### 'SAVVY SENIORS' A SPOTLIGHT ON NICOLE SEGUIN-RANGER

Let me introduce you to my fabulous friend *Nicole*. It must first be said that it is always a joy to be in her presence and I hope you will appreciate the honesty in which she tells her story.

Nicole was born on March 7<sup>th</sup>, 1947 in her grandfathers very tiny house in 'Coteau Station' (*known today as Les Coteaux*). Her Biological mother had 13

pregnancies, with only 8 surviving. 1 died of pneumonia, 2 died of Yellow Jaundice and 3 were miscarriages. Due to such a hardship that her mother experienced, Nicole was fostered at 6 months old by her mother's best friend, Olive.

An interesting side note: (Her foster mother, Olive Edna Payne, was born in 1903 in England, and worked for Buckingham Palace as a Chamber Maid. She came over to Canada and started working immediately at Le Manoir Coteaux des Lacs. This Manoir, located by the Soulanges Canal was very busy due to the Saint Lawrence seaway not yet accommodating boats).

Nicole grew up in Ville St. Pierre. During her youth, she loved to play tennis, having benefitted from having a Pro Tennis instructor live upstairs from her. She also loved spending summers at her cottage in N.D.I.P. - Notre Dame de l'Ile Perrot. (*known in those days as 'le Petit Lachine'*).

When Nicole was older, she visited her oldest sister, Pauline, in Ontario where she met her husband Rémi at a Dance hall. While sitting along the wall, she said her knees started shaking as he walked across the room, knowing he was going to ask her to dance. It must have been quite the dance because they were married on February 25<sup>th</sup>, 1967 and were married for 52 years!

Their first home was on 46<sup>th</sup> ave in Lachine, a large and spacious Duplex, a house that everyone gathered at on weekends, and one she still misses today.

Nicole had 3 children, but Nancy, her first born, died in 1972 at 4 months old of Spina Bifida at the Royal Victoria Hospital. Nicole said her marriage became very difficult at this time, understandably so... until her next child, Lee was born in 1977. Jay was the third, born in 1980.

Nicole stayed home during these years, where she and her husband Rémi owned an Excavation & Snow removal company which became incorporated in 1980. They had big contracts with City of Montreal, City of Lachine, City of LaSalle, and the City of Laval. One contract was huge, working on line 2 of the Metro from Henri-Bourassa to Montmorency, 5.2km under Riviere des Prairies which separated Laval from the City of Montreal. Nicole was the 'Brains behind the business', handling all the finances stating, "*My husband had no concept of money, he even insisted on spending \$1,300 on an old 1978 Kenworth truck!*" However, over the years, her husband fixed up that old truck and eventually sold it for \$38,000!

Rémi was a big smoker and suffered from Emphysema. Nicole had a very hard time during those years as she said that he was not very nice with her, becoming verbally abusive to her in the final years. The CLSC and Parrainage Civique really helped Nicole at this time as she was becoming depressed and lonely. During one of their outings, Nicole met her friend Diane Thomas. Nicole said "Diane Flew in the door of a restaurant, very excited about the birth of her first Grandson.... and so was I. My first grandson Blaze had also just been born..... Diane showed off all her pictures and I did not even have one photo of my new grandson in my purse!" This began a very close friendship over the years.... Nicole always the driver, Diane always the "Chatty Cathy", but also a very good listener for Nicole. (It should be noted that her dear friend Diane, who also participated in many MWCN activities, passed away in March, and she is truly missed ).

Nicole's husband Rémi passed away last October which finally allowed Nicole to get out and live her life. This is when I met Nicole, while she was attending a few of MWCN's activities. I gravitated towards her immediately, enjoying her humorous personality while not even knowing anything about her life. Now, I get to see her every Tuesday at our walking group and enjoy her company immensely. There is so much more to Nicole's story, but that will have to wait.... for 'Part II'.

# Nicole has recently said to me "*This Covid thing is so maddening... I was just starting to LIVE AGAIN when* the Pandemic hit!"

I want to thank my friend for being so candid during this interview. Nicole is such a genuine human being and contrary to some of the hardships mentioned, she proves everyday that one can overcome misfortunes and still bring so much joy to others!
