## 1st Session Workshops

**Teamwork Begins at the Top:** Are you a member of your Home and School Executive? Join us and learn about the duties and responsibilities of executive members, how to work as a team, and your obligations to the QFHSA. Bring your questions and we will do our best to answer them.

**Resolving Conflicts Peacefully:** Two people can't be expected to agree on everything at all times. In fact conflict is a normal and necessary part of healthy relationships. Learning how to deal with conflict—rather than avoiding it—is a crucial life skill. The purpose of this workshop is to help participants identify and better understand conflict, while providing techniques for improving conflict resolution and communication. Together we can find a way to learn key skills to manage our frustration and resolve conflicts peacefully and productively. This workshop will provide a conflict resolution process that participants can use to resolve conflicts of all sizes. Come join us for this interactive strategy-based workshop to learn more about resolving conflicts peacefully.

**Merit Pay for Teachers – Pros & Cons:** The goal of this workshop is to explain & discuss why teachers are opposed to merit pay and to go over the existing procedures in place regarding incompetent teachers.

**Making the Most of Parent Teacher Meetings, Moving from Confrontation to Collaboration:** Why is home-school cooperation so critical to student success? # SYMPOSIUM FOR RESEARCH ON OFFICIAL LANGUAGES 2011

The Department of Canadian Heritage (PCH) regularly offers financial support to research in the area of Official Languages and Minority Language Education and Instruction in Canada. PCH hosted the **Symposium for Research on Official Languages 2011** in Ottawa on August 31 and September 1st, 2011. Delegates were there to consider and discuss recent research done on minority language instruction from 2008-2010. They also examined how minority language support relates and contributes to the health and vitality of the culture of a community, be it a French community outside of Quebec, or an English community inside of Quebec. The QFHSA participated in this Symposium on the behalf of Home and School parents.

Naturally, the government wants to support relevant research, not just research for the sake of research itself. It wants, rather, to be able to see an impact — a visible 'bang for it's buck'. For example, if research is done on special needs innovations in school systems, it would like to then see those successful innovations implemented and incorporated, not to see it languish as just another report collecting dust on a shelf.

The question of how to disseminate the information in a readable fashion to the general public was considered as well as how to assure that the relevant results from studies done will be shared with the public and not suppressed because of political or other interests.

The Symposium considered 283 studies done between 2008 and 2010. Unfortunately, only a very few of those studies were looking at the situation of Anglophone students in Quebec.

As one participant put it:

*"It is the challenge for Francophones outside of Quebec to live their lives in French. It is the challenge for Anglophones in Quebec to live in Quebec!"*

Clearly, more research needs to be done on the health and vitality of the English Speaking community in Quebec and to explore the Anglo-Quebecer identity, if there is, indeed, one. The QFHSA suggested that teaching citizenship, in the broad sense of the word, to our children, would make an important contribution to community vitality. In its earlier years, the QFHSA was very involved with promoting citizenship and assisting new immigrants to integrate into Quebec society. The evidence is in the archives. Work is being done on the QFHSA archives this year to complete them and make them available to researchers. The wealth of information and insight available in the QFHSA archive material can be of significant importance to the exploration of the self-perceived identity of the English Speaking communities in Quebec both past, present and future.





## QFHSA DIRECTORS IN THE SPOTLIGHT

### LIETTE CHAMBERLAND BOARD OF DIRECTORS AND CURRENT PRESIDENT OF QFHSA

#### **News—> How did you become involved with QFHSA?**

**LC—>** I began my involvement with the QFHSA at the local level when my firstborn entered kindergarten 8 years ago. At the time, Windermere Elementary had a very strong Home and School. It didn't take long for me to notice that there was a full team of parents involved in their children's school life. I thought it was wonderful and wanted to do the same, so I enrolled as a volunteer on the Home and School.

Over the years, being a member of H&S allowed me to be involved in my kids education not only at home, but also at the school. My first year I spent as a regular member, exploring the possibilities that H&S offered.

In my second year I joined the executive as Membership Chair. Then for my third and fourth years I took on the position of President.

