## Introduction

## About These Profiles

These profiles draw from the 2021 Census of Canada to provide pertinent socio-demographic information on the population aged 55 and over of Québec's English-speaking communities and their families in accordance with Québec's RTS (réseau territorial de services) territories. ${ }^{1}$ They include information on their numbers, where they live and their living arrangements, their socio-economic status, their status as recent immigrants to Québec and their likelihood to be members of a visible minority. Each regional profile includes tables, graphs and information notes that provide provincial and regional statistics for selected characteristics as well as comparisons between French-speaking majority and English-speaking minority populations within these administrative territories.

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## Definitions and Concepts

These profiles draw data from the Statistics Canada 2021 Census of Canada and are organized in accordance with its definitions and concepts. The census dictionary is available at, https://www12.statcan.gc.ca/census-recensement/2021/ref/dict/index-eng.cfm

Language definition. There are numerous linguistic definitions that are used to identify the English-speaking population in Québec. The choice of linguistic indicator depends largely on the issue being examined. These profiles use the First Official Language Spoken (FOLS) definition with multiple responses proportionally distributed since it best reflects the total English-speaking health service users in the province. First Official Language Spoken is derived from three census questions: knowledge of official languages, mother tongue and home language. Dual responses are divided equally among English-speaking and French-speaking groups. Other definitions include Mother tongue which refers to the first language learned at home in childhood and still understood. The language most often spoken at home is used to designate the home language. Knowledge of official languages indicates the official language in which a person can carry on a conversation. The language used most often at work indicates the language spoken most frequently at work.

Census Family households are those with a married couple (with or without children), or a couple living common-law (with or without children), or a lone parent living with one or more children (lone-parent family). Census family is defined as a married couple and the children, if any, of either and/or both spouses; a couple living common law and the children, if any, of either and/or both partners; or a lone parent of any marital status with at least one child living in the same dwelling and that child or those children. All members of a particular census family live in the same dwelling. A couple may be of opposite or same sex. Children may be children by birth, marriage, common-law union or adoption regardless of their age or marital status as long as they live in the dwelling and do not have their own married spouse, common-law partner or child living in the dwelling. Grandchildren living with their grandparent(s) but with no parents present also constitute a census family.

Private household refers to a person or group of persons who occupy the same dwelling and do not have a usual place of residence elsewhere in Canada or abroad. For census purposes, households are classified into three groups: private households, collective households and households outside Canada. Unless otherwise specified, all data in census products are for private households only.

Mobility status refers to the status of a person with regard to the place of residence on the date of the census survey in relation to the place of residence on the same date five years earlier.

Recent inter-provincial migration refers to movement from one province or territory to another involving change in the place of residence in the last five years.

Immigrant includes persons who are, or who have ever been, landed immigrants or permanent residents.
Recent Immigrant refers to immigrants who first obtained their landed immigrant or permanent resident status in Canada in the five years prior to a given census.

Educational Attainment - Persons with low educational attainment are those with only a high school graduation certificate or less while those with high educational attainment are those with a university bachelor's degree or higher.

Income - Persons with low income are those with individual after-tax income less than $\$ 20 \mathrm{k}$ while those with high income reported $\$ 50 \mathrm{k}$ or more. This includes income from all sources.

Low Income Cut-Off (LICO) uses the income levels of a given family and considers how large a share of its income is spent on necessities such as food, shelter and clothing. If the amount a family spends is $20 \%$ higher than an average family in a year, it falls into the low income cut-off category. People who live below income cut-offs may be said to live in "straitened circumstances." (Human Resources and Skills Development Canada, August 2009.) This profile uses before-tax LICO data.

Unemployment - In order to be counted as unemployed you have to be out of work, looking for work, and able to accept a job if one is offered to you. If you are out of work and not looking, then you are considered "not in the labor force" rather than unemployed.

Out of the Labour Force - Persons who are neither employed nor unemployed are not in the labor force. This category includes retired persons, students, those taking care of children or other family members, and others who are neither working nor seeking work.

## Methodological Notes

## Data Sources

These profiles draw information from datasets developed by the Community Health and Social Services Network (CHSSN) using the 2021 Census of Canada. Findings are provided for Québec's RTS territories in which there are at least 250 English speaking residents.

The statistics are drawn from two different Statistics Canada data sources which vary according (1) to the definition of the population surveyed and (2) by the questionnaire that was administered.

The statistics for table and graphs for population size and age structure are based on a $100 \%$ sample of Canadians including people in noninstitutional collective dwellings. These individuals answered Statistics Canada's 2021 short form census questionnaire. The statistics for all other tables and graphs are based on a $25 \%$ sample of Canadians living in private households. This sample excludes individuals in institutions and noninstitutional collective dwellings. These individuals answered Statistics Canada's 2021 long form questionnaire.

The short form census questionnaire reaches a larger population, but the long form census is the primary source of exhaustive demographic data in Canada. Without the long form, the socio-demographic characteristics other than population size and age structure included in this BDR report would not be attainable.

## Census Profile - Random rounding

To ensure confidentiality, the values, including totals, are randomly rounded either up or down to a multiple of '5' or '10.' To understand these data, you must be aware that each individual value is rounded. As a result, when these data are summed or grouped, the total value may not match the individual values since totals and sub-totals are independently rounded. Similarly, percentages, which are calculated on rounded data, may not necessarily add up to $100 \%$. Statistics Canada

To avoid unreliable figures, proportions based on less than 25 individuals are not shown.

These profiles use the First Official Language Spoken (FOLS) definition with multiple responses proportionally distributed since it best reflects the total English-speaking health service users in the province. First Official Language Spoken is derived from three census questions: knowledge of official languages, mother tongue and home language. Dual responses are divided equally among English-speaking and French-speaking groups.

