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Executive Director's Message

As the summer season comes to a close, the staff and Board of BCRC hopes that our readers enjoyed the warm weather and restful holiday.

BCRC's fall activities are in full swing. Our fall line-up of workshops will predominately focus on HIV/AIDS education. These workshops are in collaboration with AIDS Community Care Montreal (ACCM) and are offered free of charge to the Montreal community. In keeping with our commitment to youth in Montreal, BCRC is also working with Black community organizations to hold information sessions with their leadership youth groups on Youth and HIV/AIDS. We feel strongly that education is vital to positive sexual health.

BCRC is also in the process of outreaching to schools. We will be working with schools to help educate students about the Quebec labour force and their educational and career opportunities. So many of our youth know little about the variety of interesting job opportunities available to them. We will also be working with schools in a more general way to support them in their efforts to increase student participation.

Finally, I would ask that all of our readers highlight Thursday November 10th in their calendars, as we will be sending out invitations for Soul Reflections, a wine and food tasting experience that friends and family will be invited to in celebration of 10 years of hard work and success within the community.

HIV/AIDS & The Black Community

- Black Canadians accounts for the highest proportion of reported AIDS cases among non-White groups"*
- In 1998, Black Canadians represented 5.3% of positive HIV test reports with known ethnicity. This figure rose to 10.8% in 2003*
- [Between 1998 and June 30, 2004] people whose HIV infection was attributed to heterosexual exposure represented the largest proportion of positive HIV test reports among Black Canadians (85.5%)*
- Black females are at a higher risk of contracting HIV/AIDS than any other segment of the female population in Canada**

HIV/AIDS Cont.

- Informal volunteer reporting indicates that 70 per cent of the mother-infant transmissions in recent years were among women from Africa and the Caribbean...overall, the rate of HIV infection is 20 times greater in the Caribbean community and 60 times greater in the African Community**

- At a global level, youth have been greatly affected by the HIV/AIDS epidemic as an estimated 10 million people aged 15 to 24 years are now living with HIV. Half of all new infections worldwide are occurring among young people*
- In 2003, females accounted for 42.5% of positive HIV test reports among those aged 15 to 29 years. This proportion has been consistent since 1999*
- Over 80 per cent of Black Canadians are infected via heterosexual exposure**

The Canadian Youth, Sexual Health and HIV/AIDS Study (CYSHHAS) was conducted in 2002 with 11, 074 students, ages 12, 14 and 16, in grades 7,9 and 11. Many students thought there was a vaccine to prevent HIV/AIDS while many others think there is cure.

During the Fall, BCRC will hold four HIV/AIDS awareness sessions . "Education is vital to positive sexual health". We encourage our readers to contact us for further information.

THE ROSEMARY BROWN RESOLUTION



On Tuesday September 6, 2005 the Côte des Neiges - Notre Dame de Grâce Borough Council adopted a resolution to rename the park situated on the corner of avenue McLynn and Vézina, in Côte des Neiges, 'Parc Rosemary Brown'.

Since February 2004, Marvin Rotrand, Montreal City Councillor for the Swondon district has been pushing to have the City of Montreal officially honour Ms. Brown; with the support of community organizations and public officials.

The resolution now goes before City Council to be "rubber stamped" for approval. According to Mr. Rotrand, "[Montrealers] have been promised by the clerk office locally [that City Council will vote on the Rosemary Brown resolution] no later than November."

Rosemary Brown had a distinguished career in Canadian politics and was equally committed to human rights and social justice.

In one of her more memorable quotes she states; "women should enter politics to bring about change. It's a tough arena and an unpleasant one, the sacrifices called for can be only justified on the grounds that we are indeed making the world, or our community, a better place than it is."

Writer and spoken word artist Howard Parchment unveiled his second book 'Letters of Devotion'.


A Canadian with "sizzling Caribbean roots" his writings reflect his North American experience and reveal his inner self.

The Centre undertook a comprehensive approach to meeting the needs of Black youth aged 0-30 and their families; this approach is called the "Holistic Project." Through a multi-intervention (holistic) approach, the Black Community Resource Centre helps young Black, English-speaking individuals fully participate in mainstream society.

The adoption of this approach recognizes that youth can have many needs (e.g., social cultural, health, education, economic, ect.) and that all these needs must be addressed in order for the youth to reach their maximum potential.

The Centre provides information and resources to both organizations and individuals within Montreal. In addition, we provide programming to Black youth in a manner which takes into account their many and complex needs.
