# QFHSA 2018 ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING – April 28, 2018 BUSINESS MEETING PROCEDURE

- 1. The Annual General Meeting [AGM] is conducted in accordance with our Constitution, By-Laws and Standing Rules. In the case of any procedural dispute reference shall be made to Robert's Rules of Order Revised.
- 2. Each official voting delegate of each Member Association shall have one vote on any question which comes before the meeting, except for associations more than 250 kilometers from Montreal. Such Associations will still be entitled to three votes, expressed either as an identical or divided vote. Application for such privilege is to be presented in writing to the Executive Secretary prior to the start of the business portion of the Annual General Meeting.
- 3. The quorum for transaction of business at the Annual General Meeting shall be twenty-five percent [25%] of Member Associations in good standing, represented by their official representatives or accredited alternates.
- 4. Voting shall be by ballot or show of hands. All questions shall be decided by a majority of those present and entitled to vote, except those which require a two-thirds [2/3] majority. On ballot votes, the votes of each association shall be handed in by the voting delegates of each association individually but at the same time. Counting of the votes shall be done by non-voting participants.
- 5. A delegate may not speak for more than two [2] minutes on any question under discussion, nor more than twice on any particular motion or resolution. Any person wishing to speak needs to stand and come to the microphone (if one is available).
- 6. Amendments to the Constitution and By-Laws require a two-thirds [2/3] vote of the delegates present and entitled to vote. Notice of the proposed amendments must have been mailed to all Member Associations at least ten [10] weeks prior to the meeting. Modifications to these proposed amendments received two [2] weeks before the AGM will be considered, but no modification may be made from the floor.
- 7. **Resolutions** to the Annual General Meeting must have been circulated to the Member Associations eight [8] weeks prior to the Annual General Meeting. Resolutions received after the date specified will be presented as **Emergency Resolutions** only after consideration by the Chairman of the meeting and the Resolutions Committee. Delegates presenting resolutions are reminded that they must be present at the time designated on the agenda for the presentation of their resolution. The **presenting party** may **speak** to the resolution, or amendments thereto, for not more than FIVE [5] minutes. In addition to amendments received two weeks before the AGM there may be amendments emanating from the caucus session held earlier, **but no further amendments may be made from the floor.**

# PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE

#### **PRINCIPLES**

### **PURPOSE**

- # Justice and Courtesy for all
- # One thing at a time
- # Recognition of the will of the majority
- # Protection of the rights of the minority

To conduct business in an orderly and democratic manner by one or more of the following ways: communications

committee reports motions or resolutions

To participate effectively in the proceedings of meetings, each person needs to know the fundamentals of parliamentary procedure.

#### THE MAIN MOTION

#### WHAT IS A MOTION?

A main motion introduces a new item of business; it is a proposal that the group take a certain action. It is the basis of all discussion and states the bounds of discussion. All remarks pertain directly to the contents of the motion on the floor. The making of the motion comes first, discussion follows. A subsidiary motion qualifies the main motion or proposes an alternate timetable for consideration.

#### WHEN IS A MOTION NEEDED?

It forms a basis for discussion on all major decisions of the group.

When in doubt, ask for a motion to be proposed.

Motions must be made on all matters involving finances not already included in the budget as approved.

On minor matters, a question may be resolved by the chairman 'taking the sense of the meeting'.

The decision must be clearly stated for the secretary to report in the minutes as well as for the benefit of the members.

#### THE STEPS TO PRESENTING A MOTION ARE:

- 1. member stands or raises a hand and says:
  - "Madame Chairman/Mr. Chairman."

The chairman recognizes the speaker by name.

- 2. The member says, "I move that . . . ", stating or reading a motion.
- Another raises a hand to be identified by the chairman, then says:
   "I second the motion." The seconder believes the motion should be discussed, but may not necessarily be in favour of it.
- 4. Chairman says, "It has been moved by (name of mover) and seconded by (name of seconder) that . . . . . . . . . . . . . . . . Is there any discussion?"
- 5. The mover usually speaks first, giving the reasons for the motion. The opportunity to speak to the motion must be given to anyone who wishes to speak to or oppose the motion. Discussion should be addressed to the chairman.
- 6. At the end of the discussion, the chairman says:
  "If there is no further discussion . . . . . . . " or "Are you ready for the question?" Then:
  "The motion is that . . . . "

"All in favour?" (pause while the count is taken by the secretary)
"Opposed?" (pause while the count is taken by the secretary)
"Abstentions?" (pause while the count is taken by the secretary)

"The motion is carried" (or is defeated).

7. If anyone calls "Division" (questions the voice vote), the chair calls for a show of hands or a standing vote: "All in favour raise your hand. All opposed ... " If a majority request it, the vote may be taken by ballot. A "ballot vote" is the recommended procedure for election of officers and for resolving a contentious issue.

#### SUBSIDIARY MOTIONS

**AMENDMENTS CHANGE MOTIONS:** To qualify the idea of a motion, but not to change the subject or the intent of the main motion.

1. "I move to amend the motion by . . . . ":

Inserting or adding a word, phrase or sentence.

Striking out a word, phrase or sentence.

Striking out and inserting a word or phrase or substituting a sentence or paragraph.

- 2. "I second the motion to amend."
- 3. "It has been proposed to amend the motion to read as follows . . . . "

The chairman states the main motion and the amendment so the group will understand how the amendment changes the motion. Amendment is handled in the same way as a motion with:

Discussion: "Is there any discussion?"

Question: "If there is no further discussion, the amendment is . . . ."

Vote: "All in favour of the amendment . . . . "

Chairman announces the outcome:

"The amendment is carried (or defeated)."
"The motion now before the meeting is . . . ."
(states the motion plus the amendment(s) if it carried)

In dealing with motions, the vote is taken first on the amendment. If passed, the amended motion is voted on. If the amendment is defeated, the main motion in its original form is voted on.

TO REFER: A question is referred to committee for further study and to submit a recommendation to

the group at a later time.

**TO TABLE:** To set the matter aside until someone moves to reconsider it. **TO POSTPONE DEFINITELY:** Postpone discussion until more facts are available.

