PRESIDENT'S LETTER

Dear members and distinguished guests,

Welcome to the 2020 Y4Y Québec AGM! This past year was another one of rapid growth for our organization as we defended the right to high-speed Internet access for all English-speaking youth, the preservation of urban and interurban transit systems, a sustained access to government jobs and internships for prospective and recent graduates. We also recognized the important place of English-speaking international students and young immigrants in our community with a new study about this cohort's levels of awareness of English-language services available to them in Québec.

Our work of representation was carried out this year with the idea of creating a flag for English-speaking Quebecers, creating a space for Inuit youth in Nunavik to get involved in their local communities, and creating a youth engagement forum around art. Sadly the COVID-19 global pandemic has postponed some of these events and has made it necessary to implement changes such as going virtual. I look forward to attending these and I thank our staff for adapting these activities.

Next year, our grassroots organizing will take on a new level as we get ready to host a Priority-setting summit for English-speaking youth. We're structuring our representation so that each region of Québec will have a voice at the summit, and so that each region has the support of Y4Y Québec to strengthen the local network of English-speaking youth.

I wish the next board the best of luck in increasing the adhesion of organizational members, adopting a fundraising action plan, and continuing to stand up for English-speaking youth in Québec as Canada recovers from the pandemic.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S LETTER

Dear Y4Y Friends and Supporters,

The trials that the events of the past year imposed on both community members and organizations are unquestionably the "faits marquants" of 2020. Through multiple consultations with the English-speaking youth community, Y4Y came to understand the many ways in which young Quebecers were affected in their personal, professional and academic lives by the drastic changes in our society. From our colleagues and partners in community organizations across the province, we learned about the vulnerabilities that have been exacerbated and revealed by the crisis that changed everything this year. Youth were not immune to any of the effects of the pandemic, and for good reason, mental health has emerged as the pre-eminent concern among the population whose needs Y4Y Québec represents.

In spite of this, Y4Y's leadership, staff, volunteers and membership were privileged to bear witness to incredible examples of the English-speaking community's resilience. When it became impossible to share thoughts and ideas, moments of kinship, and demonstrations of support in person, as we were used to doing as a network of like-minded community organizations, we didn't lose touch with one another. We altered the way we work together to effect change. When it became clear that certain portions of the population were suffering in a deeper sense than others, we focused our efforts and rallied around groups that address those needs. When we were told that loneliness was increasingly crippling for youth who were missing their friends, their families, their hometowns, their jobs, and their teachers, we adapted, and redefined outreach itself.

In a year unlike any other, I am prouder than ever to be an English-speaking Quebecer, whose multi-faceted community has shown the kind of strength, resolve and unity that is worthy of deep admiration. Beyond that, I am proud of the young people who have taught me so much this past year about ambition in the face of adversity, and who took action to serve the many communities with which they identify. As an organization, Y4Y has grown through the experiences of the past year, and it has been a privilege to be a part of it.

Our project aimed to boost youth engagement and participation in community life across Québec. Y4Y went about this by engaging over 1,000 youth through a series of 30 community consultations, 12 focus groups, and a youth survey with 520 respondents. The final report presented the key findings from the survey, which targeted English-speaking youth ages 16 to 30, and collected quantitative and qualitative information on youth media consumption and community engagement activities. 2. OCTOBER 1, 2019 TO NOVEMBER 1, 2020

PROJECT ALIANA





Because of the pandemic, Project Aliana was forced to deviate from its original plan and find new ways of accomplishing its goals. The Youth Forum in Kangiqsujuaq was rescheduled to take place virtually on September 24th as a panel discussion featuring Indigenous youth leaders and Mental Health professionals. Using connections and partnerships with many Nunavik community organizations, the team created a Community Mental Health Resource Guide for the region, a directory of social services available to anyone needing support. Among Project Aliana's new and promising partnerships is We Matter, a prominent Indigenous youth-led national organization dedicated to Indigenous youth support. The team is currently developing a video on Indigenous identity in Quebec with the province's Ambassadors of Hope. Project Aliana's facebook page has over 300 followers and the Community Resource guide has been shared by community and youth organizations across the country.

Inspired by the flags of French-speaking communities across Canada, this project's primary goal is to create the first official flag that will serve to unite and represent Québec's English-speaking communities. It focused on mobilizing and engaging with the province's youth to identify the meaningful symbols that represent this multifaceted community and their place in Québec. Over 250 survey results were collected to select meaningful symbols as templates; 7 youth artists, alongside an 8 member advisory committee, worked together on flag designs. With feedback from dozens of English and French-speaking Québec organizations, and roughly 3400 votes, Y4Y emerged with its final design. Y4Y hopes to have the flag become a unifying symbol for the English-speaking communities of Quebec; both by increasing their sense of belonging to their linguistic minority community, and to the broader Québec society.

This project aims to increase English-speaking youth's feelings of belonging to Québec society through two primary means; by creating exciting regionally-based events across the province, and by fostering powerful intergenerational conversations between local seniors and youth groups. These activities will run for an eight month period, focusing on seven regions: the North Shore, the Eastern Townships, Gaspé-les-lles, Québec City, Outaouais, Abitibi, and Montréal. A Youth Cultural Ambassador from each of the aforementioned regions will be on the ground, assisting their young peers across the province to better understand and appreciate the local history and culture of English-speaking Québec.

CURRENT & PLANNED ACTIVITIES

The year ahead will certainly be a busy one for Y4Y. Here's a short list of the projects that are on the horizon:

You Are Here: A Next-gen Approach to Promoting ESQ's Heritage

Affectionately referred to as the Belonging Project for short, this project will engage youth from across the province in a series of cultural activities designed to increase English-speaking youths' knowledge and understanding of their heritage. Youth Cultural Ambassadors from 7 regions will follow Cultural Learning Plans over the course of several months, create opportunities for inter-generational and cross-cultural exchange with community members, and share their experiences with peers across the province. The project is funded by the Secrétariat aux relations avec les Québécois d'expression anglaise.

New Report on Community Vitality

Y4Y will release the Community Vitality Report on English-speaking International Students in Fall 2020. Through the collection of data on rates of enrollment of international students at English-language post-secondary institutions in Québec, as well as polling international students who identify primarily as English-speaking, the report aims to measure the effectiveness of the systems and networks currently in place in Québec to support international students who may not speak French. Interviews are currently underway with English-speaking international students, whose personal experiences will be highlighted. This report is funded by Canadian Heritage.

Priority-setting Summit for the English-speaking Youth Community of Québec

The Summit project will bring together youth from across the province twice in two years to engage in the process of creating a 5-year Strategic Plan for the English-speaking youth community of Québec. In partnership with The Institut du Nouveau Monde, Y4Y will ensure the success of a two-day youth engagement Summit in Gatineau in 2021, followed by a similar Summit in Québec City in 2022. The Strategic Plan will be based on the input of several hundred English-speaking youth from across the province who gather to take part in this proactive dialogue, with a view to ensuring the vitality of the community in the future. This project is funded by Canadian Heritage.

Giving Québec's English-speaking Youth A Voice and Platform through Podcasting

The Podcast project is an exciting new endeavour involving youth from across the province in the creation of 10 unique episodes. The series will touch on themes such as "culture beyond screens", "youth engagement in times of crisis", "the performing arts" and "youth health & wellness", in order to illuminate regional youth perspectives on the English-speaking community's heritage and modern culture. Y4Y will be seeking Podcast contributors throughout the upcoming year, and broadcasting episodes every month. This project is funded by Canadian Heritage.
