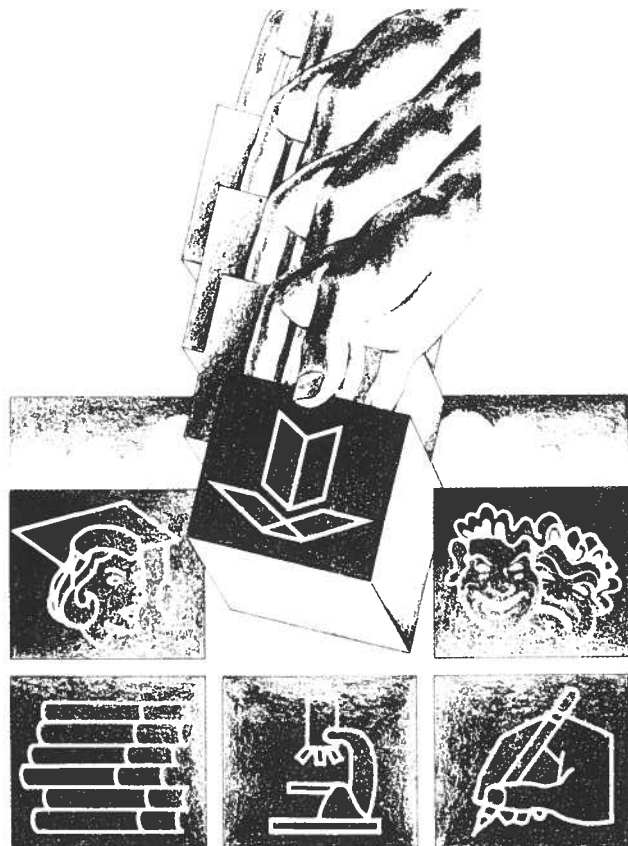

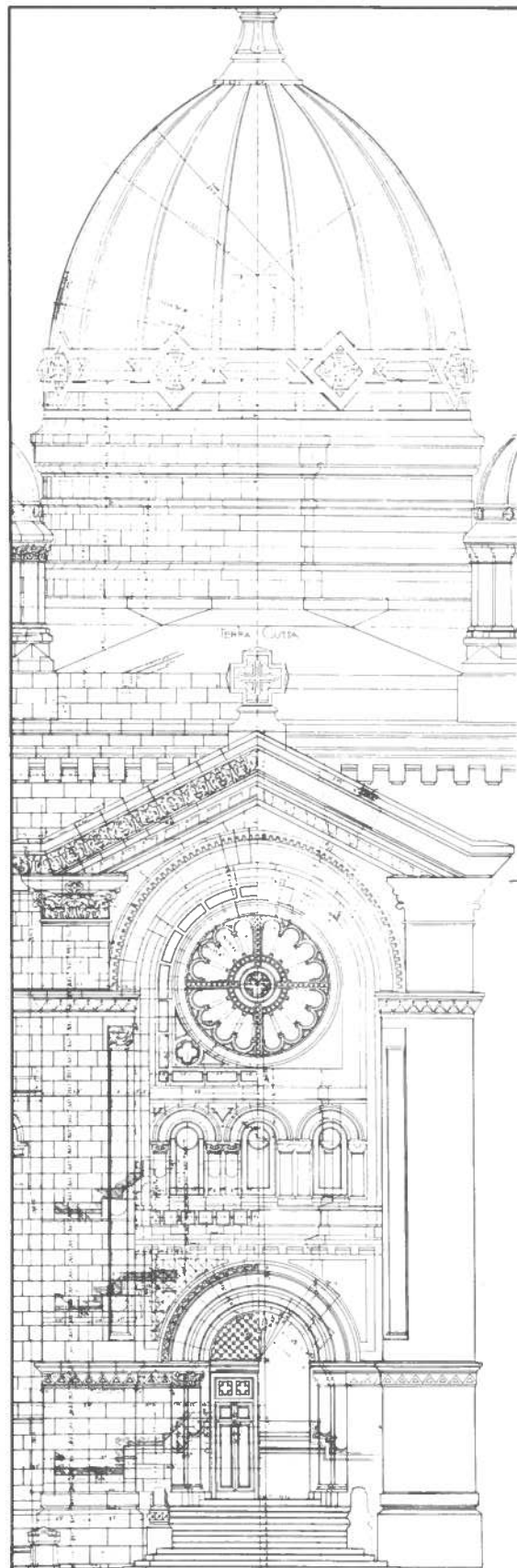

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GORDON PATERSON AWARD

for outstanding service to the education of children

ROBERT E. LAVERY

Robert Lavery is a native Montrealer who has had a long and distinguished career in the Quebec Education system. He undertook his early training at St. Joseph Teachers' College in Montreal, the University of Moncton and Université de Montréal. Like many educators he served his time "in the trenches" teaching in various elementary schools in Bellettre and Montreal. He participated in the unionization of teachers in the Montreal Catholic School Commission and served a term as Secretary General of PACT. In 1962 he returned to St. Joseph Teachers' College as a professor and devoted the next 12 years to the education of Educators. He served as Assistant Director of Student Teaching at St. Joseph's and was instrumental in negotiating the amalgamation of the college with the McGill Faculty of Education in 1970. Following the merger he became an associate professor on the McGill faculty and in time rose to the position of Chairman of the Department of Educational Administration.



In 1973 he earned a Ph.D. in Educational Administration from the University of Alberta with a thesis on "Principal leadership in Montreal French and English Elementary Schools." In the same year he renewed his direct involvement in secondary education by becoming Deputy Director General for English Education with the Montreal Catholic School Commission. From 1978 to 1984 he served with distinction as Director General of the Lakeshore School Board. He is at present the Director General of Dawson College.