TO POSTPONE INDEFINITELY: The motion may not be considered again that year.

### PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Report to the Annual General Meeting on April 28, 2018 Submitted by Brian Rock, President

The twelve months since the 2017 AGM have been eventful ones. Here is a snapshot of the highlights.

May - The Rights Committee members were active in the Press Conference of the Committee for the Enrichment of the Curriculum of the History of Quebec (ComECH). May also saw QUESCREN - CIRLM (Quebec English-Speaking Communities Research Network - Canadian Institute for Research on Linguistic Minorities) host a conference entitled: Bill 101 at 40: The Charter of the French Language and Quebec's English - speaking Communities 1977 - 2017. The QFHSA President, representing QFHSA, made the following presentation: The Quebec Federation of Home and School Associations: The Strong Voice of Parents Regarding Language Legislation from Bill 101 to Bill 105 (1977 - 2017). This powerpoint presentation was an analysis of the roles played by parent volunteers through the QFHSA, its committees and its local associations over the past 40 years. The activities of the Rights Committee were highlighted.

The Quebec Community Groups Network held its Annual General Meeting in June, and QFHSA delegates presented a notice of motion regarding the establishment of an ad hoc Committee on Elections.

September saw successful Executive Workshops being well attended with dynamic interchanges and networking opportunities.

The Fall Conference in October was hosted by the Pierre Elliott Trudeau Elementary Home and School Association of the Lester B. Pearson School Board. Congratulations on a job so very well done!

November produced a meeting with the Advisory Board of English Education as well as an opportunity for QFHSA to host an information booth at the Quebec Provincial Association of Teachers' Convention.

In December, the President requested a medical leave of absence to undergo surgery. Complications led to extended hospitalization and additional leaves of absence during January and February 2018. A sincere thank you is extended to Executive Vice-President Linton Gamer who stepped in and agreed to serve as Acting President during these leaves of absence.

I would like to congratulate the QFHSA Executive Committee and Board of Directors, local association Presidents & Executive Members, and all the H & S volunteers, who are so dedicated to making our schools better places in which to learn for our children. A final thank you for the excellent work accomplished by our Executive Director Carol Meindl, Membership Coordinator Marlyn Brownrigg, Administrative Assistant Sheila Desormeaux, and to Marion Daigle and Carol Ohlin of the History/Archives Project.

#### **Executive Director**

Report to the Annual General Meeting, April 28, 2018 Submitted by Carol Meindl. Executive Director

The duties of the QFHSA Executive Director are "many and varied" and include such responsibilities as advising the Board of Directors, managing the office, fostering community relations, exploring community partnerships, securing operational funding, approving expenditures and managing human resources and special projects. It is this variety that keeps the job interesting. Below are some of the highlights of 2017-18.

ComECH Press Conference May 2, 2017: The QFHSA continued its active participation with ComECH (Committee for the Enhancement of the Curriculum of History of Quebec) and was there at the Press conference on May 2, 2017, where we supported Robert Green and offered our own concern over the glaring omissions in the new History Curriculum. We continue to press the Minister of Education to acknowledge that there are problems with this curriculum that must be addressed.

**QFHSA Presentation at QUESCREN:** QUESCREN hosted a symposium as part of ACFAS (L'Association francophone pour le savoir) in May 2017: Bill 101 at 40: The Charter of the French Language and Quebec's English-speaking communities, 1977-2017". Brian Rock was invited to make a presentation on behalf of QFHSA to highlight the contributions of our parents through their Home and School activity during the introduction and subsequent challenge of Bill 101. His presentation "The Quebec Federation of Home and School Associations (QFHSA): the strong voice of parents regarding language legislation from Bill 101 to Bill 105 (1977-2017) was well received and he was invited to provide a chapter in an upcoming publication of the 2017 Conference presentations.

Western Quebec & Lester B. Pearson Regional Councils: Membership organized two very successful Regional Council meetings, one in Western Quebec and the other in the Lester B. Pearson School Board. These were excellent opportunities for Home and School Associations in a shared region to come together to learn more about their role in the larger Federation and with their regional sister associations.

<u>Canada Revenue Agency Charitable Audit:</u> Believe it or not, the audit was a rewarding experience for all of us, as it made it necessary to take a good long look at who we are and what we are trying to accomplish as an organization. It helped us fine tune our policies and procedures and improve on them.

Advisory Board on English Education: We were invited to present our findings from our survey, "Why do we need English Schools?" to ABEE and discussed the perspective of parents regarding why English education remains important in Quebec.

Fall Conference 2017: Keynote speakers at Fall Conference 2017 were Michael Canuel and Nocl Burke, who addressed our theme of "Education in the 21st Century: the next 20 years" by introducing our members to their NEXTschool initiative, and their vision of the future for High school education in Quebec's English public schools. Their presentation was so well received that it included a standing ovation, which is still being talked about. Today's parents clearly agreed that the structure of education in Quebec needs to change.

**NEXTschool Design Strategy Group** & **Design Innopod Sessions:** In response to the overwhelming support that the *NEXTschool* presentation received at Fall Conference, three (3) Home and School parents were chosen to join the Design Innopod Sessions, along with members of other stakeholders in education. These grass roots level design sessions will create prototypes to be integrated into lead high schools. Home and School is playing a role in the ground work for this important initiative.

Youth Exploring Science: This year's Youth Exploring Science program was facilitated by Le Nichoir, a bird sanctuary located in Hudson, QC. Jo-Annie Gagnon, Education Coordinator, taught the students many interesting facts about birds, as well as how to recognize different injuries that birds can suffer and how to treat them.

All in all, a very productive year and I am looking forward to continuing to work with everyone in 2018.

### FINANCE COMMITTEE

Mandate: Prepare annual budgets for the Quebec Federation of Home and School Associations Inc. (QFHSA) Board of Directors and its Committees. Review accounting procedures, the auditor's report and the expense sheets for directors. Prepare recommendations for the membership and administration fees. Review the Charitable Information Return. Oversee the finances, comparing actual results to budgets and prepare financial reports and recommendations for the Board to review at its periodic meetings. Reviews the financial reports submitted by the local home and schools.