#### **News—> Why did you feel it was important to join the Board of Directors of the QFHSA?**

**LC—>** To make a long story short, when I joined the local section of Home and School, I never intended to attend the events that were planned by the QFHSA: I thought that events that needed to be attended over a weekend day was a waste. It was taking away precious time that I could otherwise spend with my family. After all, my volunteering at school was to be close to my

children, so why would I take a Saturday away from them?

But something happened. A parent who had registered was unable to attend due to sickness. I was asked if I could go in her stead. So I agreed for that one time.

Well it turned out that I learned so much on that Saturday. I attended workshops that were really valuable to helping me in the upbringing of my children. I was sold.

When it came time to register for the Annual General Meeting, I was really curious. What would it be all about? So I decided to go. There, I realized that it was much more than just my school and my children. It was much bigger than I thought, and also more complex.

But what really brought me to sit on the Board of Directors was the possibilities that I saw: making changes that could benefit my children, and everyone's children...

So I got involved, and worked hard with other Directors, volunteers and partners in order to make those changes. We win some and we lose some, but we all get involved, because education matters.

#### **News—> What do you feel is the QFHSA's most important accomplishment?**

**LC—>** I guess that would differ from Director to Director. For me, it is all the hard work that was done by so many people to change the law that was restraining my children's children to be allowed to attend an English school. It took time and effort, but we did accomplish what we had set forth.

**Note: Liette is a proud mother of 2 children and still volunteers at her their school. She also works as an In-House Judicial Counsel for a construction company and would like everyone to know that SHE LOVES SCOTLAND!!!**



### LARRY DEPOE BOARD OF DIRECTORS, VP AND CHAIR OF THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

New to our Board of Directors as of this April, Larry brings with him a wealth of knowledge both as a parent as well as from the education industry. Based in Montreal, he is a father of 4 and is also grandparent to 3 children (2 currently in the EMSB). Larry has over 25 years of experience directing early childhood centres and community based organizations. He has also served on several not-for-profit boards.

Larry has been active with the QFHSA all summer, diving right in by working on the QFHSA's Strategic Plan. He has also participat-

ed in the Symposium for Research into Minority Language Education, which was sponsored by Canada's Heritage Department, held in Ottawa August 31 to Sept 1, 2011.

## THE BENEFITS OF NETWORKING HOME & SCHOOLS HELPING HOME & SCHOOLS

Every fall, the QFHSA hosts its annual Fall Conference and it is attended by Home & School members from all over the province. It is a day-long event which offers our members the chance to get informed on various education issues, to improve their leadership skills, to attend workshops on interesting parenting issues, and to meet, network, and brainstorm with other Home & School members. It is a very rewarding experience!

Last November, the president of Shawinigan High Home and School, Mari Elin Chamney, came to Montreal to attend the QFHSA Fall Conference. As representative of her school, she attended the plenary session on Education: Building our Future Together and participated in two workshops about Teamwork and Fundraising.

At the Fall Conference, Mari Elin made a connection with Marion Daigle, QFHSA past president and long-time chair of the literacy committee, and Sarah Hone, a Home & School mom from St. John Fisher School.

Over the years, the QFHSA Literacy Committee, with Marion's help, has helped stock the shelves of many school and community libraries by sending them books that have been purchased

with funds from The Gazette's Raise-A-Reader Fund, Geoff Kelly MNA and various others. This year, through Mari Elin's contact with Marion, Shawinigan High was the happy recipient of a donation of 161 books for their school library! The students were very pleased with the new books. Then things got even better.

The children of St. John Fisher in Pointe-Claire, Qc – a long way away from Shawinigan – collected 150 gently used books with the encouragement of Sarah Hone (whom Mari Elin met at the Fall Conference back in November) and the St. John Fisher Home & School. These books were then sent to the students of Shawinigan High. This generous contribution was a boost to Shawinigan High's "Summer Reading Fun!" program allowing each child to receive a book at the end of the school year!