Robert Lavery has devoted himself wholeheartedly to the cause of English education in Quebec and has earned a reputation as a competent and dedicated administrator with outstanding leadership qualities. He has been described as a supporter of parent participation in the schools of Quebec and has been especially supportive of the "independent status" of QFHSA.

The Gordon Paterson Award is presented annually by the Quebec Federation to honour an outstanding educator who has also encouraged parent participation in the education of their children. On both counts Robert Lavery is clearly a most deserving recipient of this award.

LESLIE N. BUZZELL AWARD

for outstanding service to Quebec Federation

ALLAN & JOAN LOCKE

Allan and Joan Locke have been chosen as the first joint recipients of the Buzzell Award. Born and educated in Quebec, they are the parents of four grown children. Individually and as partners they have contributed locally, provincially and nationally in furthering the goals of Home and School.

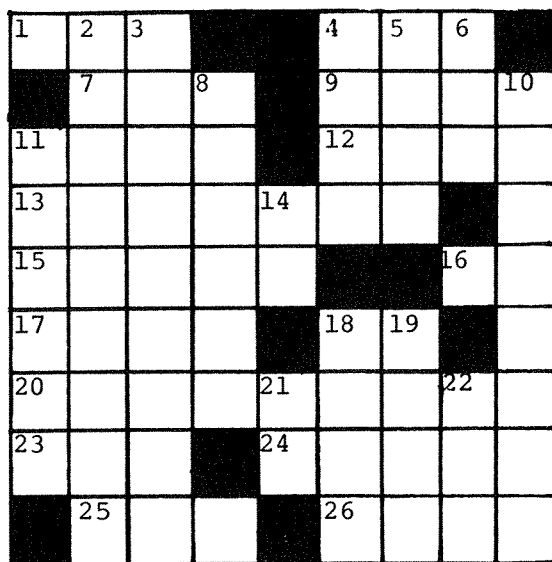
From his earliest days in Home and School, Al was cast in a leadership role as President of Northview Elementary and later on at Lindsay Place High School, both in Pointe Claire. As a member of the Lakeshore Regional Council of Home & School (LRC), he served as President for several years and, for the past two years, has represented the Council as liaison to the Lakeshore School Board. Provincially Al served three years as Resolutions Chairman, as LRC President on the Board of Directors, conducted workshops at the Fall Leadership Conferences, is a member of the AGM conference committee and is now completing a two year term as a QFHSA vice-president. On the National level of Home and School, Al is a liaison to the National Council of Boy Scouts of Canada.

Joan has also played an active role in Home & School serving as Area representative for Lakeshore I on the Lakeshore Regional Council and the QFHSA Board of Directors. She is the 1984/85 Lakeshore Regional Council Treasurer. One of the key organizers of our Annual General meetings, Joan was Hospitality co-chairman in 1981 and 1982 and then took over as General Arrangements chairman for the 1983 and 1984 AGM's. This year Joan is Chairman of the 1985 IYY (International Youth Year) Committee.

Both Joan and Allan were delegates to the CHSPTF Annual Meeting in 1983 and were national reps for Quebec at the 1984 Annual Meeting in Winnipeg. They have accomplished all of these tasks with efficiency and dedication.

The Buzzell Award is given annually to recognize service to Quebec Federation of Home & School Associations at the provincial level. By their commitment to public service, their qualities of leadership, their generosity of spirit and their support for the aims and goals of Home & School, the Lockes are a fine example of partnership in this family based organization. They are, indeed, worthy recipients of the Buzzell Award.



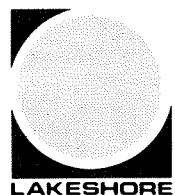

9:15-10:30 a.m.	PLENARY SESSION	<p>CONFLICTING VALUES: A DILEMMA OF YOUTH As our youth celebrate International Youth Year in 1985, they are being confronted with a grab bag of conflicting and rapidly changing values. The issues are complex. Are young people being prepared to make responsible decisions? Our panelists will examine three aspects of this dilemma.</p> <p>*Professor Gerald McKay, Faculty of Education, McGill University.</p> <p>"Educating for Peace" There is a danger that in the schools, as in the public at large, we alternate between periods of "Day After" panic and defensive forgetfulness. If we are to involve the schools, as part of our society, in the greatest issue that mankind has ever faced, we must seriously consider certain questions: Do we want curricula that incorporate, in a systematic way, programmes promoting a world at peace? What would be the content of these programmes? What problems would such programmes pose for teachers, administrators and parents?</p> <p>*Brent Martel, Macdonald High School Students Council. Sandra Grant, President, Student Council, John Rennie High School.</p> <p>"Youth Today" Besides the classic anxieties of growing pains felt by everyone in their adolescence, today's teenagers have the added pressures of a fast changing, highly competitive and unstable world. Society tends often to alienate youth; our fears are dubbed unfounded; our demands are often ignored. We encounter frustration when decisions regarding our welfare are made without any input from us. However, being given the opportunity now to explain our point of view, we hope to provide some understanding of our dilemma and help reunite society with a displaced youth.</p> <p>*Professor John Baggeley, Faculty of Education, Concordia University.</p> <p>"Media: Communication or Exploitation" The communications media — particularly television — have a great potential for good and ill. The quality of children's broadcasting, for example, often suffers owing to commercial and scheduling pressures within the media industry. Parents and teachers can do much to prevent undesirable manipulation of their children's values (A) by informing the broadcasters of their concerns and (B) by discussing media manipulation with their children from an early age.