# Activities:

- Prepared the Proposed 2019 Budget for 2018 AGM.
- Reviewed and revised policies and procedures on expense reporting.
- Shared financial report information at Board of Director and Executive Meetings.
- Cooperated with Canadian Revenue Agency in a Charitable Audit.
- Review audit report for fiscal year ended December 31st.

<u>Financial changes:</u> The board acknowledged that we follow generally accepted accounting principles for non-profit organizations.

<u>Funding:</u> Provincial and Federal funding remained stable as confidence with the work we do continues. Canadian Heritage gave QFHSA a two year funding grant for 2018-2020 of \$95,000 per year. The Ministry of Education has again divided the 2017-18 grant into two payments: \$15,000 in April 2018 and \$10,000 in September 2018.

**<u>Donations:</u>** CanadaHelps- QFHSA continues to accept donations from CanadaHelps to defray cost of QFHSA projects and programs.

**<u>Budget:</u>** Please see the approved budget for 2018 and the proposed budget for 2019 fiscal year and the financial statement for January 1 to December 31, 2017.

**RECOMMENDATION:** The Finance Committee recommends that the proposed budget for 2019 be approved by the membership at the Annual General Meeting, April 28, 2018.

Finance Committee also submits a notice of motion to be brought to the 2018 AGM to increase membership fee to \$20.00 for 2019-20 school year. Note: Last increase of membership fee was to \$18 in 2010. Accepts Auditors Report for 2018.

### 1. NATURE AND PURPOSE OF THE FEDERATION

The Québec Federation of Home and School Associations (Federation) is an incorporated, independent, not-for-profit volunteer organization dedicated to enhancing the education and general well-being of children and youth. It promotes the involvement of parents, students, educators and the community at large in the advancement of learning and acts as a voice for parents. The Federation is a registered not-for-profit organization.

#### 2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a) The Federation applies the Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations as set out in Part III of the CICA handbook, hereafter referred to as "ASNPO".

### b) Revenue Recognition

The Federation uses the deferral method of accounting and recognizes revenue in the period in which the related expenses are incurred. Under the deferral method, endowment contributions are reported as direct increases in net assets.

- Membership fees are received mostly in the Fall of each year and are taken into revenue over the period from the first of September to the following thirty-first of August.
- ii) Program funding and grants are received from Federal and Provincial agencies. The revenue from Federal agencies is recognized over the donor fiscal year which is from the first day of April to the following thirty-first day of March. The revenue from the Provincial agency is from the Ministry of Education and is recognized over the period from the first day of September to the following thirty-first day of August.
- iii) All other revenues are recognized when received.

### c) Expensing Capital Assets

The Federation expenses all capital assets in the year they are acquired.

# 2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONT'D)

### d) Contributed Services

All volunteers at all levels of the Federation contribute approximately 28,300 hours per year (2016: 28,900) to assist the Federation in carrying out its activities. Because of the difficulty in determining their fair value, contributed services are not recognized in the financial statements.

# e) Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses for the periods covered.

The main estimates relate to the impairment of financial assets.

# f) Cash and Cash Equivalents

The Federation's policy is to disclose bank balances under cash and cash equivalents including bank overdrafts with balances that fluctuate from being positive to overdrawn and temporary investments with a maturity period of three months or less from the date of acquisition.

# g) Financial Instruments

#### Initial and Subsequent Measurement

The Federation initially measures its financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value, except for certain related party transactions that are measured at the carrying amount or the exchange amount, as appropriate.

The Federation subsequently measures all of its financial assets and financial liabilities at cost or amortized cost except for marketable securities that are quoted in an active market, which are measured at fair value. Changes in fair value of these financial instruments are recognized in the statement of operations during the year.

Financial assets measured at amortized cost on a straight-line basis include cash and cash equivalents, membership fees receivable and grant receivable.

# 2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONT'D)

# h) Financial Instruments (Cont'd)

Financial liabilities measured at amortized cost on a straight-line basis include the accounts payable and accrued liabilities, donations payable, deferred program grants and deferred membership fees.

Financial assets measured at fair value include marketable securities.

### **Transaction Costs**

Transaction costs related to financial instruments that will be subsequently measured at fair value are recognized in the statement of operations in the year incurred. Transaction costs related to financial instruments subsequently measured at amortized cost are included in the original cost of the asset or liability and recognized in the statement of operations over the life of the instrument using the straight-line method.

#### Impairment

For financial assets measured at cost or amortized cost, the Federation determines whether there are indications of possible impairment. When there is an indication of impairment, and the Federation determines that a significant adverse change has occurred during the year in the expected timing or amount of future cash flows, a write-down is recognized in the statement of operations. A previously recognized impairment loss may be reversed to the extent of the improvement. The carrying amount of the financial asset may not be greater than the amount that would have been reported at the date of the reversal had the impairment not been recognized previously. The amount of the reversal is recognized in the statement of operations.

# 3. FUNDS HELD IN TRUST

The Federation has funds in trust amounting to \$9,500 (2016: \$9,500). The donors have requested that the interest earned on the funds in trust be used to pay for awards given out at the annual general meeting. A committee was formed to consider all submissions for the awards, and to choose the ones they consider best meet the guidelines.

# 8. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

# Financial Risks:

The Federation is exposed to various risks through its financial instruments without being exposed to concentrations of risk. The main risks are broken down below:

### a) Credit Risk

Credit risk is the risk that one party to a financial instrument will cause a financial loss for the Federation by failing to discharge an obligation. The Federation's main credit risks relate to membership fees receivable and grant receivable.

# b) Liquidity Risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Federation will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations associated with financial liabilities. The Federation is exposed to this risk mainly in respect of its trade accounts payables and accrued liabilities and donations payable.

## c) Interest Rate Risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value of future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market interest rates. The Federation is exposed to interest rate risk on its fixed and floating interest rate financial instruments. Fixed interest rate instruments subject the Federation to a fair value risk, since fair value fluctuates inversely to changes in market interest rates. Floating interest rate instruments subject the Federation to related cash flow risk.

