personal growth.

As a longtime parent volunteer and committee member at the school level, the position of parent commissioner was a natural fit for me. Together with my fellow parent commissioner, we were the voice of parents at the school board. It was intimidating, challenging and rewarding, all at the same time.

Parent commissioners are in a very unique position and wear many hats. They are also members of governing boards and the school board's Parent Committee, with great demands on their time. They witness first-hand how the information and decisions that originate at the school board unfold. Being in a good position to gather input at the grassroots level, they work to ensure that a parental perspective is considered in all matters. Over the years, I've seen decisions on issues of safety, transportation, technology, school fees, nutrition, and the consultation process, to name a few, be influenced greatly by the input of parents.

Parental views and concerns can also impact initiatives at the school board. During my years of involvement, we (parents) were the driving force behind governing board training, long before it was required by law. We gave workshops, prepared materials and lists of resources. As well, it was at the continued request of the High School Parents' Committee that our secondary schools now offer a common entrance exam. Another initiative that comes to mind was our annual Volunteer Awards Evening. It was created by the board's Central Parents' Committee, and ran for 17 years before it was unfortunately discontinued two years ago. These are concrete examples of parents making a difference.

The transition from parent commissioner to commissioner was not a difficult one. I went from speaking on behalf of parents to representing all the



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constituents in my Electoral Division. I was also able to vote at Council meetings, a right that as a parent commissioner I did not have. Not being allowed to vote was never an issue for me though, as I always believed it was your voice that mattered most.

That being said, commissioners do make important decisions by vote. They set policy and direction, oversee the management of resources, and work to ensure student success at all levels. Without question, the toughest decisions I made as a commissioner revolved around the closure of schools. These were never taken lightly, knowing full well what an impact they have on the entire community.

Commissioners can and do make a difference. They make decisions that matter to students and the community. Get to know your commissioner candidates and then vote in the school board elections. It will help ensure that the best people are elected to this important position.

Election Perspective from QESBA



November 2nd will see the first school board elections in seven years. It will be a key moment for both the English and French school boards. In 2007 there was a 17% voter participation rate in the English system and an overall 8% rate when the turnout at the French boards is

taken into account. Successive governments have lamented about what to do to either increase the voter turnout or eliminate school board elections all together. We cannot let our right to manage and control our own education system just disappear. In 2014 we need to make a strong statement that we want, need, and support our publicly elected school board system. We certainly don't want to allow the government to appoint our representatives.

We can ensure that the government respects our wish to maintain our system by voting, and voting in large numbers on November 2nd. However, in order for there to be a vote we need candidates. The number of elected Commissioners will be greatly

reduced this election, making each seat all the more important. There will be only 95 commissioners elected to the nine English school boards. Our students from pre-Kindergarten to Adult and Vocational Training are counting on good people to step up to run for election.

It is not hard to get started. You need to be over 18 years of age, a Canadian citizen, your principal residence on the territory of the board in which you want to run for election, and not be prohibited by law from being a candidate. In addition, you need to be prepared to attend school board and community meetings and participate at various events to represent your community. You also should be a passionate believer in the public education system. If you meet those criteria you need an official nomination form, 10 supporting signatures to run for Commissioner or 50 supporting signatures to run for Board Chairman. Deposit your completed form with your local returning officer and you are ready. The nomination period ends on *September* 28^{th} .

QC Quebec Community GR Groups Network

The Quebec Community Groups Network has long held that English schools are one of the cornerstones of our communities. Because a strong English school system is crucial to the vitality and survival of our minority community this year's school board elections will be critical.

As citizens and members of a minority language community we are responsible for our institutions, their health and well-being. We must stay informed and be involved in order to ensure their long term sustainability. We must carry out our civic duty and vote in the up-coming school board elections, not only to choose the right individuals to lead our institutions, but also to demonstrate to the government and to Quebec society at large that our community cares about our school boards and their survival.

