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Read to your child before they are born

A newborn baby can only see approximately 1 foot in front of its face. Therefore, sound is the key to recognition for the first few months of an infant's life. By reading to your unborn child, and continuing to do so throughout its early years, you lay the foundation for learning and literacy, which is so important for human development.

"Humans are designed for language"

said Lawrence DePoe, a panel speaker at the "Literacy: Today's Challenges" workshop during the QFHSA Fall Conference. "American babies will learn Mandarin. Children will learn any language."

DePoe, an Early Childhood Educator and former President of QFHSA, was joined by Linda Shohet, Founder of The Centre For Literacy, to talk to parents about some of the important aspects surrounding literacy, education and early childhood development. With many of the parents in the audience having children in immersion or bilingual programs, language and literacy was a topic of much interest.

Having books read to newbrorns, DePoe said, helps children move their vocabulary from the 20 words in the first year, all the way up to the 10,000 words of what they will eventually use as an adult. Books he pointed out, have a story, plot, sequence and structure; all things that children respond to, and enjoy as a learning activity. But he cautioned about equating the reading of books to a child, to their ability to read.

In Finland, which consistently has amongst the top results in education around the world, schools don't teach reading until the students are seven years old. It's not until around Grade 1 or 2, that the brain is ready to read. Before that, DePoe noted, reading is difficult.

Linda Shohet, who is considered one of Canada's leading experts on literacy, jumped right in where DePoe left off asking the audience, "Are we hurting our children if they don't read

A primer on the democratic rights of parents in English schools in Quebec



There are three organizations in s schools, in with which parents can become involved!

GOVERNING BOARD (GB): At the schools' General Assembly of Parents in September, parents may be elected as one of the Parent Representatives on the Governing Board. At the first meeting of the Governing Board in October, parents are eligible to be elected as one of the two Community Representatives on the Governing Board. (Consult sections: 42 to 47 of Education Act, chapter I -13.3)

PARENT PARTI CIPATION ORGANIZATION (PPO): Also at the schools' General Assembly of Parents in September, parents may decide by- upon a majority vote, to have a Parent Participation Organization and elect members. Parent Participation Organizations have a specific mandate. (Consult sections: 96 to 96.4 of Education Act)

LOCAL HOME AND SCHOOL ASSOCIATION (H&S): At any time during the school year, parents of any school in Quebec may decide to have a Home and School Association. Upon

their decision, parents petition the Quebec Federation of Home and School Associations Inc. (QFHSA) to be approved as a local Home and School Association. The QFHSA has letters patents, a provincial charter issued by the Government of Quebec, and receives funding from the Ministry of Education, Higher Education and Research of Quebec.

96 years ago, the first Home and School meeting of parents, educators and community leaders in Quebec, was held in 1919 at Macdonald High School in Sainte-Anne-de-Bellevue. 25 years later, in 1944, the QFHSA launched 45 local associations at Westmount Junior High School in Westmount. (Consult: The Quebec Federation of Home and School Associations Inc.: A His tory of Achievement. May, 2015)

We encourage all our members to adapt this letter and mail it off to your legislative representatives. The investment of the 77¢ would be well spent!

Charlene has a wide range of experience in Administration, Public Relations, Marketing and Graphic Design, working with non-profits, start- ups and established businesses.



An open letter to Premier Couillard

Eight institutions that represent Anglophones in Quebec have sent an open letter to Premier Philippe Couillard asking for more funding for English schools. Here is a copy of that letter. Quebec Federation of Home and School Associations is one of the undersigned.

Premier Couillard,

We are organizations, institutions, parents and citizens who have a vested interest and desire to preserve a vibrant English community in Quebec. Like you, we are engaged in and committed to the development of our communities and Quebec as a whole.

We are concerned about the erosion of quality public education in our province. We see that students requiring professional support do not receive the necessary help to succeed due to sustained cuts to the education system. We also see that this reality places a heavy burden on the entire school system.

English schools have a unique place in Quebec. In addition to conveying the rich heritage of our communities, they often receive francophone and allophone students, thus helping people from all backgrounds learn to live better together. English public schools teach students to be open to the world and to make important contributions to the development of our society.