#### d) Other Price Risk

Other price risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices (other than those arising from interest rate risk or currency risk), whether those changes are caused by factors specific to the individual financial instrument or its issuer, or factors affecting all similar financial instruments traded in the market. The Federation is exposed to other price risk through its investments in listed securities for which the value fluctuates with the quoted market price.

## **Education Committee Report**

Report to the Annual General Meeting April 28, 2018

In 2017, the Board of Directors re-organized the committees and as a result the Literacy committee became a sub-committee of the Education committee as it affects the activity within the classroom.

QFHSA continued to be concerned about the omissions in the new Quebec High School history curriculum. Through our involvement with ComECH (Committee for the Enhancement of the Curriculum of History of Quebec), we joined other similarly concerned groups such as the English Parents' Committee Association (EPCA), Quebec Anglophone Heritage Network (QAHN) and Quebec Association of Geography Teachers and Global Educators (QAGT) in bringing awareness to this issue. We contacted and received a variety of letters of support for our position from cultural and religious groups in Quebec and held a joint press conference (ComECH and Kativik School Board) on May 2, 2017 at the Gavin Business Center in St Laurent, which garnered significant media coverage, albeit primarily from the English media.

Representatives of ComECH have twice met with Education Ministry officials in Montreal to discuss the omissions but were unsuccessful in receiving any acknowledgement that there is, indeed, a problem. The chair, Robert Green, has written a letter to Minister Proulx, on behalf of ComECH, protesting this lack of concern and requesting a face-to-face meeting. QFHSA remains committed to keeping this topic on the front burner and pushing for meaningful change.

The Literacy sub-committee was very active. Over the summer months, staff and volunteers weeded and processed the donated books stored in the QFHSA office. The Literacy Committee was pleased to allocate funding to three (3) high schools for their literacy programs. Please see the separate literacy report.

Following up on the presentation at the Fall Conference representatives from the QFHSA have joined a working group to explore *NEXTschool*, the future of high school education in Quebec. The process for designing the prototypes has begun. Students are tackling the project through the McGill University's Change Management class in the School of Administration and Graduate Studies as a credited course. In parallel to that work, the community is also involved in the design process through the Design Innopod Sessions. This heterogeneous group of individuals from diverse backgrounds (parents, teachers, administrators, and other education stakeholders) will be meeting for five (5) full-day design sessions to discuss the prototype design possibilities and to trouble shoot where some of the stumbling blocks for progress may lie and consider ways to overcome them. This design process is divided into five (5) areas of research: **Spatial** (the where learning takes place), **Temporal** (the when learning takes

place), Andragogical (the what and how of a learner-centered experience), Relational (the who takes part in the learning experience) and Communal (the integration of learning within society) This group will be approaching the challenges from an architectural perspective.

There will also be a more homogeneous group of school administrators who will participate in the same sort of design activity, coming at the same questions from their own perspective. Theirs will be a more engineering approach. Once the various groups have had a chance to design some prototypes for the new structure, a group of high school students will also be given an opportunity to offer what they would feel is the best answer to the question: When high school is the best it can be at preparing its students to self-actualize...what will it look like?

When all these various elements come together, the preliminary draft proposed prototypes will be submitted to the Director Generals and the Directors of English Education Network table in April/May and after some editing, the final drafts will be prepared for the Director Generals' May meeting. The Design Phase Results will be presented at the QESBA/AAESQ Conference in Quebec City May 24-25, 2018.

There are plans for a three-day Summer Institute in July/August, hosted by one of the downtown Montreal universities, targeting schools that are interested in being involved. Invited guest speakers include Luke Sumich of Ormiston Jr. College, New Zealand; Justin Reich of MIT Learning Labs and on the third day, Alan November, author of "Who Owns the Learning?" will give a presentation and answer questions. Interested schools will be announced at the Summer Institute and will be followed by a "needs and readiness" assessment and then, once the schools have been chosen, they will start the PPI Design-process Training sessions. Once the preparation phase through adaptive design is complete, the lead schools will launch the new structure in 2019 with the cycle initial learning clusters (Sec I students). 2018-19 will be considered as a 'Preparation Year' for schools that might lead NEXTschool, and the first cohort will begin in September 2019.

So this design of a new structure and approach to education, learning and teaching in Quebec, is being approached from many angles, with a diverse group of stakeholders being consulted. This is a design strategy predicated on grassroots participation. It is exciting to be on the lead edge of this innovation, and an honour for Home and School to play a role.

In 2018, the Education committee looked at some of the concerns expressed by parents including coding, robots, new sex education curriculum, school fees, libraries of the future, and the Institute of Excellence. A resolution received from the Canadian Home and School Federation on anti-bullying policies will require further study as schools in Quebec are supposed to have policies in place. How well the protocol is being implemented will require research. In 2018, priority will be given to school fees and the sex education curriculum. If you are interested in these two topics please contact the office to join the Education Committee.

#### LITERACY COMMITTEE

Report to the Annual General Meeting- April 28, 2018 Submitted by Debi Brown - Chair

#### Mandate:

- To promote awareness of the requirements for literacy in a knowledge-based society.
- To mobilize school and community volunteer resources to advocate and deliver literacy programs for prevention and remediation.
- To promote the Children's Literacy Resource Guide (CLRG) as a resource to help deliver programs.

#### Activities May 2017 - April 2018

- 1.0 Reluctant Reader Project: This project supports reading at the high school level. Teachers and students look for reading materials that are not only interesting to teenagers but also cater to the reading level of each student. One of the main goals of this program is to encourage and foster a love of reading. Fifteen schools in the QFHSA high school network were contacted in December 2017 and three (3) high schools expressed interest in the program. Requests for theme and/or grade-specific books were also included on the funding application.
  - a) In January 2018, the Literacy Committee allocated \$300.00 (each) to the following high schools: Gaspé Polyvalent (ESSB), Westwood High School (LBPSB) and Beaconsfield High School (LPBSB). A box of books was also shipped to each school
  - b) Reports submitted to the QFHSA included the following: information on the books purchased, the future plans for the program and the helpfulness of the resources from the QFHSA. Results have been very successful. From grant recipients: 1) "I was able to use the financial donation towards acquiring a wider range of books directed at exposing the students to international topics and authors". 2) "Thank you for the donated reading resources! This is a welcome surprise and a valuable addition to the resources for our unit and classroom libraries."
  - c) The staff members responsible for these programs were encouraged to send pictures or write an article for the QFHSA NEWS.