- Among English speakers aged 55 to 64 years in Québec, $10.0 \%$ reported having moved locally in the past five years. This was similar to the proportion among French speakers aged 55 to 64 years (10.4\%).
- In Québec, $7.7 \%$ of the English speakers 65 to 74 years reported having moved locally in the past five years in 2021. This was lower than the proportion among French speakers (8.9\%).
- In 2021, 6.3\% of English speakers aged 75 to 84 years in Québec reported having moved locally in the past five years. This was much lower than the proportion for French speakers (9.2\%).
- Among English speakers aged 85 years and over in Québec, $5.9 \%$ reported having moved locally in the past five years. This was much lower than the proportion among French speakers (9.5\%).

- In 2021, there were 29,285 English speakers aged 55 years and over living in Québec who reported having moved from another region of Québec in the past five years. They represented $8.5 \%$ of the English-speaking population. This was much lower than the proportion for French speakers (11.8\%).
- Among English speakers aged 55 to 64 years in Québec, $9.6 \%$ reported having moved from another region of Québec in the past five years. This was much lower than the proportion among French speakers aged 55 to 64 years (13.6\%).
- In Québec, $8.2 \%$ of the English speakers 65 to 74 years reported having moved from another region of Québec in the past five years in 2021. This was much lower than the proportion among French speakers (11.5\%).
- In 2021, $6.9 \%$ of English speakers aged 75 to 84 years in Québec reported having moved from another region of Québec in the past five years. This was much lower than the proportion for French speakers (9.1\%).

- In 2021, there were 4,790 English speakers aged 55 years and over living in Québec who reported having immigrated from another country in the past five years. They represented 1.4\% of the English-speaking population. This was much higher than the proportion for French speakers (0.3\%).
- Among English speakers aged 55 to 64 years in Québec, $1.9 \%$ reported having immigrated from another country in the past five years. This was much higher than the proportion among French speakers aged 55 to 64 years (0.4\%).
- In Québec, $1.2 \%$ of the English speakers 65 to 74 years reported having immigrated from another country in the past five years in 2021. This was much higher than the proportion among French speakers (0.3\%).
- In 2021, $0.7 \%$ of English speakers aged 75 to 84 years in Québec reported having immigrated from another country in the past five years. This was much higher than the proportion for French speakers (0.1\%).

- In 2021, there were 157,590 English speakers aged 55 years and over living in Québec who reported a low level of educational attainment. They represented $45.7 \%$ of the English-speaking population. This was lower than the proportion for French speakers (48.5\%).
- Among English speakers aged 55 to 64 years in Québec, $40.1 \%$ reported a low level of educational attainment. This was similar to the proportion among French speakers aged 55 to 64 years (40.2\%).
- In Québec, $47.2 \%$ of the English speakers 65 to 74 years reported a low level of educational attainment in 2021. This was lower than the proportion among French speakers (49.8\%).
- In 2021, $53.1 \%$ of English speakers aged 75 to 84 years in Québec reported a low level of educational attainment. This was lower than the proportion for French speakers (60.0\%).
- Among English speakers aged 85 years and over in Québec, $63.2 \%$ reported a low level of educational attainment. This was lower than the proportion among French speakers (74.5\%).

- In 2021, there were 145,500 English speakers aged 55 years and over living in Québec who reported being in the labour force. They represented $42.2 \%$ of the English-speaking population. This was higher than the proportion for French speakers (35.9\%).
- Among English speakers aged 55 to 64 years in Québec, $70.0 \%$ reported being in the labour force. This was higher than the proportion among French speakers aged 55 to 64 years (65.2\%).
- In Québec, $18.3 \%$ of the English speakers 65 years and over reported being in the labour force in 2021. This was much higher than the proportion among French speakers (13.5\%).

- In 2021, the unemployment rate among English speakers aged 55 years and over living in Québec was $11.3 \%$. This was higher than the rate French speakers (9.7\%).
- Among English speakers aged 55 to 64 years, the unemployment rate was $10.8 \%$. This was much higher than the unemployment rate for French speakers aged 55 to 64 years ( $7.3 \%$ ).
- In Québec the unemployment rate among English speakers 65 years and over was $12.7 \%$. This was much lower than the unemployment rate for French speakers (18.6\%).

- Among English speakers aged 55 to 64 years in Québec, $23.3 \%$ reported earnings less than $\$ 20,000$. This was much higher than the proportion among French speakers aged 55 to 64 years (18.9\%).
- In Québec, 21.7\% of the English speakers 65 to 74 years reported earnings less than $\$ 20,000$ in 2021. This was higher than the proportion among French speakers (18.9\%).
- In 2021, 18.5\% of English speakers aged 75 to 84 years in Québec reported earnings less than $\$ 20,000$. This was similar to the proportion for French speakers (19.2\%).
- Among English speakers aged 85 years and over in Québec, $11.9 \%$ reported earnings less than $\$ 20,000$. This was similar to the proportion among French speakers (12.1\%).

- In 2021, there were 115,590 English speakers aged 55 years and over living in Québec who reported earning \$50,000 and over. They represented $33.5 \%$ of the English-speaking population. This was higher than the proportion for French speakers (31.6\%).
- Among English speakers aged 55 to 64 years in Québec, $39.5 \%$ reported earning $\$ 50,000$ and over. This was lower than the proportion among French speakers aged 55 to 64 years (42.9\%).
- In Québec, 30.1\% of the English speakers 65 to 74 years reported earning $\$ 50,000$ and over in 2021. This was higher than the proportion among French speakers (26.5\%).
