

Collective Autonomy Restriction: Our perception that other groups try to control how our group defines and expresses its sociocultural identity and behavior.

Why does it Matter?

Self Determination Theory



- Personal autonomy: Feeling volitional and free to act in accord with identity / values as an individual.
 - 40+ years of research linking PA to wellbeing across multiple domains (family, romance, friendships, sports, schools, organizations, national contexts)

Self Determination Theory



Autonomy supportive vs. restrictive environments: Focus has been supports and restrictions acting directly on the individual.


Social Identity Theory



- Social Identification: Seeing a social group as a significant part of who we are, and feeling meaningful social and emotional ties
- From we to me: We derive part of who we are as individuals from our social identities and feel connected to our groups. So, threats to our groups can impact us personally.




Because we are connected to our social groups, we might personally feel controlled if we feel that the freedoms of our groups are being restricted

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LGBTQ+ Community Studies

- 3 Samples of LGBTQ+ individuals: Canadian community sample (N=114); Online American Sample 1 (N=370; Qualtrics Panel) ; Online American Sample 2 (N=396; Mturk).
- Narrative Writing Manipulation: Describe collective autonomy restriction vs. collective autonomy support impacting one's community.
- **Prediction:** LGBTQ+ community members will feel less personally autonomous and less psychological well-being when they write about how their community lacks (vs. has) collective autonomy.

Participant in Restriction Condition: "The biggest barrier to collective autonomy for the trans community in Canada is likely the evaluations needed before acquiring hormones. While I was lucky and found a councilor quite open to a full spectrum of gender expression all the way to non-binary status, many are faced with a pressure to present as near gender stereotypes in order to be given access to HRT."





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
Did community members feel less personal autonomy when asked to write about how their group lacked (vs. had) collective autonomy?

E.g., "I had a lot of pressures I could do with out (reversed coded)"





Did community members feel less psychological well-being when asked to write about how their group lacked (vs. had) collective autonomy?



In all 3 samples – Thinking about restrictions to the LGBTQ+ community's autonomy reduced people's own personal autonomy, which in turn, reduced people's psychological well-being

Application to the English-Speaking Black Community of Quebec

- Threats to collective autonomy of Black community might be harmful to well-being.
- Important to consider how collective autonomy might be restricted by:
 - COVID-19 pandemic
 - Structural Racism
 - Laws such as Bill 96 and Bill 21

If collective autonomy is essential for group members well-being then groups may fight for power and status to protect their autonomy.

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Power: Potential to influence and resist influence (Pratto, 2016)
 Use power to resist restrictions from others (Lammers et al., 2016)

Status: Positivity and moral value of group identity (Cheng et al., 2013)

• If you are seen as good/moral, less reason for others to restrict you (Verkuyten, et al., 2020,2021)



Sample: 292 Black Americans (Prodege Panel Sample; approximated 2010 Census).

Prediction: Collective autonomy restriction would relate to Black Americans' support for collective action even when accounting for other forms of discrimination.

BlackLivesMatter Support: e.g., "I stand in solidarity with supporters of the BLM movement"



Application to the English-Speaking Black Community of Quebec

- The need to protect collective autonomy might be one important driver of Black Social Justice Movements in Quebec.
- Future research could explore impact of Laws such as Bill 96 in this regard.




Figure 1: COVID-19 is hitting certain communities harder than others. Data from CDC and APM research labs both show corroborating evidence that COVID-19 mortality rates are higher among BIPOC communities. These numbers are **age-adjusted data** from APM research lab.



Do members of privileged groups resist confronting the transgressions of their group in part because of a concern over collective autonomy restriction?


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Study Overview

- 245 White Americans (68 conversation groups)
- **Baseline:** Collective autonomy restriction (CAR) assessed <u>1 week</u> before group conversation
- Group Conversation: 3-4 White Americans engaged in challenging conversation about structural racism
- Outcomes
 - Verbal behavior during conversation:
 - Support and engagement Self-report following conversation:
 - Motivation to take future anti-racist action.
- Predictions:
 - White's own CAR at baseline predicts more anti-racism support and engagement
 - CAR perceptions of conversation partners at baseline predicts more anti-racism support and engagement

The Pyramid of White Supremacy

In a pyramid, every brick depends on the ones below it for support. If the bricks at the bottom are removed, the whole structure comes tumbling down.



Discussion Instructions (please read carefully before entering the chatroom):

In this study, we want you to interact with the other participants in your group as if the pyramid has just been shared on your company's discussion forum.

Try to react and discuss it with your fellow employees as if you really work employees at NewKnowledgeTech Corp seeing it for the first time. For example, you might discuss how the pyramid applies to the "funniest names" list shared at NewKnowlegeTech Corp.

We have programmed the Qualtrics survey such that you can only move on to the next survey page after a minimum of 8 minutes, but you might have to stay on the page a little longer if it takes a while for members of your group to join.

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Anti-racism conversation modeled after real world incident

- Three independent coders read/scored verbal interactions of each participant (*read holistically in context of full group conversation*).
- A given behavior scored as present if detected by at least one of three coders.

(17:09:10) User 1: I have been looking at the pyramid and I think it gives some interesting ideas for discussing discrimination.
(17:09:39) User 2: I agree. What do you both think about this list of names? Do you think there is any racism involved in it?
(17:10:18) User 1: I like the fact that it starts with indifference at the bottom. Making the world a better place is a responsibility we all share.
(17:10:33) User 3: I'm confused. Is there a list of names? I didn't see it
(17:10:42) User 2: I completely agree with that
(17:10:59) User 4: same here
(17:10:59) User 2: There is no actual list for us to look at, just a description of what was on it.
(17:11:12) User 3: THanks! got it
(17:11:56) User 1: I think a list of name that are supposed to be funny but that include obviously minority name is clearly a kind of veiled racism.

- Three independent coders read/scored verbal interactions of each participant (*read holistically in context of full group conversation*).
- A given behavior scored as present if detected by at least one of three coders.

(17:26:07) User 1: Have you all seen the Pyramid of White Supremacy email?
(17:26:20) User 2: Yes, I saw it.
(17:26:26) System: >> User 4 has Disconnected
(17:26:59) User 2: It is pretty insulting, to be honest.
(17:27:06) User 1: I was thinking that it really puts us in a group that no matter what we must be rasists.
(17:27:25) User 2: I find the pyramid itself to be racist.
(17:27:36) User 2: Disgusting
(17:27:51) User 2: Hello
(17:27:57) User 2: Hello
(17:29:03) User 1: Then the name list just makes it look like all of this is true. Just because of a few crappy employees wasting work time.

Conversation Outcomes

- Three independent coders read/scored verbal interactions of each participant (*read holistically in context of full group conversation*).
- A given behavior scored as present if detected by at least one of three coders.


Support/Engagement

Explaining intended message of pyramid tool: Verbally explaining the intended meaning of the pyramid teaching tool (i.e., foundations of racism)/ asking questions.


Personal reflection: Describing behaviors one did in the past that can reinforce structural racism + committing to future anti-racist action.

General support for anti-racism: Generally expressing support for pyramid teaching tool + talking about structural racism in schools/organizations

Conversation Outcomes



Self-report outcomes following conversation



E.g., "Did your conversation make you want to play active role in challenging systemic injustices in America?"

Application to the English-Speaking Black Community of Quebec

- Richard's work shows that support and participation in the BLM movements has been an important part of Black Quebecers' experience.
- It is essential for White Quebecers to play a significant role in doing the work necessary to push for racial equality.
- Reducing White angst over their collective autonomy might be important step in increasing White commitment to racial equity.