## 2.0 Born to Read and Other Projects:

Born to Read: This year, two (2) Home and School associations organized Born to Read events. They were: Roslyn Elementary (EMSB) and Edgewater Elementary (LBPSB). A Born to Read Powerpoint is being updated and information will be available

at the AGM. The goal is to have additional local associations introduce this program in their schools.

Revitalisation Ville St. Pierre - Young Mother's Literacy and Art Program: The QFHSA literacy committee has continued to support this program by collecting and donating books for children 0-5 years old. Ozlem Erten, the program coordinator, met with the literacy committee to update the QFHSA on the evolvement of the program. Hopefully the program will continue next year.

- 3.0 Book Donations from the QFHSA (since April 2017):
- a) QFHSA Member Schools: Ayer's Cliff Elementary (ETSB), New Richmond Backpack program (ESSB), Belle Ansc Elementary (ESSB), Gaspé Polyvalent (ESSB), Grosse Ile School (ESSB), Metis Beach School (ESSB)
- b) New Home and School Associations: Wakefield Elementary (WQSB)
- c) Other Organizations: *Dans La Rue*, Heritage Lower St. Lawrence Library and West Island Community Black Association.
- **4.0 Donors, Volunteers and Staff:** It would not be possible for the QFHSA to support our literacy programs without the help of the following:
- a) NOVA/Santé West Island's Bookstore in Ste. Anne-de-Bellevue generously donates their surplus books to the QFHSA for distribution to schools and communities, particularly in outlying areas.
- b) Canadian Heritage (PCH) and le Ministère de l'Éducation et de l'Enseignement supérieur (MEES): Funds from these organizations help with the mailing costs and the purchase of new books, if necessary.
- c) MNAs: This year, a monetary donation was received from Geoff Kelley (MNA Jacques Cartier) and used to defray the shipping costs of books.
- d) <u>Tembee</u>: Once again, Tembee sent boxes of paper to off-island schools that are part of the QFHSA network.
- e) <u>St. John Fisher Parents</u>: Many of the books donated to the Revitalisation Ville St. Pierre project came from the parents of St. John Fisher Elementary School (LBPSB).
- f) As a result of contacting the QFHSA, Shoreline Press distributed books to: the Fraser Hickson Library (Rebecca Pothier), Anne Macwhirter (Gaspé region) and Heritage Lower St. Lawrence Library.
- g) Book donations from Gazette Article: The QFHSA received book donations after an article was published in the Montreal Gazette in 2017.

- h) Literacy Committee and QFHSA staff. Literacy committee member Ute Wilkinson continuously sources books from various books sales and the QFHSA literacy committee and staff members prepare the books for shipping.
- **5.0** QFIISA 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary 2019: The QFHSA Literacy is examining ways to involve local associations in commemorating this important anniversary.
- 6.0 Updating Resolution 2011-01 on Funding for Libraries and Librarians: This resolution, originally slated to be caucused at the 2017 Annual General Meeting, was tabled for further study. In February 2018, the resolutions committee decided that not enough groundwork was done to present the resolution at the 2018 AGM.

Copies have been posted to the QFHSA website as well as are made available in the 2018 AGM kits.

#### **CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS**

Report to the Annual General Meeting – April 28, 2018 Submitted by the OFHSA Board of Directors

#### Activities 2017-18:

During the course of 2017, the QFHSA had been chosen to undergo a charitable audit and worked closely with the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) representatives to update policy and procedures to better comply with established norms for charitable organizations. As a result, there are changes to the QFHSA Constitution and By-Laws required

## 1. Proposed Amendment to the Constitution (Resolution 2018/03)

In considering our constitution, CRA deemed the QFHSA objectives were too general and vague. As the objectives were written and adopted in 1959, it was agreed that it was time to update them. The Executive Director and office staffworked closely with CRA to work out best practices and revised objectives.

CRA acknowledged that our organization's activities have been charitable but our purpose was not, as described in our current objectives. Although CRA was not insisting that we change our objectives, they were strongly recommending that we do so as to reflect activities that are exclusively charitable.

Therefore we drafted new objectives that more clearly define our activities with the intention, in accordance with our Bylaws, to bring them to our membership for adoption at AGM in 2018. See proposed amendments below in **bold type**:

## **ARTICLE II**

#### CONSTITUTION

The constitution of the Federation shall be set forth in the Letters Patent granted under the Quebec Companies Act on August 27th, 1959, and Supplementary Letters Patent granted on May 08th, 1997, for the following purposes: To promote, encourage, assist and support Home and School organization and activity in the schools to advance education, throughout schools in Quebec.

For the carrying on of the above mentioned purposes, the corporation may:

- 1. Provide a forum to affiliated Home and School Associations for discussions of matters of general interest, to stimulate co-operative effort by sharing best governance practices, conducting workshops on various topics related to education and organizing Regional Council meetings and Annual General Meetings.
- 2. Provide books, equipment and educational aids, and activities and other resources for

the benefit of students attending schools with Home and School Associations and to community libraries.

- 3. Provide information to parents via publication of our quarterly magazine, the QFHSA NEWS and other social media tools, which reflect the unique culture primarily of the English-speaking school community of Quebec.
- 4. Partner with other educational community-based organizations to support projects for affiliated Home and School Associations by funding, building, up-keeping of playground structures, or any other projects that should enhance the learning experience of the children.
- 5. Assist or participate in the public education reform by providing well-reasoned representations to public officials on various issues or decisions affecting the education system, and by making these representations available to the public.
- 6. Promote community engagement by granting awards to students, volunteers, and members for their outstanding efforts to humanitarian causes, and their contributions to the life and cause of the Federation.
- 7. Develop between educators and the general public such united effort as shall secure for every child the highest advantage in physical, mental, moral and spiritual education.
- 8. Promote an education for all, by maintaining a non-partisan, non-commercial, non-racial and non-sectarian organization.
- 9. Provide various workshops to students and parents (anti-bullying, parenting, etc.)
- 10. Do all that is incidental and ancillary to the furtherance of the above-noted purposes.