In this context, we ask you to carefully consider the need to devote the necessary investments to fully support the vital role of English schools in Quebec. We are convinced that, like us, you know that properly funded public education creates better communities for everyone.

In case you missed it: Fall Conference

Don't mess with our school boards!

Those weren't the exact words that Marlene Jennings used as Keynote Speaker at the QFHSA Fall Conference, but the message was abundantly clear: English school boards in Quebec must stay, and the community must be allowed to run them.

Her comments at the conference, held at Roslyn Elementary School in Westmount on Saturday November 7th, 2015, drew several rounds of applause from QFHSA representatives, assembled for their semi-annual get together of speakers and workshops.

Jennings was speaking as Chair of the Elections Systems Study Panel which tabled its findings and recommendations to the Quebec Minister of Education: François Blais, in mid-September. She is well-known amongst the English-speaking community of Quebec, as the first black Quebecer to be elected to Canadian Parliament and a minister in the Liberal governments of Jean Chrétien and Paul Martin.

The panel was convened to provide the Minister of Education with advice on reforms to the English school board electoral system in Quebec, after proposing then abandoning the idea of abolishing school boards all together. The panel did that . . . and more (see details of the Panel's report in adjacent story).

"School boards are the only element of the public system that the English-speaking community can call their own. The democratic legitimacy is missing in other sectors," Jennings declared. She added that it was therefore important to enhance voter participation, as an important element of community vitality rather than eliminate public engagement (as what has already been done in the health sector).

As much as the reforms to the school board electoral system were the raison d'être for the panel's work, Jennings returned to the link with community vitality a number of times. Despite diminishing demographics in many English-speaking communities and the barriers imposed by language laws, she said that the success rate of English school boards surpasses the province's own objectives.

"English school boards have to stay as our primary educational institutions. We're even doing better than Ontario . . . We need strong voices to get this message out!" she exclaimed. In essence, Jennings conveyed that there's no need to penalize English school boards for having done a good job, just let them get on with it.

'Getting on with it' according to Jennings, means keeping universal suffrage and the right to have elected representatives (School Commissioners). Therefore, making it easier for English-speaking

residents to get and stay on the electoral list, and implementing electronic voting amongst numerous other recommendations. In addition while they're at it, she said the provincial government should consider introducing measures



to strengthen Quebec's English school system, including allowing students educated in English outside of Canada to attend English schools.

Finally, Jennings raised Section 23 of the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms, a non-exception clause that establishes the Constitutional provisions for minority language education rights in Canada. While school board elections are not specifically designated under Section 23, the panel put forward that protection for the right of minority language community members to elect School Board Commissioners and Chairs from within their communities through universal suffrage, is the natural means by which to exercise their right to the management and control of their education system.

She said this is common across Canada, and the elimination of this right for the English-speaking community of Quebec would have equally serious implications for the Francophone communities outside of Quebec.

"The strength of school boards is the link to community to ensure that the educational system adapts to student's needs," Jennings said, in reinforcing her message not to mess with success.

early?" No, but strongly believes that they should be read to early, agreeing with DePoe that you should read to your child before they are born.

She added that families and communities are a greater predictor of literacy than schools, not to diminish the role of schools, but to emphasize that developing a culture of reading early on is very important.

Shohet noted that Sweden, with an education ministry one-tenth the size of Quebec's, produces extraordinary results through programs such "Learning Holidays" where families vacation to learn together. "The Swedes just have a strong cultural value attached to reading," she said.

As for learning two languages at the same time, Shohet stated that it was very clear that immersion and bilingual programs are not a detriment to a child's language acquisition and literacy skills. If a child is having difficulty in a course, it is more likely that this is due to learning difficulties with the subject matter, and not because the course is being given a second language.

She noted that children can learn a second language at any stage, but the main benefit of early second language acquisition is pronunciation. She followed by referring the audience to an online video by Caroline Erdos, PhD, S-LP(C), a Speech-Language Pathologist at the Montreal Children's Hospital, specializing in bilingualism and multilingualism, reading impairment, oral language impairment, foetal alcohol spectrum disorder and craniofacial disorders. Leah Trineer, QFHSA Treasurer, is the coordinator of the Born to Read program at Roslyn Elementary School and is the former chair of the QFHSA literacy committee. Born to Read is a QFHSA program, where a bag of books is given to newborn babies whose siblings attend Roslyn Elementary. The board books emphasize concepts i.e. colours, numbers, etc. Roslyn donates about 16 bags per year at a cost of approximately \$300.00.

