


# Summer is around the corner and things are moving and shaking at the ETRC



## Introducing the ETRC's new Head Archivist, Jazmine Aldrich!

You may have noticed a new name connected to the ETRC more recently, that of Jazmine Aldrich. Jazmine took the reins of the Archives Department following long-time archivist Jody Robinson's transition to the role of Executive Director.

Jazmine recently shared a bit about herself for our archives blog page: I am a proud Townshipper, descended from settlers in the Stanstead and Magog areas. I studied History and Indigenous Studies at Bishop's University and completed my Master of Information Studies degree at McGill. Before taking on the position of Head Archivist of

organizations in Quebec and Ontario since 2017. I am passionate about preserving and sharing our rich local history.



- John-Peter Ward fonds (P258). New acquisition. 1988-2004, 2006-2016. –5199 photographs: col. 2 mounted photographs: col. 0.19 l.m. of textual records. This new acquisition provides thousands of photographs depicting the Windsor, Greenlay, and Sherbrooke areas from the late 1980s to the 2010s. It also contains genealogical research pertaining to the Salois, Garant, Pouliot, and Morel families.
- Alberta Everett collection (P260). 13 textual records. 5 VHS cassette tapes. 84 photographs: 17 b&w, 67 col. 27 artefacts. This new acquisition offers new sources pertaining especially to the histories of the Townships of Eaton and Bury, as well as Bishopton, Lennoxville, Hatley, and other areas in the Eastern Townships. The collection consists of a variety of items, including VHS tapes, photographs, pins, and wooden nickels.

- ETRC Special Media collection (P995). New accrual. 2021. 8120 Mb of digital audiovisual files (MP4). The accrual consists of digital video recordings of the "Literary Rambles with Steve Luxton" events, which took place in 2021. The videos were edited and produced by John Mackley.
- Lloyd and Irene Harrison collection (P265). New acquisition. [ca. 1890s]-[200-?].
   0.12 l.m. of textual records. 247 photographs: 147 b&w and 100 col. 1 map.
   4 artefacts (3 pins; 1 key). This new acquisition consists primarily of scrapbooks containing a wealth of information, primarily on the history of Bishopton. These scrapbooks contain textual records and photographs capturing the village's rich past.
- Lennoxville Curling Club fonds (P127). New accrual. 1934-2009. 0.26 l.m. of textual records. The accrual adds to our knowledge of the Lennoxville Ladies' Curling Club a distinct league from 1931 until the early 2000s. The documents offer information about the administration and finances of the Ladies' Curling Club, as well as their social and recreational activities.