Recommendation: That the proposed amendments to the Constitution of the Quebec Federation of Home and School Associations be adopted.

## 2. Amendment to the By-Laws (Resolution 2018/04)

It was determined that, just as member associations are encouraged to have a Dissolution Clause in their By-Laws, in the case of closed or merged schools, so as to provide for the disbursement of Home and School assets, the Quebec Federation of Home and School Associations should have a similar clause in its own By-Laws. Therefore, the QFHSA Board of Directors would like to recommend that Article XIII DISSOLUTION be added to the QFHSA By-Laws

#### **ARTICLE XIII**

#### DISSOLUTION

- 1. Voluntary dissolution of the Quebec Federation of Home and School Associations requires the following:
  - a. An Executive decision to disband can only be taken by a two-thirds vote of members present at a General Meeting, provided that there is a quorum at such a meeting in accordance with Quebec Federation of Home and School Associations By-Laws, and that a formal notice of such an intent has been forwarded to all members, and that a motion to disband has been included in the announcement of the General Meeting;
  - b. The reasons for a proposal of dissolution shall be forwarded in writing to the Membership at least sixty (60) days before any action is taken;
  - c. In the case of a decision to dissolve, all its remaining assets after payment of its debts shall be sent to charities with educational or literacy mandates and the decision ratified by the membership.

<u>Recommendation</u>: That the proposed amendment to the By-Laws of the Quebec Federation of Home and School Associations, Article XIII DISSOLUTION, be adopted.

## **OFHSA HISTORY AND ARCHIVES PROJECT**

Report to the Annual General Meeting, April 28, 2018 Submitted by Carol Meindl - Executive Director

Mandate: To bring both the QFHSA History and Archives up-to-date. These will be valuable tools in educating our membership and the wider public about the influential role that parental involvement has played in Quebec's schools and communities, beginning in the 1920s and which has continued into the 21st century.

## **Project Staff**

Marion Daigle, Co-ordinator and Carol Ohlin, Assistant.

## Background to Date

There are now over 300 archival boxes of preliminary historical files. They comprise a large number dealing with Local Association Activities, Resolutions and Policy, Briefs, QFHSA NEWS (dating from 1948 onwards), records of QFHSA committees, conferences, countless projects and the list goes on. In addition QFHSA has a large collection of Canadian Home & School Federation (CHSF) archival files. All of this material was invaluable in the preparation of an updated *QFHSA History of Achievement, published in May, 2015.* Archival research helps to define and expand the role of the Federation to its membership and to the wider community.

## **Donations**

We were grateful to receive a donation of \$300 from the office of David Bimbaum, MNA for D'Arcy McGee through the Support Volunteer Work program to put toward digitizing equipment.

## Archives activities

#### History/archives update - Board of Directors Orientation Meeting

At the request of President Brian Rock and Linton Garner, Executive Vice-President, a comprehensive History/Archives report was presented to the Directors as part of their Orientation meeting, September 9, 2017, with particular reference to the years 2010 – 2017. The kit of information documented the history of the project since its inception in 1999. Information included a description of the extensive historical documents already weeded, assessed, sorted and arranged into preliminary archival files along with the documentation remaining to be dealt with. Aligned with the archiving activities was the time spent by the co-ordinator as a resource on research, consultations, preparation of presentations, and activity reports to the Board of Directors and AGM.

QFHSA – A History of Achievement -This QFHSA history booklet, originally published in 2015, in English, and reprinted in 2017 was translated into French. Copies will be printed and made available in 2018.

QFHSA NEWS- Over 300 individual articles from the early years of the QFHSA news publications were catalogued by our summer student, Amanda Paquin. An article written of her QFHSA experience was included in the QFHSA NEWS Fall 2017 issue.

Photographs -Countless hours were spent identifying and storing large numbers of archival photographs requiring extensive cross referencing with the QFHSA NEWS, an invaluable part of the OFHSA archives.

Local Home and School Associations: The files of Member Home and School Associations relating to both closed and merged schools dating back to the earliest associations have been compiled and archived. Recent archives include Seigniory/Cedar Park, Thorndale, Courtland Park, Bishop Whelan, Valois Park (partial) Elementary schools. Macdonald High School has donated early files although the school remains open. There are more association files from Northview and Valois Park recently received to be dealt with.

QFHSA Committees – As resources are uncovered, Committee minutes and reports have been weeded, sorted, assessed and integrated into existing archives. Examples include Rights, Education, Literacy, Resolutions and Policy.

**Personnel and Business Files-** Files no longer needed in the daily operations of the Federation were archived this year.

## Research and Consultations requests

#### **Rights Committee**

May 11-12, 2017 OUESCREN – CIRLM (Quebec English-Speaking Communities Research)

Network – Canadian Institute for Research on Linguistic Minorities) hosted a conference entitled: Bill 101 at 40: The Charter of the French Language and Quebec's English —

speaking Communities 1977 – 2017. Brian Rock, QFHSA President, represented the Federation and made the following presentation: The Quebec Federation of Home and School Associations: The Strong Voice of Parents Regarding Language Legislation from Bill 101 to Bill 105 (1977 - 2017), an analysis of the roles played by parent volunteers through the QFHSA, its committees and its local associations over the past 40 years.

#### **Literacy Committee**

<u>Bom to Read Project</u> - In an effort to update the QFHSA Power Point presentation on file for a future workshop, a request was received to prepare background and other pertinent information from the Archives.

<u>Born to Read – Gaspe-</u> In March, 2018 Anne Mac Whirter requested research into the archives in order to update her information on the first Born to Read project in Quebec and Canada. This literacy initiative was created by Anne Mac Whirter in 1990, sponsored by the New Carlisle Home and School Association and supported by QFHSA and CHSF.