It has been seven years since the last school board elections. This year also marks the first time that we will be voting for school board chairs and well as commissioners. These elections are important for the future of English-language educational opportunities for our children and for lifelong learning opportunities for adults.

Commissioners play an important role in our democracy. They set the tone for the management and operations of school boards and their schools. They mirror the values and culture of their communities in the decisions they take. They speak on A VOICE For COMMUNITY COMMITMENT COLLABORATION



behalf of our communities, their needs and aspirations. They intervene with government, civic society and other stakeholders on behalf of the educational, training and lifelong learning needs of our communities. They are responsible for decisions affecting school budgets, staffing, educational priorities, innovations in pedagogy, and even for the survival of schools in areas where there is dwindling enrolment or the construction of new schools where numbers are growing. It is essential for our school board commissioners to be individuals with integrity and intelligence and to have the best interests of our children and our community at heart.

School Board elections are one of the few places where our minority language community can exert control over our institutions. We must all participate to show that our school boards, our schools and the quality of educational services they provide are vital to the future of our English-speaking community in Quebec.





Perspectives of a Commissioner

The Quebec English public school system has much to be proud of. Even with declining enrolment and serious budget cuts, English school boards have exceptionally high success and graduation rates, great alternative, enriched and support programs for students and especially, engaged parents and collaborative stakeholders, all of which have contributed to enhance the vitality of the English-speaking community. At the same time, the ability

of Quebec taxpayers to support and sustain important educational, social, health and family programs is being questioned.

Perspective candidates for election this November 2nd have the dauntless challenge of convincing the public and especially our parents that school boards, as a level of local government, are important. Elected commissioners, in addition to attending committee meetings at the school board, often attend Governing Board meetings in schools and hear the concerns of parents, staff and administration. They play a vital role in determining the particular needs of the individual schools and the community they serve. They also make important policy and budget decisions for the entire board when they meet as a Council. Members of the public and especially the parents of the children we serve have to be convinced that in order to guarantee the survival of elected school boards, they will have to vote in much larger numbers on November 2nd than they did in 2007.

While the government grapples with important budget issues and determines whether the services it provides are sustainable, public education has to continue to be viewed as an important investment in our future. Over the next few months, elected commissioners will have to make some difficult choices and tough decisions. They will have to be data driven and results oriented, and clearly defined as being in the best interests of the students. Elected commissioners will have to work together with other school boards and differently with stakeholders, looking at alternative ways of generating savings, keeping in mind that these savings will be reinvested in student success and perseverance. Failure to change the way we do business, as already is the case in three other provinces, will most definitely result in the public, and ultimately the government, questioning the relevance of elected school boards.

Consult these pages to get clear answers on the most frequently asked questions about the School Board Elections.

Why vote?

- The decisions made in our school boards, including how budgets are spent, are made by the elected commissioners and parent commissioners on behalf of the parents in their Electoral Division.
- These commissioners are in constant touch with the needs of their community. Together, on the council of commissioners, they allocate funds and make decisions that directly affect education, our children, and our greater community.
- The current Liberal Government has already stated they are prepared to eliminate School Boards or drastically restructure them. (Apparently maps have already been drawn with the new zones).
- A STRONG voter turn-out will let the government know we are unwilling to allow the administration of our school boards to take place in the government offices.

Who is Eligible to Vote?

- Almost every Quebec Citizen over the age of 18, (unless they meet one of the criteria in the Act Respecting School Elections which does not permit them to vote).
- For the complete list of rules about voting eligibility see: <u>www.qfhsa.org/schoolboards/htm</u>

How Do I Know If I am on a List?

- Every household in Quebec is to receive a voter card in the mail.
- On that card it will list the eligible voters in the home.
- It will also specify in which School Board Election you are voting.
- If there are no voters indicated by name on the voter card then you are not registered on a list.



Did you know?

If you have children in both the French and the English School Boards in your area, you may vote for candidates in both boards.

What do I do if I am on the Wrong List?