Carol Meindl, the Executive Director of the QFHSA, ended the workshop by highlighting that each school should have a copy of the QFHSA's Children's Literacy Resource Guide. This guide outlines a variety of activities and strategies that parents and teachers can adopt to improve literacy for all age groups. This guide can obtained from the QFHSA office (digital format only). In addition, Carol emphasized that the QFHSA organizes contests to encourage literacy such as Family Treasures/Famous Family Recipes and Farm to Fork. Fall Conference Workshop Reviews

Brian Smith - Money Talks Workshop

Brian Smith from the Canadian Foundation for Economic Education (CFEE) gave a very informative workshop on Money Matters at the QFHSA Fall Conference. It quickly became apparent that the attendees were there to learn more about finances and financial literacy both for themselves and for their children. He said that financial literacy educates people to make better choices and have a financially responsible lifestyle that their children can emulate. Brian gave us some facts about grade 11 students that were recently surveyed:

- 93% of youth think learning about money is important
- 20% of graduates will be making \$100 000 within 10 years
- 50% of high school grads are already carrying some amount of debt

The Quebec government is planning on adding some financial literacy to the curriculum next year, albeit starting with grade 11 students. Who wouldn't want to know how to do your own taxes, how to buy a car, how does a credit card works, how to buy a house with a mortgage and a million more questions! As adults, most of us stumble blindly through these only as we encounter them in our lives. Imagine how much more confident we could have been about buying a house if we had learned more about the process when we were younger! Brian and the CFEE offer school sessions to encourage teachers to integrate these financial lessons into their every day teaching. He also offers something similar to a Science Fair called a Money Fair at schools. Student teams pick a financial topic such as any of the questions above, then present it to others in a science fair like event.

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Workshop: Teamwork for Success Instructor: Dynamix

"You go into a teamwork workshop wondering how a bunch of random strangers are going to react to a sales pitch, but Corey is one of those unassuming people who puts you at ease while still bringing the energy up in the room. We did two activities: both problem solving tasks, that you think a bunch of reasonably well-educated people would be able to handle.

Well we could handle the tasks, but as Corey noted to us it was never about the task we were engaged in. It was what it caused us to remember: Teamwork needs a team and that communication and being goaloriented is important. Taking the time to build your Home and School team is never time a waste of time. The ideas and energy that you gain from engaging in team building pays long dividends to your organization, if you can get people engaged.

I appreciate that there are professionals like Corey and groups like Dynamix that bring together Home and School associations to engage in teamwork workshops!"

Workshop: Writing Your Home and School By-Laws

Great discussion and debate was had around the roles and responsibilities of Home & School Associations, Governing Boards and school administration, and highlighting the potential areas of conflict between the two... always a lively topic. By looking at the framework of the constitution, bylaws and standing rules, and understanding the role and reasons for each, it helps guide us in our decision-making and takes some of the emotion out of the equation. Talking through the practical terms of implementation also helped establish potential areas of concern and highlighted the need for reflection on the way we function today, in light of changes in technology and the structure of families and society.

Workshop: Elections workshop Instructors: Brian Rock and Debi Brown

"A PowerPoint presentation was given about the proper procedures for



local Home and School elections. Debi went through the 7 steps of an election. Each school has a constitution and bylaws, which should be reviewed every few years and consulted prior to elections. Elections must be held at an Annual General Meeting (AGM) or a special meeting. Members must be informed in advance that elections will take place".

7 Steps for elections:

- 1. Sign-in at meeting, to ensure only members are voting.
- 2. Ask principal or alumni if they can help with elections.
- 3. Explain procedures.
- 4. Nominations: Depending on by-laws, can be from floor.
- 5. Use secret ballots and count votes in same room if possible. Only defeated candidates can ask for the number of votes they lost by.
- 6. REPEAT procedures for each position. Executive Committees should consist of a minimum of 4 people: President, Vice President, Treasurer and Secretary.
- 7. Swearing in of new officers. Meeting is then is adjourned. Can be followed by a regular H&S meeting.

