CONVENTION '85

"Forward with confidence" is the theme of Alliance Quebec's annual convention, which will be held May 31 through June 2 at John Abbott College in Ste-Anne-de-Bellevue.

This fourth annual convention of Alliance Quebec marks a significant time in the evolution of the organization. Though linguistic divisions in the province have become less dramatic, the English-speaking community is increasingly conscious of the fact that much remains to be done on the level of community action and involvement.

Convention '85 will feature some innovations, such as thematic workshops, in which the community will begin to address these longer term challenges. The topics of three of the thematic workshops are: delivery of health and social services; community economic development and adult education. These themes, developed through consultation with Chapters and Associations, reflect the English-speaking community's growing confidence in its role and its desire to participate fully in the social debate on issues such as job creation and re-training.

The topic of the fourth thematic workshop will be national language issues, with guest speaker D'Iberville Fortier, the Commissioner of Official Languages. All delegates to Convention '85 have been sent discussion/background papers on the four thematic workshop topics in order to help them prepare for workshops, which will be held Saturday at 2:30 p.m.

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Convention '85 begins with registration from 3:00 p.m. Friday May 31 in the Casgrain Lounge, followed by a candidates reception in the Agora. At 7 p.m., Convention Chairman Hugh Mitchell will welcome participants in the gym. The Hon. Robert Layton M.P., Minister of State for Mines will address the convention as will D'Iberville Fortier. Out-going president, Eric Maldoff will give his farewell address.

The remainder of Friday evening's program will be devoted to a wine and cheese reception and a performance by the Heritage Show Band from the Outaouais. Saturday morning begins with the Business meeting portion of the convention followed by Executive candidates speeches and policy workshops.

Executive elections will take place from 4:30 until 6 p.m. on Saturday, in the Casgrain Lounge and board elections will be held Sunday morning, from 8:30 a.m. to 10:30 a.m., in the Casgrain Lounge as well. Unsuccessful candidates for the executive automatically become candidates for the 31 person board of directors.

Guest Speakers

Convention '85 includes an impressive line-up of keynote speakers throughout the weekend. In addition to the previously mentioned Mssrs. Layton and Fortier, the Convention will be addressed by the Hon. Walter F. McLean, Secretary of State, on Saturday morning. Saturday, at lunch, the special guest speaker will be Pierre-Marc Johnson, Quebec's Minister of Justice and Intergovernmental affairs. On Sunday, again at lunchtime, the speaker will be Michel Gratton, MNA for Gatineau and Liberal House leader in the National Assembly.

A Celebration of F.R. Scott

Convention '85 will include an extremely special event on Saturday evening. Alliance Quebec has organized a special celebration of the life and legacy of the poet and social philosopher, F.R. (Frank) Scott, who passed away in January. F.R. Scott's contributions to Canadian life through law, literatures and politics were immense. This special tribute will take place following the formal banquet on Saturday evening, beginning at 6 p.m. in the Stewart cafeteria.

The F.R. Scott Celebration Committee has invited some of Scott's colleagues and friends to speak about F.R. Scott, the man, the scholar, the poet, the social activist, the lawyer, Canadian and Quebecer. The speakers for the evening include: the writers Hugh MacLennan, Roch Carrier and Ronald Sutherland; former journalist, cabinet minister and diplomat Gérard Pelletier and J. King Gordon, former professor of theology and human rights field worker with the United Nations Secretariat.

Following the F.R. Scott dinner there will be entertainement by Michelle Sweeney and accompanying musicians in the Agora.



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Other Events

The Church service on Sunday morning will be held at Maple United Church in Ste-Anne-de-Bellevue, a short walk from the John Abbott College campus. Also on Sunday morning, there will be a special panel discussion on the diversity of the English-speaking community of Quebec.

Throughout the weekend of Convention '85, there will be special exibits by various cultural community groups. As well, the delegation from C.A.S.A. (Committee for Anglophone Social Action - Gaspé) will be exibiting a model of the partial reconstruction of a Gaspé Loyalist village.