Resolution 2017/01 Funding for Librarians and Libraries – This resolution was presented for reaffirmation at the 2017 AGM and deferred to the 2018 AGM. On June 19, 2017 a kit of background information on the topic dating back to the original resolution of 2004 was prepared.

## **QFHSA NEWS**

A Tribute to Patrick Baker, Gordon Paterson Award recipient 1988, was researched and written for the QFHSA NEWS, winter edition 2017. Pat Baker was a much loved and respected teacher, principal, educator, mentor and leader in promoting parental involvement in education and the well-being of children, particularly in the Lester B. Pearson School Board (LBPSB) community and with QFHSA.

#### **Community Requests**

History of Soulanges School 1919 – 2019. At the request of Sylvie Mahannah, Soulanges School Reunion Committee, a copy of The History of Soulanges School dated 1982 was found in the QFHSA Archives, written for their 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary (1907-1982). The 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary spans the years 1919 – 2019 although an earlier school opened in 1907.

<u>Terry Loucks, Goodwill Ambassador to Arvida,</u> requested information on Home and School Executive Committees for Saguenay-Arvida Home and School Associations 1957-1969 to help support his efforts to see Arvida recognized as a UNESCO World Heritage Site.

## Next Phase- Digitization and promotion

Once the final archive is complete, plans will get underway to start digitizing parts of the archive for public access in the Fall of 2018. The archivist will play a key role in deciding which aspects of the archive will be of the most interest to researchers and historians. The archivist will also determine the best software and programs and platforms for storing the digital archives and best mode for controlled public access.

SPECIAL NOTE: A very special thank you must be given to Marion Daigle and Carol Ohlin. Their knowledge, experience and exceptional organizational skills for at least 30 years as QFHSA volunteers and employees have been invaluable. We have been fortunate to have had their support throughout the course of this project.

#### Communications, Media and Public Relations

Report to the Annual General Meeting, April 28, 2018 Submitted by Carol Meindl. Executive Director

MANDATE: To oversee the implementation of initiatives to promote the mission and highlight the activity of the QFHSA through various media including, QFHSA NEWS, QFHSA website, Facebook pages, Twitter, press releases, interviews and articles.

QFHSA NEWS: The Editorial Committee (Johnnie Belinda Cluff, Qu'Anglo Communications and Consulting, Editor; Carol Meindl, Marlyn Brownrigg, Sheila Desormeaux) four (4) issues per year of the NEWS were published: Summer (Volume 55 Issue 2) Fall (Volume 55 Issue 3) Winter (Volume 55 Issue 4) and Spring (Volume 56 Issue 1).

QFHSA WEBSITE- www.qfhsa.org. Regular updates of the website are made on a verage two (2) per month. Our webmaster Cathy Ashford McK cough is incredibly efficient and has been able to post our changes within hours of receiving our requests. The main objective of the website is to provide easy access to forms for Home and School Executives as well as information for our members. Traffic is heaviest during the months of May and October and we average about 3.5 visits a day.

**QFHSA** Twitter account- 237 followers with an average of one (1) tweet per day. QFHSA Twitter account is linked to QFHSA Facebook page.

FACEBOOK- OFHSA Facebook page (@QFHSA)- 515 likes, up from 467 in 2016 an increase of ~10% with an average of 1 post per day. 488 followers.

PRESS RELEASES-in the past few years, QFHSA has not sent out regular press releases. Instead we do target emailing of documents to various organizations directly. QFHSA had one press release that was sent on April 27, 2017 in conjunction with ComECH Quebec regarding a scheduled press conference on May 2, 2017.

REPORT to the Annual General Meeting – April 28, 2018

#### Mandate:

To promote, encourage, and assist Home and School associations with membership activities. To evaluate and update membership kits and other membership materials designed to promote membership. To offer training for membership chairpersons via the executive workshops and the fall conference. To visit local Home and School associations and other schools interested in forming a Home and School. To encourage local associations to host regional council meetings for Home and Schools in their area.

## Executive Workshops:

The Executive training workshops were held at the QFHSA office on September 28th, 2017. Thirty five representatives from nineteen local associations attended. A separate report is included in the book of reports.

#### Regional councils:

A) AGM - April 29<sup>th</sup>, 2017: These regional councils were held at the Annual General Meeting on April 29<sup>th</sup>.

- Delegates were divided into three groups two (2) elementary-level and one (1) high school group.
- Discussion topics included: relationship between Home and School and the Governing Board, principal and teacher representation at Home and School meetings, capital projects; focusing on your community, fundraising, online payments, sourcing supplies/gifts, starting an online fundraising page (i.e. Google Classroom). Some of these items became workshop topics at the 2017 fall conference.
- B) August 26, 2017 Western Québec: Regional council (morning) and leadership workshop (afternoon).
  - Representatives from seven (7) local associations attended the regional council in the morning.
  - A condensed training workshop for all Executive positions was held in the afternoon.
- C) October 28, 2017- QFHSA Fall Conference:
  - There were three (3) regional council groups two (2) elementary and one (1) high school.
  - The QFHSA asked for information on the use of the school name on Home and School events/documents/websites, how events/fundraisers are approved, the new high school history curriculum and the new sex education curriculum (pilot project).
- D) January 25, 2018: Four (4) high schools were represented at the regional council hosted by Lindsay Place High School Home and School Association. Three (3) high schools agreed to host elementary-level

Home and School regional councils at their schools. As the school year is ending, we look forward to scheduling new ones in the Fall of 2018.

#### Meetings with local associations:

In addition to telephone consultations, there were numerous "face-to-face" meetings with nine (9) local associations this past year. Some topics covered were: graduation conumittees, running meetings, relationship between Home and School and administration, elections and constitution and by-laws.

## YES (Youth Exploring Science)

Report to Annual General Meeting- April 28, 2018 Submitted by Carol Meindl, Executive Director

Mandate The YES project was initiated by QFHSA to provide science workshops to member schools in more remote regions of Quebec via the video-conferencing network of the Quebec Community Learning Centers (CLC), to inspire tomorrow's scientists.