- Voter lists will be in revision until October the 14th and in some school boards until October the 18th. (Verify yours!)
- You will need to contact the Returning Officer of the School Board to which you would like to be added.
 Phone numbers can be found in the table below.
- You will need to request the change in writing.
- Forms can be found on line through the school board or at the location for the electoral list revision
- **IMPORTANT** Please note some school boards are ending their revision period as early as the 14th of October, others on October the 18th.

How did I get on the French List?

- If your children are currently attending an English school board school in your area, you will be on the correct list.
- There was however a time when people were defaulted to the French school board lists once their children had graduated out of the English system.
- New voters, also had been placed on the default French lists, so it makes it imperative that you and your grown children and parents etc... verify your cards when they arrive.



When Do I Vote?

- Advance polls are on October 26th, 2014.
- The location will be listed on your voter card.
- If you change lists, inquire about the times and location of their advance polls.
- Election Day is Sunday November 2, 2014.

OPTIMIZING THE BRAIN FOR LEARNING

The brain is the organ of learning and the most powerful computer in the universe. However, unlike most computers, it doesn't come with a user's manual. Join Michael as he explores how findings from current neuroscientific studies shed light on how our children can optimize their learning.

What are the best conditions for learning? What role do emotions play in learning and how can we exploit them? What about exercise, diet, sleep? In this talk Michael will also explore the difference between valid science and the many myths about the brain and learning.

All students can learn effectively -- and a little knowledge about how the brain and mind operate can help us ensure our children have the best chance of success. Let Michael be your tour guide for the human brain as he points out the many features that can help all our children succeed!

Feeling Sad, Feeling Blue: Depression in Children and Adolescents

Most children handle the "ups and down" of everyday life with minimal impact. However, for some children, the various challenges and demands of everyday life can lead to long bouts of unhappiness. Thinking Traps Workshop Sat. OR Sun Oct. 18 or 19, 2014

Have you ever felt certain you knew enough to make a judgment only to find out later you were wrong? Have you ever read too much into an email from a friend or colleague? Do you sometimes blame others or external factors for things of your own doing? Thinking Traps may just be the workshop for you.


For eight years now, Concordia University Applied Human Sciences department has been partnering with Lester B. Pearson School Board to develop one-day interactive workshops aimed at all members of the Lester B. community. The Concordia Masters students are required to develop a one-day workshop for a "client". LBPSB is the client and the workshop has to be custom developed for our staff and community.

In preparation for the workshop Thinking Traps, the Concordia Human Systems Intervention students set out to understand what makes the Lester B. Pearson School Board tick.

The students learn about us by attending Governing Board meetings, Home & School meetings, an Art Show at an elementary school, a Council meeting, a tour of head office and several other events. They gather their notes and are challenged by the members of the cohort on their findings. This has been part of the process for the past eight years and last year's cohort created this "quilt" representing their conclusions.

The Concordia students managed to push all our buttons with this clear representation of who we are.

Thinking traps are something every person experiences. In our everyday lives we take in more information through our senses than our brains can process. To help us cope we take shortcuts, filtering the information and developing ways of thinking that can trap us.



We often get caught in our own thinking patterns that frame the way we view the world. As part of these patterns, there are a series of well-documented traps that prevent us from seeing the true picture. This impacts our relationships with others and may very well limit and close doors to opportunities for learning and growth.

Join us for this one-day interactive workshop to learn more about common thinking traps, identify ones that you fall into, and learn strategies to help you avoid them.

It is open to all staff, parents and community members of LBPSB. It is being held on Saturday, October 18th and again on Sunday, October 19th at the Pearson Electrotechnology Centre in Lachine. The partnership between the board and Concordia allows this workshop to be offered at a very low cost of \$25, which covers some of the administrative overhead expenses.

How Finland Keeps Kids Focused Through Free Play

Like a zombie, Sami—one of my fifth graders—lumbered over to me and hissed, "I think I'm going to explode! I'm not used to this schedule." And I believed him. An angry red rash was starting to form on his forehead.