All this would not have been possible if Mari Elin had not made the effort to attend the QFHSA Fall Conference. Not only did she benefit by gaining important knowledge that she could share with her fellow Home & School members and making contacts with other Home & Schools, but the students of Shawinigan High also benefitted! Isn't that what Home and School is about? Hope to see you all at the Fall Conference this November!

## A LOOK BACK IN TIME

### An Excerpt of Resolutions from Quebec Home & School News Vol. 1 Issue 1 November 1948

From its very inception, the QFHSA has been on the front lines of educational matters both local, provincial and federal. Here are a few of the resolutions from our first news issue in 1948 giving a unique glimpse of parental concerns in Montreal and Quebec at that time, including obtaining parity of funding for schools across Quebec:

**Resolution #2** “proposed that the Federation study ways and means of co-ordinating the efforts of the schools and these community services in advancing a program of vocation guidance”

**Resolution #4** “that the Federation endorse the principle of a break between the Christmas and Easter vacations.”

**Resolution #7** “urging X-rays examinations as part of periodic health examinations”

**Resolution #13** “Whereas the accommodations for primary and secondary education have lagged behind the present needs; and whereas Provincial grants to school boards in Ontario this year will be approximately 32 million dollars as compared with a total of approximately 13 million dollars.....for schools in the Province of Quebec - both provinces having total school populations of about equal size; Therefore be it resolved that the QFHSA in cooperation with other educational organizations should exert a concerted effort to urge the responsible authorities to find the finances necessary to enable the various school boards to improve and extend educational facilities throughout the Province of Quebec.”

Each year the QFHSA members from local associations, our Board of Directors and various committees compile issues of concern to parents across the Province of Quebec and submits them as resolutions to appropriate government and school board organizations.

As a new school year begins, many parents quietly wonder what this year will bring their children in terms of friends. Will their child be in the same class as those who they enjoy - and away from that child who made their young person's life so difficult last year? So it's no surprise that the familiar refrain across homes as the door opens is often "did you make a friend today?". For some, making friends seems so easy. Knowing just what to say to peers comes naturally and everyone seems to vie for their attention and approval. For others, making and keeping friends is the most difficult and painful aspect of being at school. The one thing we have in common is we all need to belong and to be valued by those with whom we spend our time.

"Alex" is a grade 2 student, who if asked, would quietly admit doesn't have many friends at school. His mom would tell you that her boy does not get invited to parties and, according to her son's teachers, doesn't have anyone to play with during free time. Alex wants to be part of a group. So, he often spends time hovering close to groups of children. Unless you were close enough you couldn't even tell he did not belong.

Alex doesn't say much to his peers, and they in turn seldom speak to him. At night when his parents put him to bed he sometimes asks them why nobody wants to be his friend. It breaks a parent's heart to see their child so sad.

Whether young or old we all need to have good social skills – those skills that help us get along and work with others. The good news for all the Alexes out there is that friendly behavior can be taught as a skill.

Like any other skill, practice makes perfect. However, before you can practice you need to learn the skills that come so naturally to others - and become fluent at these behaviors. After all, they will need these skills for the rest of their lives, both at work and at play.

Imagine for a moment, what it might feel like to be close enough to see what you want (to join the game) but before you can have it, you have to face the possibility you will be rejected — or worse, "laughed at". Many children just survive recess and lunch, often too ashamed to admit their loneliness.

Marc is in Alex's class, but Marc would say that school is fun. In fact, he would probably say that recess and lunch are the best part of the day. Marc has lots to say and do, and with his great imagination he often has his classmates in fits of laughter. Marc regularly compliments the other boys when they do things well, their willingness to try new games. And whenever there is a team to be chosen – Marc is one of the first to be called.

Research shows that up to 50% of children who have difficulty managing relationships in childhood will continue to have difficulties in adolescence and fu-

ture relationships.

In fact, it has been established that the single best childhood predictor of adult social adaptation is not school grades or classroom behavior, but rather, how well a child gets along with other children. Once children are taught the skills sets they need to get along with others and learn how to resolve the inevitable conflicts that will emerge, their social world begins to blossom. The more they practice their skills the more fluent they become, and then the more natural it seems to reach out to others and to see themselves as a valued member of the class and school community.