The Convention programme wraps up Sunday, with a plenary session following lunch and an address by the new president.

Transportation

Convention '85 is being held this year at the lovely John Abbott College in Ste-Anne-de-Bellevue. The college is easily accessible from highways 20 (Ste-Anne-de-Bellevue exit) and 40 (exit 41). There is ample parking available.

The College is also serviced by the number 211 bus, departing every 5 - 10 minutes from the Lionel Groulx metro station (transfer point between metro lines 1 and 2). Convention '85 organizers have arranged for a shuttle bus to run between the Lionel Groulx metro station and John Abbott College at strategic hours on Friday Saturday and Sunday. 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ALLIANCE QUEBEC PROGRAMME ACTIVITIES

HEALTH AND SOCIAL SERVICES PROGRAMME

Legislative Guarantees

The campaign for legislative guarantees continues to gather momentum with over 330 resolutions received to date. More than 90 are from municipal governments. The letter writing campaign undertaken by Alliance Quebec Chapters and Associations has resulted in dialogue between the Chapters and Associations and their MNAs, including an exchange of correspondence and MNAs requesting meetings to discuss issues.

CLSC User Elections

Many local Chapters and Associations are engaged in supporting candidates in local CLSC user elections. These elections will be held across the province on Sunday, May 26.

Task Forces

- 6A A youth network sub-committee of the Task Force has begun a planning process for the English-language youth network. The committee is made up of institutional and community representatives.
- 6B An Alliance Quebec Task Force has been formed for region 06B Laurentides Lanaudière with representatives from the Upper Laurentian and Laval/North Shore Chapters involved. The initial meeting of the Task force was held in St-Sauveur on May 6. Marylee Kelley, Elizabeth Kater and Anne Usher were guest speakers at the meeting.
- 6C The Task Force on Monteregie social services met with the Director General of the Regional Council, Jean-Bernard Guindon, and his Staff on April 26. The subject of the meeting was CSS/CLSC's transfers. The Task Force also submitted a document to the Regional Council outlining the issues; models of services delivery for the English-speaking community; and 14 recommendations. A further consultation meeting will be held in May to discuss the actual transfers being recommended. (This Task Force is recognized by the Regional Council as the voice of the English-speaking community in region 06C).

EDUCATION PROGRAMME

Transition Conference

Over 150 participants from the English-speaking community across Quebec attended the Transition conference on second-language learning held May 10 and 11 at Concordia University in Montreal. Speakers at the conference included: The Hon. Robert Layton M.P. Minister of State for Mines, Labour lawyer Stanley Hartt and Quebec City correspondent for the Toronto Globe and Mail, Graham Fraser. <u>Transition</u>, jointly sponsored by the Canadian Parents for French (CPF), the English-speaking Parent's Network and Alliance Quebec, identified several key issues requiring community attention including government funding of second-language programs and extra-curricular influences on second-language learning.



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Adult Education

Seminar

Representatives from education, community, business and labour groups attended a seminar on May 14 focusing on the implementation of the government's policy and plan of action for Adult Education and Manpower training. Senior officials from the Ministries of Education, Higher Technology, Higher Education, Science and Technology as well as Security and Income, were invited to share the concerns of the English-speaking community.

Survey

A survey is being conducted across the province to determine the availibility of English-language services in the field of Manpower and vocational training. The information will be tabulated for the Education Programme thematic workshop at Convention '85.

ACTIVITIES IN CHAPTERS AND ASSOCIATIONS

On Wednesday, April 3rd, the <u>St. Maurice Valley Chapter</u> made a formal presentation of their microfilm of the ST. MAURICE VALLEY CHRONICLE to the Université de Québec à Trois-Rivières.

