


#### LESLIE N. BUZZELL AWARD

Throughout his career he has shown support of parental involvement in education. He is a former vice-president of Quebec Federation.







#### **CONVENTION PERSONALITIES**



Our Keynote speaker for Friday evening will be the Honourable Warren Allmand, Minister of Consumer and Corporate Affairs, who represents the province of Quebec in the federal cabinet. Mr. Allmand has been a well-known figure in Quebec political circles for many years and is quite familiar with the problems faced by the minority groups, especially in the educational fields in this province. He is presently the sitting member of the House of Commons for the electoral district of N.D.G., located in west-end Montreal, and is a member of the Liberal Party.



George E. Flower came to McGill University in August 1975 as Professor of Educational Administration and Dean of the Faculty of Education. Born in Montreal, and educated at McGill and Harvard, prior to the McGill appointment he served as Coordinator of Graduate Studies at the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education and Chairman of the Graduate Department of Educational Theory at the University of Toronto. His previous experience includes ten years with the Montreal Protestant School Board, war service, research and teaching in administration at Harvard, and directing the Canadian Educational Association-Kellogg Foundation leadership project for educational administrators from coast to coast. Professor Flower is the author of books and numerous articles in his field and has served as consultant to many commissions and educational agencies across Canada. He is Vice-President of the Canadian Foundation for Economic Education, a Past-President of the Canadian Education Association, and of the Canadian Association of Professors of Education, a Fellow of the Ontario Teachers' Federation, and a Fellow of the Canadian College of Teachers.



DECLINING ENROLLMENT The worst potential threat for change in our educational system is the trend of declining school enrollment. Dr. Robert W. B. Jackson, of both the Ontario and Atlantic Institutes for Studies in Education and Chairman of the Commission on Declining Enrollment set up by the Ontario Minister of Education, Thomas Wells, calls this "the greatest crisis in education that we have ever seen". In Quebec, for the English educational community both Protestant and Catholic, the crisis is more critical than elsewhere in Canada, for added to the natural factors which cause this problem, which are birth, immigration, migration and death rates, in Quebec legislation has been enacted which limits the enrollment in English schools. The problems that are resulting from the declining enrollment are many and they must be faced openly and squarely. We know from experience to date it is not an easy task to solve these problems.
