Bishop's Forum

- Week-long institute on civic engagement
- English-speaking Quebecers between the ages of 18 and 24
- Held in August the week before CEGEP students go back
- Participants are housed in residence
- Travel to and from Bishop's and accommodation are covered
- Program includes cultural activities.





Context

- One of the most important challenges facing Quebec's English-speaking community is its capacity to retain its young people.
- As for all young Quebecers, the economic health and social dynamism of Quebec society will be critical determinants in whether young English-speaking adults choose to make their lives here.





Context

- There are additional factors which impact young English-speaking Quebecers and their decisions to remain in Quebec.
- Three of the most important factors are :
 - their ability to speak French,
 - their employment opportunities and
 - their sense of engagement in and capacity to contribute to Quebec society.





Goal

- The goal of the Bishop's Forum is to contribute to the third element by enhancing young English-speaking Quebecers understanding of how some of the fundamental institutions of Quebec society function.
- The program will give young participants insight into how some major Quebec institutions operate, such as
 - the National Assembly,
 - political parties,
 - community and not-for-profit organizations and,
 - the media.





- If young English-speaking Quebecers can wrap their imaginations around how the business of Quebec's major institutions is transacted, they'll be better equipped to lead the change from which the whole province can benefit.
- It is vital that young English Quebecers have an opportunity to come together to learn, discuss, plan and build solidarity.
- Supporting youth in sustaining civic leadership is imperative.