Many questions about elections came up and as always much was learned. We were also given guidelines for fundraising which was very interesting.

Election Systems Study Panel Summary

The Elections System Study Panel was cosponsored by the Quebec Federation of Home &School Associations (QFHSA), the English Parents Committee Association (EPCA), the Quebec English School Board Associations (QESBA) and the Quebec Community Groups Network (QCGN). It was chaired by the Honourable Marlene Jennings, P.C., LLB, along with Leo La France, Rachel Hunting, Brian Rock and Rhonda Boucher as members. The panel was convened by Francois Blais: Quebec Minister of Education, in June to produce a report by September.

Panel Mandate

- Review past school board elections and election systems and make recommendations on how to improve the election process.
- Identify options for selecting School Commissioners.
- Collect expert advice on minority language rights in education.
- Seek out the views of interested organizations and individuals, on school board governance and operational issues
- Deliver a report on community response, input and opinions of experts, as well as other pertinent information, and recommendations to meet Constitutional guarantees and improve voter participation.

Input

Individuals and groups from across Québec provided our panel with suggestions, research and background on school boards, democratic representation, voter participation and non-participation, voting process, Canadian Constitution, mergers, efficiency, community involvement, student success, staff support, and more.

Findings

 The current practice of electing English school boards by universal suffrage is the best and perhaps the only way to fulfill the government's obligation to protect the minority language community's constitutional rights.

- The strength of elected school boards is that Commissioners have a special link to the community they serve.
- School boards are the one element of the public system that the Englishspeaking minority can call its own, thus giving it a degree of democratic legitimacy that is absent for English speakers dealing with other public services.
- Steps should be taken to facilitate voter participation.
- Government should consider introducing measures to strengthen Quebec's English school system, including allowing students educated in English outside Canada to attend English schools.

The Canadian Constitution

- Section 23 of the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms, a non-exception clause, establishes the Constitutional provisions for minority language education rights in Canada.
- While not specifically designated under Section 23, protection for the right of minority language community members to elect School Board Commissioners and Chairs from within their communities through universal suffrage is the natural means by which to exercise their right to the management and control of their education system, and is common across Canada.
- French-language minority outside Quebec elects its school boards across Canada.

Recommendations

- Parent Commissioners continue to be elected through the current Parent Committee Electoral College system with all of the rights, responsibilities and duties of Commissioners elected through universal suffrage, but with the addition of the right to vote.
- The number of Parent Commissioners will be increased from four (4), to six (6) on each School Board.

- Maintain possibility of co-opting Commissioners based on expertise.
- There is a consultative role for staff to play, but maintain clear lines between staff and management.
- Further discussion is required about Cycle II Secondary student involvement on Council of Commissioners

Election Process

- Online, telephone and mail-in ballot elections only.
- Elections Quebec oversee elections.
- English and French school boards collaborate on revision of voter lists.
- Modify the voter registration process so that English graduates and their parents, as well as English 18 year olds, are automatically on English school board voting list.
- Election Day voter registration, if online voting is not implemented.

Conclusion

- The Election Systems Study Panel has determined that not only must the English school boards continue as the primary institutions- ensuring the vitality of Québec's English Minority Communities, but also the school governance system will not benefit from any addition of new governance structures, imposed under the guise of improving service delivery to English Minority students.
- Judged by student results, English school boards are a success story.
 Focus should be on how to make them better. Government should work with school boards to strengthen the system.

- 4. Enter your chosen payment method.
- 5. Enter your tax receipt information.
- Once complete, members will receive a confirmation from CanadaHelps, and a charitable tax receipt.
- 7. In addition members will receive a thank you message from QFHSA, on behalf of the selected member association.
- 8. Members' donations are then deposited into the QFHSA bank account.

QFHSA tracks the donations made to each Home and School Association fund. At the end of each month, the QFHSA issues a cheque to the respective Home and School Association.

