#### **DONALD S. BARNES**

To the many students, teachers, and parents at Macdonald High School in Ste. Anne-de-Bellevue, Don Barnes has been a teacher, a vice-principal and, above all, a very caring individual. Last June, he moved on to become Principal of Hudson High School, Hudson.

Don's first career was in the business world in England where he was born and subsequently educated as a Certified General Accountant. A few years after emigrating to Canada, he obtained a Bachelor of Arts degree and a Class I Teaching Diploma. At the present time he is completing an M.A. in Educational Studies.

His career as a teacher began at Macdonald High in 1964 where he taught English, History and Economics. He was also involved in Special Education and Counselling. In 1975 he



was appointed Vice-Principal, and in 1986 was appointed Principal of Hudson High School.

Professionally, he is a member of the Quebec Association of School Administrators and the National Association of Secondary School Principals.

Don Barnes' imprint on life at Macdonald High was incredible. He instilled a sense of pride in the history and tradition of academic excellence at Mac. The importance of student leadership, self-discipline and responsibility has always been a part of his personal objective for realizing the potential of young people. Parents were always assured that he knew every student in the school, and that he could be relied upon for sound advice when both parents and students needed counselling or assistance. It was this positive attitude that made Don Barnes synonymous with quality care and education at Macdonald High.