Supporting a young person in developing their friendship skills will inevitably lead to an increase in self esteem – after all, we are social creatures. When children feel good about themselves, they are more willing to take positive risks—both academically and socially. When a child is socially competent they are more easily able to be empathetic towards others, problem solve, cooperate, work together in a team, and learn to manage their emotions when things don't go the way they had hoped.

# PARENTING: RESOURCES & ISSUES



**Question: What do you do when your child is pressuring you for something that conflicts with your principles as a parent? Do you:**

- A) look around at what other parents are doing;
- B) weigh your child’s grades and other ‘performance’ attributes against your principles;
- C) stand up for what you really believe in?

“This can be a difficult choice for today’s parents,” say Malcolm and Laura Gauld, the heads of Hyde Schools, a network of prep and charter schools in Maine, Connecticut, New York City and Washington DC that focus on character education. “You’ll probably take your lumps if you answer ‘C.’ But there is no better way to raise your child.” With three decades of experience in teaching students and their families to develop and live in a character culture and two decades of experience in parenting three children of their own, the Gaulds co-authored “The Biggest Job We’ll Ever Have” book and parenting seminars,

geared toward helping busy parents stay focused on the things that really matter — principles.

“Say you have a teenager who’s doing well in school, but has a bad attitude,” says Malcolm. “He tells you he wants the latest expensive gadget, like his friends have. Or perhaps he’s spending too much time social networking online and you want him to cut back. Should he be rewarded solely because of his grades? We see parents dismiss bad attitudes or habits when their child is performing well in school. But what message are we sending?” The Gaulds’ point to the achievement culture we live in as a source of complication for parents. “The focus is increasingly on grades, test scores and awards,” says Laura, “and not on the child—the whole child—and how he or she is developing, learning and making decisions. As a result, kids can adopt a ‘win at any cost’ mentality about grades, which can lead to a bad attitude, a compromised character, and even cheating and low self-esteem — a recipe for disaster. Further, the focus on external achievements as indicators of your child’s growth can put parents in a difficult position.”

The Gaulds’ advice: Be the parent who stands up for the things that really matter to you, regardless of your child’s

achievements. To that end, they offer these simple guidelines to parents:

**1. Define your principles.**

What are your principles, as parents? What do you believe is right? Become familiar with your own beliefs, clarify them, and learn to communicate them to your child. Parents of good kids tend to think they don’t need to say anything, but your children need to hear what you believe, loud and clear.



**2. Understand your job as parent.** According to the Gaulds, this is the foundation of parenting. “We earn our children’s love by first earning their respect,” says Laura. The Gaulds explain that we can be friendly with our children, but need to understand we are not their ‘friends,’ a mistake many parents make that can create unproductive attitudes because the dynamic of the relationship is askew. “We all want good relationships with our kids, but our role is to teach and guide them, first and foremost,” says Malcolm. “Our job is to model daily character, demonstrate what we believe, and make choices that may or may not be popular. That’s parenting.”

**3. Don’t look only at your child’s external accomplishments.** Often parents look at their kid’s achievements and think, “She’s doing very well. She’s getting all A’s, is a very accomplished athlete, and does amazing work with her art. She obviously doesn’t need help.” Talk to your child about what’s happening beneath the surface — i.e., stress, fears, attitude, relationships, anxiety, sexuality, friends, teachers. These are concerns and challenges that will not appear on a report card, and they are important triggers in your child’s life. “In the end, we are here to help teach our children what we know and believe in,” says Laura, “so they can grow into the best people they can be and fulfill their potential.”

“Character is inspired, not imparted,” says Malcolm. “We cannot pour it into our kids or our families. It takes work, and sometimes we put our relationships at risk when we hold to our convictions as parents. But the strongest relationships are those resting on a foundation of principles, guaranteed.”