The format of this year's Youth Exploring Science program was changed as Evelyn Castillo, our usual activity animator, was unavailable. As an alternative from doing three different workshop activities, we partnered with Le Nichoir, a bird Sanctuary in Hudson, QC to educate the kids about our feathered friends and to help celebrate the Year of the Bird.

Workshops were still offered on Saturdays afternoons.

<u>CLC participation</u>: We enjoyed the participation of three (3) CLCs this session:

- Laurentian Regional CLC (Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board) cord. Melanie Bujold
- Valleyfield CLC (New Frontiers School Board) cord. Brooke Wilson
- Huntingdon CLC (New Frontiers School Board) cord. Heidi Niven

Jo-Annie Gagnon, Education Coordinator for Le Nichoir, took her "bird show on the road" along with feathered friends - beaks, wings, webbed feet and all. Students learned about natural bird adaptations as well as the many and varied ways birds can get injured navigating through the hazardous world of our human creation. Students learned how to recognize the different injuries a bird can suffered and recommend a treatment. Each participating school received a squirrel busting bird feeder and each participating student received window decals to keep birds from flying into their windows at home.

<u>School participation</u>: There were ~65 students registered from 6 schools: St Adele\*, Grenville Elementary, Morin Heights Elementary\* and Laurentian Elementary Schools\*, Gault Institute Elementary, and Heritage Elementary.

Summary: There is a continued interest in participating in the YES project. It is serving a need that is apparent in the regions. The students really enjoy the hands on aspect of these workshops as well as the 'take home' materials for further exploration. The schools benefit as well because the demonstration materials often stay in the school. The QFHSA intends to continue to offer Youth Exploring Science as part of our regular programming for our member associations in the regions and as an outreach initiative to inner city schools and prospective new members.

<u>Next year</u>: We look to partner with Let's Talk Science in 2018-19 to bring science activities to the regions.

## Canadian Home & School Federation (CHSF)

Report to the Annual General Meeting April 28,2018 Submitted by Rose Murphy, OFHSA Representative

The Canadian Home and School Federation was formed in 1895 and QFHSA has been a core member since 1944.

#### **Activities 2017-18**

The CHSF Board of Directors met twice in 2017.

## May 4th - 6th in Fredericton, New Brunswick

Attending this meetings were delegates from New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Ontario and Quebec.

The May meetings studied the Procedures and Policies Regarding School Closures in the four (4) provinces. The CHSF Strategic Plan was reviewed and adopted.

Jeff MacFarlane from the Ville Cooperation was invited to give an overview of this co-op. The Ville is a non-for-profit co-op which utilizes underused buildings to transform them into community centres. It works with schools and the community to establish and maintain a garden and to give workshops on gardening, woodworking and sewing, etc.

The Federation is still looking into the copyright and child health folders. A number of groups have met with Members of Parliament and Chris George, Chairman of the Copyright Consortium, to explain how the bill will affect libraries and educational institutions. It was decided to add our national voice to the discussion by sending letters to Mr. George and all our Members of Parliaments. Senator Dorothy Raine has introduced a bill to amend the food and drug act to prevent advertising to children. CHSF President Richards will contact her to discuss the Child Health Protection Act. It was also recommended that CHSF endorse the Child & Youth Advocacy Commission.

Resolutions on the Enforcement of School Anti-Bullying Policies and the Health of Children Regarding Sleep will be studied and was placed on the November agenda.

## November 2<sup>nd</sup> - 3<sup>rd</sup> in Halifax, Nova Scotia.

Attending this meetings were delegates from New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Ontario and Quebec.

At the November meetings the Board received the President's Report. Being Cynthia Richards' final one as President, she thanked her Executive and Board members for all their work and support. She reported on the two conferences that Canadian attends:

The CASSA-ACGCS (Canadian Association of School System Administrators /Association canadienne des gestionnaires de commissions scolaires) conference was held July 5 in Nova Scotia with the theme "Healthy Schools, Healthy Communities, Healthy Future".

The EdCan Network Conference was held October 4 - 6 in Toronto. The theme also explored the topic of health with a panel discussion 'Voices from Healthy High School Cultures'. Speakers and workshops dealt with such topics as: students receiving meaning learning for healthy minds and bodies; mental health can worsen one's physical health; well-being; social-emotional learning; tips for leading healthy school cultures; making the connection between youths' social media use and their well-being; and playing the long game to embed well-being in all our classrooms. This closing statement said it all,

"We need to do whatever we need to do to see all student succeed. Just because we do not know how to teach a specific student it does not mean we have the right to limit their learning".

In keeping with the focus of our strategic plan for the future, the Board developed a new web site, www.canadianhomeandschoolfederation.ca and twitter @cdnls. The artwork on the brochures and pop-up banner will be done by the graphic departments at the New Brunswick and Ontario Home and School Associations. They will then be produced and sent to the member provinces. There will also be a concerted effort to seek new funding to help with membership and new structuring of membership and meetings. It was suggested that there only be one face-to-face meeting (probably the AGM) and one technical (phone/video) meeting.

#### Awards

The criteria for the Life-Time Membership Award were reviewed and a recipient was chosen. The Board voted unanimously to award Quebec's Rickhey Margolese the Lifetime Membership Award.

## **Future Activity**

The Standing Rules and Policy procedures will be reviewed and updated by the Board of Directors. The CHSF resolutions, Enforcement of Anti-bullying Policy/ies and Healthy Sleep and Late Start Times, were voted to proceed to the provinces.

The Spring Board Meeting will be held in Ottawa, May 6.7 and 8. Letters will be sent to the Governor-General, the Prime Minister, various ministers and certain organizations with whom we wish to neet. The topics for discussion will be the Copyright Act, the Child Health and Protection Act (Bill S-228) and the promotion of CHSF.

Diane Powell from Nova Scotia was acclaimed President of CHSF and Arlene Morell was acclaimed Vice President. The next AGM will be held no later than November 16-18, 2018.