The ST. MAURICE VALLEY CHRONICLE was a weekly community newspaper which served the region from 1919 to 1970. It provides a valuable source of historical information about the English-speaking community of the area.

The presentation was made to Jean Asselin, Vice-Rector of the university at a public gathering at the university library. The newspaper collection, which consists of seventeen rolls of microfilm, will be available to researchers and to the community at large.

In attendance at the presentation ceremony were John Wickenden, son of the principal owners of the paper, Margaret Breese, widow of Duncan Breese, long-time editor of the Chronicle and Grace Hubert who spent her entire working life at the newspaper.

The microfilming of the ST. MAURICE VALLEY CHRONICLE was the Chapter's contribution to the celebration of the 350th anniversary of the founding of Trois-Rivières.

A letter has been sent to Hydro-Quebec indicating that this is not the case, and with help from AQ Legal Affairs Director Tom Mulcair, offering legal support for this position. Recent newspaper articles were also included in the package in order to make an even stronger appeal.

The Chapter participated in a very successful series of career days in conjunction with Rosemount H.S. and Lester B. Pearson H.S. Chapter member Olivia Kona spoke about careers in advertising and distributed a manual she produced on that subject. Concordia University's carrer library was very impressed with the manual and has now added it to its collection.

The most recent issue of the Chapter Newsletter, THE EAST ISLANDER has been distributed to all members, as well as churches in the Chapter area. The Newsletter included a profile of the Canadian-Italian Businessmens's Association, an interview with Clarence Bayne the Executive Producer of the Black Theatre Workshop and an historical look at the city of St. Leonard.

The Communications Committee has issued its final report, including an improved marketing strategy for the organization. The marketing strategy will be implemented beginning in September.

On June 8, the community animation program will hold a consultation session with representatives from more than 80 community groups gathering to exchange information and discuss ways in which to help one another. June 8 is also the data for V.E.Q's annual general meeting, which will be held at the Holland Elementary school. Elections will be held for the Board of Directors and for the position of president.

The Job Club has provided an animator to help CEGEP students look for summer jobs. V.E.Q. is pleased to report that all 20 students in the program have found summer jobs. The second part of the Job Club program involves helping to create work for high-schoolers. Some students in this program have taken the Red Cross babysitting course and are working at 3 major hotels in the area, providing babysitting services. The Job Club also runs an odd job bank.

The English-language pre-school pilot project begun at Holland Elementary school in January will continue in September. Registration is up from 20 students to approximately 60 and chances are good that the program will expand to at least one other location.

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COMMENT IN THE FRENCH PRESS

With the release of yet another poll on the language of signs, editorialists in the French press are calling on the government for a solution to this long and emotional debate. As in majority of the signs polls preceding it, the CROP-LA PRESSE poll of April 27 concluded that the majority of French and English-speaking Montrealers are in favor of the right to post bilingual signs.

In a La Presse editorial, April 28, Gilbert Brunet writes that with the maze of confusing polls and court judgements, "One doesn't know what to think anymore". He does feel, however, that the indications of this latest poll (that the majority would hail bilingual signs if French were the language of predominance) are unique and to be followed. "Bilingualism with French predominating", he suggests, "would rally the majority around the protection of its language, bring respect to its minority and open itself to the rest of the world".

Lysiane Gagnon in La Presse, April 27, is heartened by the change in attitude by both English and French-speaking Montrealers "who have made considerable progress in view of the prevailing attitude of ten or fifteen years ago". Like Gilbert Brunet, Ms. Gagnon believes the poll carries a clear message, "The majority of Quebecers would welcome a softening of the law". Ms. Gagnon goes on to specify that this does not mean that as a rule, a government should govern by polls, "Political responsibility does not consist of simply obeying the instincts of the majority". Ms. Gagnon notes that in most cases (e.g. the death penalty) popular instinct is towards repression, where as the inverse is true in this case. "The government cannot easily refuse to side with a majority whose aspirations are towards tolerance and social peace", she writes.