## TOWARD GERM-FREE SCHOOLS

### Hygienic cleaning practices, education campaign helps keep schools germ-free and keep children and staff healthy

While school classrooms and labs are an excellent environment for learning, they're also home to some not-so-savory characters: germs. Most infectious diseases are transmitted by direct contact with another person or indirect contact by touching surfaces contaminated with pathogens. The crowded classrooms, hallways and cafeterias of schools can be a breeding ground for a variety of diseases including colds, influenza and staph infections, such as MRSA.

To understand how easily germs are transmitted in the school environment, imagine this scenario: One child with a cold or the flu can make contact with dozens of people each day. The same child, estimates show, touches his face, nose and mouth dozens of times each hour. He then touches hundreds of objects in the school, leaving behind hitchhiker viruses and bacteria just waiting to be picked up by unsuspecting children and teachers.

Winning the war against germs requires a two-pronged approach. Schools can maintain a healthy environment by engaging in a systematic hygienic cleaning program to eliminate pathogens, as well as an education campaign to help children use proper hygiene. Both proper disinfection of surfaces throughout the school and hand-washing can cut the absenteeism rate, studies show.

Specific attention should be paid to some of the most germ-infested places in the school, including:

- **Water fountains**, which can harbor as many as 2.7 million bacteria per square inch on the spigot. Have students bring in personal water bottles
- **Pencil sharpeners**, one of the most-used devices in classrooms
- **Computer keyboards and mice**, which can be the homes for as many as 200 times the number of bacteria found on a toilet seat



## HEALTH ISSUES

- **Desktops**, which can hold up to 100 times more bacteria than a kitchen table and 400 times more bacteria than the average toilet, according to Dr. Charles Gerba, an Environmental Microbiologist at the University of Arizona.
- **Bathrooms**, where E. coli and other fecal toxins can be found on nearly every surface.



The nightly use of EPA-registered, hospital-grade disinfectants kills harmful organisms and helps reduce the risk of disease transmission. Staff members should periodically use disinfectant disposable wipes to clean high-touch points in classrooms during the day to eliminate new germs.

Backpack vacuums with HEPA (High Efficiency Particulate Air) filtration help eliminate airborne germs and improve the overall indoor air quality. Another key component of hygienic cleaning is the use of microfiber cleaning cloths, which have been proven to be 99 percent more efficient at capturing and removing bacteria and soils than cotton or other fabric cloths or disposable paper products.

In addition to effective cleaning by custodial staff, students should be given appropriate information to help them remain healthy. The use of flyers, posters and in-class reminders can help students learn the importance of proper hand-washing. To ensure cleanliness, hands should be washed vigorously for 20 seconds using water and soap. Alcohol-based hand sanitizing products can augment hand-washing; sanitizer stations should be strategically placed throughout the school.

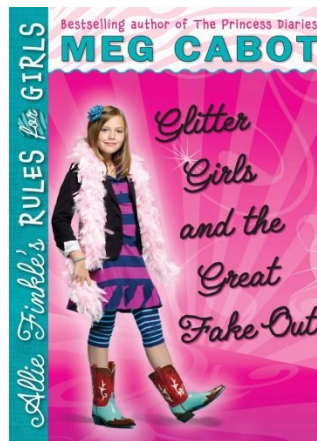
### ALLIE FINKLE'S RULES FOR GIRLS:

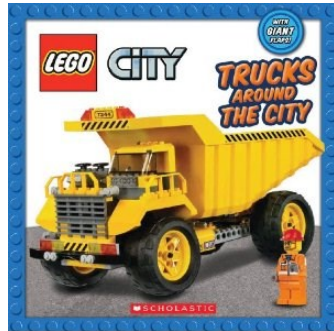
# BOOKS FOR LEGO AND STAR WARS FANS

**Publisher:** Scholastic Inc.; (September 1, 2011) – new release



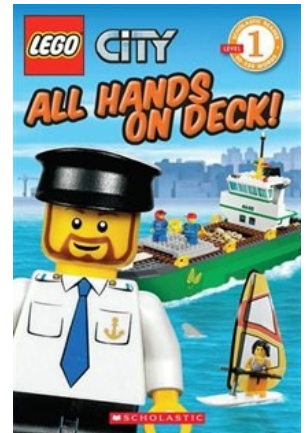