Yikes, I thought. *What a way to begin <u>my first year of teaching in</u> <u>Finland</u>. It was only the third day of school and I was already pushing a student to the breaking point. When I took him aside, I quickly discovered why he was so upset.*

Throughout this first week of school, I had gotten creative with my fifth grade timetable. Normally, students and teachers in Finland take a 15-minute break after every 45 minutes of

instruction. During a typical break, students head outside to play and socialize with friends while <u>teachers</u> <u>disappear to the lounge to chat over</u> <u>coffee</u>.

I didn't see the point of these frequent pit stops. As a teacher in the United States, I'd spent several consecutive hours with my students in the classroom. And I was trying to replicate this model in Finland. The Finnish way seemed soft and I was convinced that kids learned better

with longer stretches of instructional time. So I decided to hold my students back from their regularly scheduled break and teach two 45-minute lessons in a row, followed by a double break of 30 minutes. Now I knew why the red dots had appeared on Sami's forehead.

Come to think of it, I wasn't sure if the American approach had ever worked very well. My students in the States had always seemed to drag their feet after about 45 minutes in the classroom. But they'd never thought of revolting like this shrimpy Finnish fifth grader, who was digging in his heels on the third day of school. At that moment, I decided to embrace the Finnish model of taking breaks.

Once I incorporated these short recesses into our timetable, I no longer saw feet-dragging, zombie-like kids in my classroom. Throughout the school year, my Finnish students would—without fail—enter the classroom with a bounce in their steps after a 15-minute break. And most importantly, they were more focused during lessons.

At first, I was convinced that I had made a groundbreaking discovery: frequent breaks kept students fresh throughout the day. But then I remembered that Finns have known this for years; they've been providing breaks to their students since the 1960s. What's most important is not *where* kids take breaks but how much freedom we give them from their structured work. In my quest to understand the value of the Finnish practice, I stumbled upon the work of Anthony Pellegrini—author of *Recess: Its Role in Education and Development* and emeritus professor of educational psychology at the University of Minnesota—who has praised this approach for more than a decade. In East Asia where most primary schools give their students a 10-minute break



after 40 minutes or so of classroom instruction—Pellegrini observed the same phenomenon that I had witnessed at my Finnish school. After these shorter recesses, students appeared to be more attentive in the classroom.

Not satisfied with anecdotal evidence alone, Pellegrini and his colleagues ran a series of experiments at a public elementary school to explore the relationship between recess timing and attentiveness in the classroom. In every one of the experiments, students were more attentive after a break than before a break. They also found that the children were less attentive when the timing of the break was delayed—or in other words, when the

lesson dragged on.

In Finland, primary school teachers seem to know this intuitively. They send kids outside—rain or shine for their frequent recesses. And the children get to decide how they spend their break times. Usually, teachers in Finland take turns—two at a time supervising the playground during these 15-minute stints.

Although I favor the Finnish model, I realize that unleashing fifth graders on the playground every hour

would be a huge shift for most schools. According to Pellegrini, breaks don't have to be held outdoors to be beneficial. In one of his experiments at the public elementary school, students had their recess times inside the school and the results matched those of other experiments where students took their breaks outside: After their breaks, the children were more attentive in class. What's most important is not *where* kids take breaks but how much freedom we give them from their structured work. When break times are teacher-directed, Pellegrini found, the recess loses its value. It's <u>free-play</u> that gives students the opportunity to develop social competence. During these times, they not only rest and recharge—they also learn to cooperate, communicate, and compromise, all skills they need to succeed academically as well as in life.

As a teacher, I'm always trying to improve my classroom through experimentation. What I realized in Finland, with the help of a flustered fifth grader, is that once I started to see a break as a strategy to maximize learning, I stopped feeling guilty about shortening classroom instruction. Pellegrini's findings confirm that frequent breaks boost attentiveness in class. With this in mind, we no longer need to fear that students won't learn what they need to learn if we let them disconnect from their work for 10 or 15minute periods, several times throughout the school day. And let's be honest here, we teachers benefit from these breaks, too.