This is an excellent option members who don't have the time to sell fundraising items or participate in the majority of events, but want to do what they can to support their local association.

Are English school graduates bilingual enough to take their place in Quebec society?

ABEE would like parents to let us know why you chose an English school for your children, and describe your expectations for the school as regards bilingualism and biliteracy. Indeed, some among you may already have a child who has graduated. Were those expectations met?

At the previous Minister of Education's request, ABEE is exploring the issue of bilingualism and biliteracy, during the 2015-2016 school year. We believe it is the expectation of parents that English schools must graduate bilingual students. Thus, our central question is: Are graduates of English schools bilingual and biliterate enough to take their place in Québec's society- and in particular, the workforce? We believe that English schools have made enormous contributions in this regard, but we need to ascertain whether the Minister of Education has a larger role in supporting the English schools in this endeavour, and what that role could be?

The Advisory Board will look at the research on this topic, meet with various experts and professionals from the field, and with graduates of English schools. ABEE would also greatly appreciate feedback from parents.

We sincerely hope that parents of each local Home and School Association will respond to these few questions, and make additional comments in regards to you expectation, experience and results. We shall certainly get back to you with our results. We are looking forward to hearing from you by the end of January.

The Advisory Board on English Education (ABEE) was set up in 1992 to advise the Minister of Education, Higher Education and Research on all matters affecting the educational services offered in English elementary and secondary schools, and vocational and adult education centres.

To date, the Advisory Board has submitted 25 briefs to successive Ministers of Education over the last 23 years. The Board's advice has covered a wide range of matters affecting the education of our students in English schools and centres. The Minister of Education may solicit the Board to address a particular topic, or the Advisory Board itself may bring to the Minister's attention an issue affecting the English school system.

Each year, the Minister names new members to serve on the Advisory Board from a list of nominees put forward by various English education associations and organizations that represent: teachers, parents, schools, board administrators, commissioners, individuals as well as others, who are involved in post-secondary education. The term of office of the 16 members is on average three (3) years. Nominations are accepted at any time.

SURVEY: Assist LEARN in supporting and improving your child's learning

DIM DEAR DM.

My son is a really great kid. He gets along well with his sister, does what he's asked, and is usually in a good mood. At school, I hear that he's a wonderful boy who does well academically. But when it comes to research and lunch, the teachers say he's not doing as well... they say he's lacking "social skills". He has trouble sharing and always wants to be first. When things don't go his way he's not so happy, and he's not always sure how to handle those situations. I've noticed lately he's not getting any calls, or invitations to birthday parties. He's tried inviting a few different people over for a playdate, but nobody has been accepting—and he's starting to say "nobody likes me". Watching him so lonely is just breaking my heart. How can I help him with making and keeping friends?

DEAR MAKING & KEEPING FRIENDS.

As social beings, one of the things we all have in common is our need to belong and to be valued by those with whom we spend our time. Many of today's youth struggle with social challenges. They may have difficulty with social and emotional regulation, or managing frustration when things don't turn out the way they expected them to. For these children, making and keeping friends can be the most difficult and painful aspect of being at school, and can create sadness or worry. The good news is, social skills can be taught!

Social skills are the foundation for getting along with others and are a part of our everyday life. Whether it's going to school, saying a friendly hello to a classmate, being a member of a team or working on a class project, strong social skills are priceless. Research has shown that social skills are the base for positive self-esteem: When children feel good about themselves, they are more willing to take positive risks — academically and socially. With practice and direct teaching, children can improve their friendship skills!

One program that focuses on social skills is the "Incredible Years" programs, with a 3 pronged approach (ie students, parents, and educators). The program for students, "Dina Dinosaur"* is designed to teach children emotional regulation, frustration tolerance, communication skills, problem solving strategies, as well as team building. Through the use of interactive activities and games, the program promotes social and emotional competence.

Parents can also support their child's learning by joining the "Incredible Years"* Parent Training Program. The parental component is an interactive strategy based program that is designed to prevent new problems, address current challenges and support parents in learning new skills to support their children's healthy development. With the right knowledge and skills, parents are in the position to support their children in developing the social skills so necessary for success at home and school. 
